#### From Our Pastor:

SUNDAY IN THE LITURGICAL YEAR, part 1
Reflections on *DIES DOMINI:* Apostolic Letter of Pope St John Paul II on Keeping the Lord's Day Holy

"With its weekly recurrence, the Lord's Day is rooted in the most ancient tradition of the Church and is vitally important for the Christian. But there was another rhythm which soon established itself: *the annual liturgical cycle*. Human psychology in fact desires the celebration of anniversaries, associating the return of dates and seasons with the remembrance of past events. When these events are decisive in the life of a people, their celebration generally creates a festive atmosphere which breaks the monotony of daily routine.

Now, by God's design, the great saving events upon which the Church's life is founded were closely linked to the annual Jewish feasts of Passover and Pentecost, and were prophetically foreshadowed in them" (*DD*, 76).

In the liturgical year the Church, in Christ, wishes to sanctify and celebrate not just the glory of Easter every Sunday, but that every day has been imbued with the light and life of Christ.

This, as the Holy Father says, is foreshadowed in the feasts celebrated by the Jewish people as laid out in the Law in the twenty-third chapter of the book of Leviticus. It starts with the weekly celebration of the Sabbath. Then it outlines the six yearly celebrations in the Jewish calendar — a seventh would be added much later. Each feast was intended to help sanctify the Jewish people, leading them to a holy life. Scripture scholar Victor Hamilton explains it this way, "Part of living the holy life is, according to Leviticus 23, giving God control over one's time weekly and seasonally, orienting one's work around worship, not vice versa." With each of these seven feasts, work ceases so that celebration may be the sole focus of the Jewish people.

The first feast is Passover, the yearly remembrance of God's deliverance of Israel from slavery in Egypt through the sacrifice

and meal of an unblemished lamb.

The second, the Feast of First Fruits, was connected to the beginning of the harvest, wherein the first fruits are offered to God.

Next came the Feast of Weeks, which was always 50 days after the celebration of the Passover. As the Jews began to speak Greek it received a second name connected to the 50 days, *Pentecost*. This celebration was connected to the end of the harvest — as acts of thanksgiving and penance, loaves and sheep were offered to God. As time went by, Pentecost/Feast of Weeks took on additional significance as a celebration of Moses receiving the Law on Mount Sinai.

After that was the Feast of Trumpets (Rosh Hashanah), marking the Jewish new year by recalling the first day of creation. Trumpets were blasted in celebration.

Later in the same month was Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement. This was a day of penance as the people of God brought their sins to God to be forgiven.

The final celebration outlined in Leviticus 23 was the Feast of Tabernacles (or Booths), a seven-day celebration to close the agricultural year and prepare for the new one. People would build small huts outside their homes and spend the seven days in them in remembrance of the flight from Egypt.

When the Temple was restored and rededicated around 150 B.C., after the Greeks had desecrated it, a seventh feast was added as the candlesticks (the menorah) in the Temple were relit. This is the 8-day Festival of Lights, or Hanukkah.

Most of these celebrations were then incorporated into the life of the Church and celebrated in light of Christ. Passover became Easter; God chose to rededicate Pentecost by sending the Spirit on the Apostles on the same day. The Day of Atonement became Good Friday and Easter Sunday, where Christ takes upon Himself the sins of the people. The Feast of Booths' rituals of cleansing and water were incorporated into the Sunday liturgy and the sacramental life of the Church through baptism and the rites surrounding it. The Feast of Lights/Hanukkah, although around the time of Christmas, never formally entered the life of the Church. It usually falls around the time of the Immaculate Conception (wherein the new tabernacle of God was formed), but that liturgical celebration is under 200 years old. There is also Candlemas, the celebration of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple, which is February 2, when candles are traditionally blessed.

Next time, we'll dive deeper into how the celebration of the liturgical year sanctifies time.


