HISTORY OF HOW WE READ THE BIBLE, PART I:

REFLECTIONS ON POPE BENEDICT XVI'S LETTER, *VERBUM DOMINI*

The last two weeks we've been going through the Holy Spirit's relationship with the Scriptures. He inspired them. He was an active participant in Christ's action of the revelation of God. And, it's only by the Holy Spirit that we can come to understand the word of God.

It's this last point that I want to dive into over the next few weeks. In order to do, so, we need to look back on the way the Scriptures have been experienced in the life of the Church. In doing so, we can better understand our own situation and why the Holy Spirit is so important for us, in reading the Scriptures.

If you remember earlier in this series, when I spoke about canonicity, it's regular historical knowledge that the whole of the Scriptures was written before the year 100 A.D. The New Testament, especially, took awhile to get disseminated from underground church to underground church. Certainly by the legalization of Christianity by Constantine in 320 A.D., there was a unanimous canon.

Even then, only certain members of the churches were literate in Hebrew and Greek. The pope asked St Jerome to translate those Scriptures into Latin, which he did by 405. Even then, only a certain group of people were literate or even needed to be literate. So most lay people experienced the word of God in the liturgy. They heard God speak through the readings at Mass. This was the case for centuries.

By Medieval times, the Church was using the church buildings themselves to tell the story of the Scriptures. The paintings on the ceilings and walls, the stained glass windows told the stories of Scripture, and

"Lord, teach us to pray..."

We can't be a true disciple of Jesus without a relationship with Him. But sometimes it's hard to know where to start. Fr Kyle and a few men plan to begin a men's prayer group. Initially it will be conducted by a trained facilitator, using a prayer series based on the spirituality of St Ignatius (a warrior-soldier whose restless heart and fiery temperament were transformed by a newfound relationship with Christ). Participants in the *Lord, Teach Me To Pray* program find their prayer life deepening, and learn how to persevere in spite of "dryness" and other obstacles. people could read with their eyes as well as their ears. The stone on the outside, in relief, told stories as well. Still, the average Catholic was illiterate and so could not sit down with a Bible in hand.

Furthermore, this is prior to the printing press. Bibles, or books of the Bible, were copied by hand by monks, a laborious, intense, and detail-oriented task. There was no spell check or delete button. Mistakes meant starting the page over on valuable parchment. Only churches, monasteries, and the very wealthy would be able to have copies of the Bible, much less be able to read it.

As cathedrals grew up from the ground in all the great cities of Europe, so did universities. Learning to read, learning philosophy and theology, law and mathematics became more widely available. Study became the culture around these universities. Diving into Scripture became something every student did (because all universities were connected to cathedral churches or monasteries).

For hundreds of years, the universities grew in number and influence in the Church and the world. They became places of theological thought and began to guide the thinking of clergy and lay alike. But their reading was still laborious and far from personal as it still came through libraries housing hand-written volumes. Students didn't carry around their own personal books, for the most part; they would have to check them out, or read them in, the libraries.

Everything changed when Gutenberg printed his first Bible. More on why, next week.


