ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (OCIA) is the process of welcoming new members to the Catholic Church. It is intended for adults who have never been baptized or for adults who have been baptized Christian and now wish to practice the faith in the Catholic tradition. It is an ongoing process of formation, catechesis and liturgical rites. Anyone interested is asked to call the rectory to discuss the process.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM...Parents are asked to call the parish office to register for the Baptismal Preparation Meeting and for the baptism of their child. Parents are expected to be participating members of the parish.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE...Couples seeking to be married in the Church are to make arrangements with the pastor six months to one year in advance of their intended wedding date, in order to allow time for marriage preparation. At least one of the engaged should be a registered and practicing member of the parish.

PASTOR'S CORNER

The Great Reversal

Luke 16:19-31

The parable of Lazarus and the rich man illustrates Luke's version of the Beatitudes from the Sermon on the Mount (6:20-26), where the fortunes of those in this world get reversed in the world to come: "Blessed are you who are poor, for the kingdom of God is yours. Blessed are you who are now hungry, for you will be satisfied...But woe to you who are rich, for you have received your consolation. But woe to you who are filled now, for you will be hungry." Distinct from the Beatitudes in the gospel of Matthew, those of Luke were particularly directed against those whose hearts were set on increasing their wealth without looking beyond the pleasures that this world makes available. While the parable of Lazarus does not necessarily bar the way to salvation for those who are materially fortunate, it does wake us up to the needs of the poor in our midst. Although there is something sinful about the rich man's daily over-the-top self-indulgence, the real sin was a surely culpable ignorance, his failure to see the destitute Lazarus at the gate and not to have done something to alleviate his dire condition.

From a young age, I remember being in a similar situation. In the early 1960's we were living in a suburb of Djakarta in a comfortable enough bungalow (no air conditioning, a kitchen with literally an ice box) with a walled-in backyard. The servants, who tended to the cooking, shopping and housekeeping, the driver, and a night watchman, were customarily employed by foreign families. However, we were living like royalty compared with the native local people in the next block who survived under in an extensive thatched-roof compound with mud floors and no running water, except for a spigot that might have been publicly available. As a third and fourth grader, I recall a twinge of conscience, or at least a concern, at the discrepancy in these contrasting adjacent living conditions. All these decades later, the disparity between rich and poor remains in our own inner cities, on our doorstep in Haiti and in many other parts of the world. I wonder if that childhood experience was one of the vectors that came together and pointed me ultimately in the direction of the ministry.

The preferential option for the poor is one of the principles of Catholic teaching, firmly rooted here in what is known as Luke's "Social Justice" gospel. In particular, the parable of Lazarus and the rich man focuses not on "doing" something wrong, but on the sin of omission. Since the time of my Indonesian experience, this has been a special emphasis in the reform of the Mass. The traditional Confiteor ("I confess to Almighty God..."), previously recited only by the priest, received an additional clause, now spoken by all the people together: "...in what I have done and in what I have failed to do."

Finally, this is the only one of Jesus' parables in which a character is named. "Lazarus" means "God is my help." God knows each one of us by name and has a special place in his divine heart for those who merely through the force of circumstance live the poverty of Jesus. I commend all who once again will be participating in next Saturday's Friends of the Poor Walk to alleviate the condition of families in our community. The kingdom of God belongs to both the poor and to those who seek to help them.



SUMMER APPEAL PROJECT

From Monday, Oct 6 to Friday October 31 we will be scraping and repainting the external surfaces of the church windows. All precautions will be made for your safety. Do not cross into any areas designated as off limits; they will be

easily marked with tape and signs. The areas designated as off limits will change as the work progresses.

From Monday, Oct 6 to Fri, Oct. 10, we will be working on the church steeple. There will be a crane in front of the church. The parking spots in front of the church will be off limits. The front doors will be closed. Enter through the side doors. During drop-off and pick-up of students from FAWS, flow of traffic will remain the same. However, the lane in front of the church will slightly shift to left to accommodate the crane.
