

PASTOR'S CORNER

Visions of the End

Luke 21:5-19

The beginning and end of our world are enshrouded in mystery. With our limited minds, we can only fathom the origin of things from pre-existing material. However, we know by revelation that God created the world out of nothing, and thus the impossibility of understanding how that works. As opposed to the Biblical account, our contemporary scientific minds might prefer the view that the universe began as a burst of energy from a certain point. This would still require God's guiding hand down through time for the coagulation of energy into the intricate structures of both living and nonliving beings. On the other hand, who is to say that the accounts presented in the first pages of the Bible do not have as much merit? With his almighty power, God could just as well bring about present things instantaneously, in six "days," over billions of years.

As to conceptualizing the mystery of the end, we also have reason and revelation. Based on the premise of the conservation of Being, what God creates he does not annihilate. Things are rather transformed into a higher or lower form of being, such as a log burning in the fireplace. It is transformed into a pile of ashes and gases that are emitted in the process of combustion. On the other hand, in Jesus Christ we know that the faithful will be transformed into a higher form in the resurrection of the body. Or in terms of the Temple, Jesus says, "there will not be left a stone upon another stone that will not be thrown down" (vs. 6). But it will be raised up in three days by his resurrection (John 2:19). In God's time, our bodies will be transformed from dust and ashes to a higher level transcending the ordinary dimensions of this world. This is seen in the way the Risen Lord, although physical in appearance and in activity, was not restricted by material impediments. He could walk through doors, eat with the apostles and disappear at will.

The sacrament of the Eucharist gives us a foretaste of the transformation. The mineral nature of the bread and wine brought forward in the offertory are transformed at the altar into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ. Since the Body and Blood belong to his human nature, elements of the material world are drawn up to a higher level of being, united to the divinity, and no longer subject to earthly dimensional limitations. Likewise, when the Lord comes to fulfill all things and the bodies of the faithful are raised, they will have the same characteristics of the Risen Lord. What remains to be seen is whether the new world will be a "Garden of Eden.2." In any case, there will be a face-to-face intimacy with the Uncreated God, in which evils no longer threaten, and we will be free of all temptations to false happiness. Contrary to the dismal end of the universe that scenarios of astrophysics project, our fidelity to earthly worship here gives us a vision of the happy end of all that God has created, and that he does it with our eternal good in view.
