From Our Pastor

WOMAN, BEHOLD YOUR SON! BEHOLD YOUR MOTHER!

Those third words from Jesus on the cross come from the gospel of John, who is the only one of the four gospel writers to be a personal witness of Jesus' crucifixion, and indeed this word is spoken to him. "When Jesus saw His mother, and the disciple whom He loved standing near, he said to His mother, 'Woman, behold, your son!' Then, He said to the disciple, 'Behold your mother!" And from that hour the disciple took her into his home" (John 19:26-27).


I admit, I have to stop myself. There is so much subtext in those two verses. There's so much to unpack from a scholarly perspective in social customs and in theological richness. And although I get extremely excited about such things, I don't want this to a be a dry read for you. So I will rein in my bible geekery a bit to be your pastor.;)

First we have to acknowledge that Mary was present for Jesus' crucifixion. I know in Catholic iconography we take for granted her presence, and we couldn't really imagine a crucifixion scene without Mary. But let the gravity of that reality sink in. A mother watches her only son, a son whom she knows is divine, whom she knows is the Messiah, the one spoken of and hoped for by generations of her people. She sees the crown of thorns on his head, the blood it draws blurring his vision. She sees the nails in his hands, the scourged back, his body laid bare in shame before all of Jerusalem; the same body she bathed when he

For Catholics there has been much discussion and debate about moral and ethical questions around the development of the Covid vaccines regarding their use of morally compromised cell lines created from two abortions that occurred, one in the 1970s and one in the 1980s.

The Archdiocese of New Orleans, in light of guidance from the Vatican, the U.S. Bishops, and The National Catholic Bioethics Center affirm that though there was some lab testing that utilized the abortion-derived cell line, the two vaccines currently available from Moderna and Pfizer do not rely on cell lines from abortions in the manufacturing process and therefore can be morally acceptable for Catholics as the connection to abortion is extremely remote.

It is under the same guidance that the archdiocese must instruct Catholics that the latest vaccine from Janssen/Johnson & Johnson is morally compromised as it uses the abortion-derived cell line in development and production of the vaccine as well as the testing.

We maintain that the decision to receive the COVID-19 vaccine remains one of individual conscience in consultation with one's healthcare provider... In doing so, we advise that if the Moderna or Pfizer vaccine is available, Catholics should choose to receive either of those vaccines rather than the new Johnson & Johnson vaccine because of its extensive use of abortion-derived cell lines.

was a child; the body she bore in her womb for nine months. The prophecy of Simeon in the gospel of Luke, "a sword will pierce your own soul" (Luke 2:35), comes to fulfillment. Many cannot bear such suffering, so deep and multitudinous as it was; they would have collapsed under the weight. There Mary stands before her crucified son, not daring to leave his side as a caring mother and faithful disciple, as a lover of his human nature, which she bore, and his divine nature, which she adored.

Then you have John, the beloved disciple. His best friends abandoned him as he followed Jesus through his passion. Peter went with him as far as the outside gate of the house of the high priest, where he left dejected having thrice betrayed Jesus with his words. John had spent three years with these men following Jesus, eating with him, watching perform miracles, spending every day together. The apostles abandoned Jesus along with John, who followed his Lord all the way to Calvary, faithful in good times and in bad. John stood before the crucified Christ as the one who loved Jesus unto the end.

Both Mary and John persevere in the midst of great personal suffering to be present with Jesus at his place of seeming abandonment. This also is witness for us. There are certainly times when God calls us to be of support or to suffer with a family member or friend or even stranger when we ourselves are suffering. Such an act is an act of great charity, where we surrender our own ego for the sake of another.

Jesus knows they are both suffering. Despite his own severe suffering he sees them, and he loves them. He entrusts them to each other, they who know how to suffer well, who love deeply, who maintain great hope. We can't imagine that Christ would be thinking of us when he hung there upon the cross, but he did. He knew our experience of abandonment, those who have forgotten us or the world which tosses aside as quickly as it elevates. He knew our suffering and did not leave us alone. He gave us the Church, just as he gave John and Mary to each other in mutual care. We have the Church. Our faith is not supposed to be lived alone but in community, nor are we asked to suffer alone. The Church community is the place where we can suffer in community, to be reminded of God's presence by fellow parishioners. To stand with our fellow Christians in living and in dying.

REASONS SOME PEOPLE AVOID CONFESSION

- 1. It's embarrassing! I struggle with the same sins over and over. We all do; even the priest himself does. The Sacrament isn't just for the forgiveness of past sins; we also receive grace to resist sin in the future.
- 2. I'm not sure what to confess, or even how to do it. It's been awhile. Holy Family, like many parishes, provides a guide for going to confession, and on the back you will find a good "examination of conscience" to help you discern your sins. Any priest is able and happy to help you.
- **3.** I don't need to tell my sins to anyone else, even a priest. I know God will forgive me if I ask Him.

When we sin, we damage our relationships with God and with others who are members of His people. Jesus Himself established confession as the ordinary way to ask for and receive absolution: from a priest, who represents both God and the community.

4. I did something so bad that I don't think God could ever forgive me. I'm afraid He's angry with me.

God Himself said, "Come, let us set things right... Though your sins be like scarlet, they may become white as snow." God positively <u>longs</u> for reconciliation and restoration with <u>you!</u>
