Holy Week fasting/abstinence

Good Friday is an obligatory day of abstinence from meat for Catholics from age 14 onward. It is also an obligatory day of fasting for Catholics ages 18-59. When fasting, a person is permitted one full meal. Two smaller meals are permit-

full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if needed for strength, but these together should not equal a full meal. Solid foods between meals are not permitted.

The obligation to observe these penitential days is a very important part of our spiritual life. One should seek to do more rather than less; fasting and abstinence should be considered a *minimal* response to God's call to penance and conversion of life.

From Our Pastor



HOLY WEEK 2023

With the celebration of the procession of palms and the Lord's Passion, we start this holiest week of the year. For many of you, this week is old hat. You've celebrated it for much of your life. More than any story in Scripture, you know the Last Supper, the Agony in the Garden, Judas' betrayal with a kiss, Peter's denial,

Jesus being condemned to death by jealous and cowardly men, the carrying of his cross, his crucifixion, and death, his burial, and three days later his rising from the dead. These are the central mysteries of our faith.

I invite you to look at them anew, to open your heart up to receive them, pray with them, and live them with deeper faith. We live in a world that has replaced love with a passing emotion and truth with the whims of the collective. Although some see love as sacrifice, most see it as merely the extension of desire, what the Greeks called *eros*, erotic love. This is indeed is an aspect of love; it is the flame that urges on the lover, but it is also, like fire, wild and unpredictable, and all-consuming of the very air we breathe. As we've heard Pope Benedict say in reflecting on his encyclical *God is Love*, *eros* must be grounded. It needs to be tempered and directed, just as fire can be. We use controlled fire to run our vehicles. A controlled fire purifies metal. It cooks our food. In the same way, *eros* needs boundaries to focus its energy toward its proper end.

When *eros* rules, lies and violence reign. Unchecked desire fills the lover with a divine power that's intoxicating, and desire becomes the controlling factor in the lover's life [the lover in this case is anyone who lives out of *eros* alone]. However, in order to continue to fulfill his desires, which only grow and never diminish, he sees the necessity to lie to get what he wants. Once lies are insufficient, he justifies violence, whether in word or deed. He must take to fulfill this desire. In that way, we see people like Harvey Weinstein, the executives of Enron, Jeffrey Dahmer, but in subtler ways, the Kardashians, Elon Musk, and even closer to home, Edwin Edwards. All left truth behind, caught in the cycle of destructive *eros*.

The force which grounds our *eros* and tempers it is suffering. I don't mean suffering in general, but rather suffering for the sake of the other. This is the witness of Christ, the world's greatest lover; he willingly chose to suffer not just for one, or many, but for all. his love then brought about the salvation of the whole world.

Our weapon against the unchecked desires of this world is to love as Christ loves. To willingly suffer for the sake of the other. To surrender our own desires, for the good of another. This starts in our own home, with small acts of selflessness, just because. It grows from there.

So much food for prayer and reflection during Holy Week

So much happens during Holy Week; the mysteries of our faith are set before us. This week tells the central story of what we believe.

Take time to read, listen to, reflect on, soak in the Scriptures! On Palm Sunday this year we hear Matthew's Passion account; it is found in chapters 26-27. The other readings for today are Isaiah 50:4-7, Psalm 22:8-9,17-24, and Philippians 2:6-11.

On Good Friday every year, we hear the Passion according to John. See the list of readings on p. 4 for the Scriptures of Good Friday and the rest of this most Holy Week.



The fascinating history of the "We adore you, O Christ" prayer from the Stations of the Cross

While St Francis is well-known for his love of the poor and most vulnerable of society, he also had an intense love of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. In his *Letter to All the Friars*, St Francis gave the following exhortation that clearly displays his passion:

"Let the entire man be seized with fear; let the whole world tremble; let heaven exult when Christ, the Son of the Living God, is on the altar in the hands of the priest. O admirable height and stupendous condescension! O humble sublimity! O sublime humility! that the Lord of the universe, God and the Son of God, so humbles Himself that for our salvation he hides himself under a morsel of bread."

Whenever he caught sight of a Catholic church in the distance, St Francis was known to kneel down and give praise to God. Often he would say the following words that he passed on to his friars:

"We adore you, O Lord Jesus Christ, in this church and all the churches of the world, and we bless you, because by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world. Amen."

This little prayer was used by Franciscans for many centuries. Over time it was adapted to become a "standard" prayer in the popular devotion known as the Stations of the Cross. Franciscans were instrumental in spreading this

devotion throughout Europe and the United States, so it should come as no surprise that his prayer has become the main prayer for the devotion.

Typically the prayer is shortened to say, "We adore you, O Christ, and we bless you, because, by your holy Cross you have redeemed the world." It is prayed at the beginning of each Station, usually while genuflecting.

Next time we pray the Stations of the Cross, may St Francis' passionate love of Jesus inspire us!
