

Wedding Feast at Cana

Today, we reflect on one of the most beautiful moments in the Gospels, the Wedding Feast at Cana (John 2:1-11). This event offers profound insights into God's love, Mary's role, and the sanctity of marriage.

At a joyous wedding celebration, a crisis arises: the wine has run out. Mary, the mother of Jesus, notices the need and brings it to her Son, saying, "They have no wine." Her compassionate heart and trust in Jesus' divine power lead to His first public, miracle turning water into



wine. This act is not merely practical but a sign of the new covenant of abundance, joy, and grace.


This story underscores marriage as a sacred institution, blessed by God. By performing His first miracle at a wedding, Jesus highlights marriage's significance in His divine plan. Additionally, Mary's instruction, "Do whatever He tells you," remains a guiding principle for all Christians. The abundance of wine also reminds us of God's generous grace, far exceeding our expectations.

In moments when the "wine" runs out in our lives, when strength, joy, or resources seem lacking, let us trust that Jesus can transform our emptiness into abundance. May we honor marriage, seek Mary's intercession, and rely on God's grace to sustain us.

Let us carry the lessons of Cana into our daily lives and reflect on how we, too, can respond to God's call with faith and trust.

Ordinary Time: more than meets the eye

Advent has wreaths, candles, reflective music—all of which culminate in Christmas with its own icons: lights, gifts, carols, the crèche. Lent has ashes, fasting, Way of the Cross—and Easter: the Resurrection, lilies, Alleluias, and triumphant hymns. It's easier to be engaged with our faith during the High Holy Days. But Ordinary Time? It's just so ... ordinary.

It's reasonable to assume that Ordinary Time got its name because it is "ordinary" or non-exceptional, but that's not the case. Ordinary Time means ordered or numbered time; it's derived from "ordinal" numbers (first, second, third, etc.) as opposed to "cardinal" numbers (one, two, three). Beginning on the Monday after the Baptism of Our Lord (with which we concluded the Christmas season last Sunday), it is counted sequentially until Lent. On the Monday after Pentecost, the count resumes where it left off and goes until the end of the liturgical year. Then the cycle starts over with the First Sunday of Advent.

So how do we stay involved and engaged when the Sundays seem to run together? Here are some ideas:

KEEP THE SABBATH Create family rituals that make Sunday a special day to anticipate. These don't have to be elaborate. Stop at the donut shop on the way home from Mass and let each child pick one — voilà, a new "tradition." Return to the tradition of a sit-down family dinner on Sundays, even if you're eating Popeye's. Read aloud, or listen to an audiobook. Just find something your family enjoys and save that activity for the Sabbath, making it special above the other days of the week.

READ SOMETHING WITH VALUE Have you ever read *The Confessions* by St Augustine? *Introduction to the Devout Life* by St Francis de Sales? *Father Elijah* by Michael O'Brien? While the Church is not preparing for a major feast, we can read what others have written about God, faith, and the meaning of life. Reading morally and intellectually engaging literature is one of the best ways to keep our faith vital and vibrant. Need some recommendations? Fr Kyle's your man.

KEEP A GRATITUDE JOURNAL It's a proven fact that people who "count their blessings" are happier than those who don't. During Ordinary Time, using a notebook and dedicated pen, write at least three things you are thankful for each day. Notice the tangible, practical ways God shows His providence. They don't have to have wow-factor; "I really enjoyed my hot cup of tea this morning" suffices. As the days go by, our eyes are opened to God continually showering abundance on us. We find daily joy in seeing what new gift He has for us that day. Life-changing things don't need to be big. Often they are as simple as a record of our blessings to look back on in times of difficulty.

Ordinary Time is ordinary only if we think of it that way! Rather than as long boring stretches between the "good stuff," if we think of these weeks as a time to refocus our energies on our spiritual growth (represent-ed by its liturgical color, green), it can be a refreshing time of year.
