SISTER MARIA THEOTOKOS ADAMS, SSVM, PHD KEYNOTE SPEAKER, INAUGURAL EVENT OF "SOUTHERN MARYLAND ROOTS: THE JOURNEY" 2022

On September 24, 2022, I joined Joe Melendrez and Fr. Larry Swink as a keynote speaker for the youth rally "The Journey: Why Did They Come?" organized by the Southern Maryland Roots youth group under the direction of Fr. Charles Luckett, Fr. Stephen Wyble, Fr. Ryan Pineda and Theresa Friess. This day of Catholic history and culture on St. Clement's Island far exceeded my expectations in several respects and I believe that it is an event that should be repeated so that more youth from Catholic high schools and parish youth groups can participate. I will mention two of the most important aspects.

First, this youth event was centered on the celebration of the Holy Mass at the very place where the first Catholic Mass was celebrated in the British colonies in 1634. Not only was the liturgy first and foremost, but the organizers had a very deep ecclesial vision in mind and a magnanimous spirit. They invited Cardinal Wilton Gregory himself to celebrate the Mass, and His Eminence most graciously accepted. The youth were very impressed to see their own archbishop make the journey from the city down to St. Clement's Island - by car, by boat, and nally by golf cart across the island to the site of the Mass.



Later in the afternoon there was also time of Eucharistic Adoration, prayer of the Rosary and opportunity for confessions.

Second, the event brought youth from different corners of Southern Maryland together for talks, prayer, sports and fellowship. In a time of fractured social relationships, the fact of so many teenagers being together from diverse backgrounds on an island spoke eloquently of our unity as Catholics. This event should be repeated and is worthy of being supported by the Archdiocese of Washington as a badge of honor.

Throughout the day we remembered the early refugee Catholics who came to this land seeking religious freedom, and the dangers they faced back in England. My own talk addressed the historical conditions of Fr. Andrew White, SJ and those on the Ark and the Dove, as well as his Jesuit confrere who took replaced him in England and later died there: St. Henry Morse, martyr (1595-1645).

I believe that as many local Catholic teenagers as possible should have the powerful experience of visiting the island where the first Maryland Mass was celebrated by those whose faith was the faith of martyrs. The legacy of immigrant Catholics from persecuted countries begins on St. Clement's Island and continues to our own day in the rich diversity of the Archdiocese of Washington. This event belongs to all Catholic teenagers as a unique opportunity to grow in their Catholic identity, their love for the faith, and their strength for the future. I am grateful to have been a part of this event, and I heartily endorse it being offered again.



"The men and women of the Maryland State Police, Leonardtown Barrack, have been involved with several events of the Southern Maryland Roots Organization, bringing the faith and law enforcement communities together.
