ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS (OCIA) is the process of welcoming new members to the Catholic Church. It is intended for adults who have never been baptized or for adults who have been baptized Christian and now wish to practice the faith in the Catholic tradition. It is an ongoing process of formation, catechesis and liturgical rites. Anyone interested is asked to call the rectory to discuss the process.

SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM... Parents are asked to call the parish office to register for the Baptismal Preparation Meeting and for the baptism of their child. Parents are expected to be participating members of the parish.

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE... Couples seeking to be married in the Church are to make arrangements with the pastor six months to one year in advance of their intended wedding date, in order to allow time for marriage preparation. At least one of the engaged should be a registered and practicing member of the parish.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK... The Sacrament of the Sick is for the spiritual comfort, strength and healing of the ill. If there is a need for the sacrament in your family or household, please contact the rectory as soon as possible.

PASTOR'S CORNER

A Transformation of Hearts

Matthew 3:1-12

The calling of John the Baptist in the Advent gospels, urging us to acknowledge our sins, reminds us that there is a penitential dimension to the season. As expressed in the Penitential Rite, most every Mass begins with such an acknowledgement of sin. The presider invites the faithful present to reflect in their hearts on how they have fallen short of their calling as children of God, followed by sung or spoken responses imploring his mercy. In some Christian contexts, the presiding minister then pronounces God's word upon the congregation from Psalm 103:12: "As far as the east is from the west, so far has he put our transgressions from us." The comparable statement of the priest at Mass is: "May almighty God have mercy on us, forgive us our sins, and bring us to everlasting life."

We need to be clear about the important distinction between the acknowledgment of sin and where something more is needed. The baptisms by John at the Jordan River bring out the difference. People from the whole region were coming to John to be baptized by him "as they acknowledged their sins" (vs. 6). In this way, they were admitting their need of God's mercy in general without itemizing their sins.

When some Pharisees and Sadducees appeared, however, whom John recognized as needing to be confronted for hypocrisy, he called them out: "Produce good fruit as evidence of your repentance" (vs. 8). Such serious misdeeds led John to foretell a far greater baptism, which the coming Messiah would institute with the Holy Spirit and fire (vs. 11). When accompanied by true contrition, this baptism would transform hearts. The spiritual fire would purify the soul from sin, and the Holy Spirit would bestow sanctifying grace, a participation in God's life. Only through Jesus would there be made possible the actual forgiveness of sins.

For sins committed after baptism, in particular, serious sins that destroy sanctifying grace, the same fire and Holy Spirit are called forth in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Jesus would institute this follow-up to baptism when he sent the Holy Spirit after his Resurrection and gave his apostles the authority actually to forgive sins in his name. Note the difference between the priest's response to the acknowledgement of sin at the beginning of Mass and the absolution prayer in Reconciliation: "May almighty God have mercy on us..." and "I absolve you from your sins, in the name of (+). . ." While contrition for sin is called forth on both occasions, God's Holy Spirit and fire do their full purifying work in the latter.

Were the forgiveness of sins to have been only a limited offer for apostolic times, we should be a people of little hope all these centuries later. On the contrary, God has given us every reason for hope, that as we rise above our sins through the sacraments, we will be prepared joyfully to greet the Lord with open hearts and loving hands when he comes again.

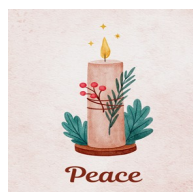

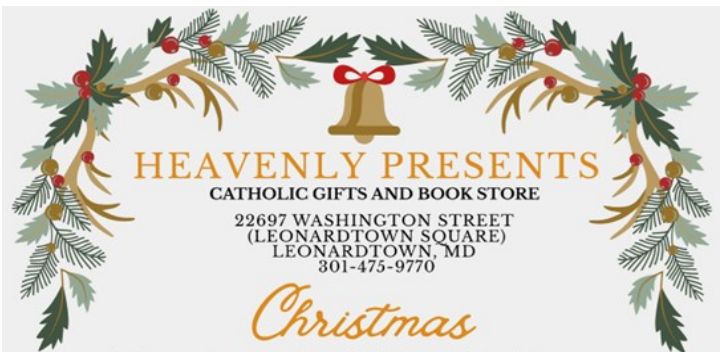
