JULY – Month of the Most Precious Blood

In commissioning the 72 to go and proclaim the kingdom of God, Jesus instructs them to focus on the mission at hand. Forget about carrying money and other belongings, greeting passers-by on the way, or worrying about food and lodging—all of this could easily take up their mental and physical energy, as it does for most of us every day. For us as well, it is all too easy to go about our lives pursuing our essential comforts, letting our chores and quotidian tasks take over our lives. Jesus assures the 72 that these essentials will be provided for, freeing these Apostles up to focus on proclaiming the kingdom. In the same way, this passage reminds us in the midst of our busyness to open ourselves up to the greater eternal reality of which we are a part.

FIRST READING (Isaiah 66:10-14c) Isaiah speaks of the great joy that will be experienced by all as the Lord restores Jerusalem after the devastation of the Babylonian Exile. Using rich mother metaphors, God will restore Jerusalem from a barren, sorrowful, mournful mother to a fertile, prosperous, loving and ever-comforting one. The starving, desolated people will once again nurse from her abundant breasts, will exult over the abundance of water and wealth and will experience the fondling, comfort, tenderness and care that a loving mother showers on her nurslings. As a mother comforts, loves and dotes on her child, so will God do for us. The power of the Lord will be evident to all, with joy and abundant life as its unimaginable manifestation.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 66:1-3, 4-5, 6-7, 16, 20) Today's antiphon echoes the theme of joy. Not only Jerusalem, but all the earth is called to rejoice in the marvelous works of the Lord. For the Jews, the return from Babylon was like a second Exodus (note the reference to the Exodus in the third stanza). In the experience of God's wonderful deeds on their behalf, Israel can only break forth in praise.

SECOND READING (Galatians 6:14-18) Paul asserts that the only thing any disciple can boast in is the Cross of Christ, the most degrading of deaths transformed into the ultimate symbol of God's gracious love for all. As disciples, we too are called manifest God's gracious love to all, no matter the cost. Whether circumcised or uncircumcised, Jew or Gentile, all are new creations in the Lord, who broke down any and all boundaries that divide us. Paul asserts that as disciples we all bear the marks of Jesus as we willingly give of ourselves in service of others. All this is God's doing through the grace given to us in Christ.

In his concluding words to the Galatians, Paul reiterates that salvation is not a question of circumcision or uncircumcision, but of faith in Jesus Christ. Paul focuses in particular on the cross of our salvation. In Baptism, we are crucified with Christ. We are marked with his wounds, which are for us the source of true and everlasting.

GOSPEL (Luke 10:1-12, 17-20 or 10:1-9) Jesus appoints 72 disciples and commissions them to go ahead of him to spread the word concerning God's reign. They are being sent as workers to a rich harvest that God has cultivated. However, they are also warned that such harvesting will involve dangers and challenges, concretized in the image of being sent out "like lambs among wolves." They will experience rejection and opposition. Jesus instructs them as to their behavior on such a mission, and insists that no matter what they encounter, they are to trust in God who will protect and care for them. They return rejoicing at the great work that they were able to accomplish in God's name, as Jesus proclaims that with God's reign, Satan is defeated and his disciples have their names recorded in heaven.

Jesus sends some of his followers out to proclaim the Good News of the kingdom of God which is at hand, to bring peace and to heal. In fulfilling their ministry, they must be totally dependent on the Lord and on the hospitality they receive from others. They must trust that the Lord will provide for them. The theme of joy heard in the longer form of the Gospel is a link with today's First Reading. The source of their joy must be rooted in the Lord—it is his power at work in them, not their own. It is not success in their mission that is of utmost importance, but rather, their own faith and commitment to the Lord.



Are you interested in becoming Catholic?

Do you know anyone who is interested in becoming Catholic, perhaps a friend, or even a spouse?

Are you a baptized Catholic, but never received the sacraments of Confirmation or Eucharist?

Are you interested in learning more about the Catholic Faith?

If you can answer "yes" to any of these questions, you should come to the RCIA inquiry sessions on August 11th and 18th from 9:30—10:15am (between the Sunday morning Masses) in the Conference Room. At the inquiry sessions, you will have the opportunity to ask questions and talk with Fr. Patrick Hirtz about the RCIA process.

For those interested in participating in RCIA, classes will meet weekly from 6:30-8:00 p.m., beginning in September. The day of the week is yet to be determined. Babysitting will be available. Meetings include witness stories, instruction, discussion and fellowship. The RCIA information packet can be found on the bookcase shelves in the foyer and on the website.

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby's birth.
Confirmation - Confirmation is celebrated in the spring with students who are at least in the 8th grade and have completed the requirements for the preparation process in our PRE program.

Matrimony - Couples planning to marry should contact the Pastor at least 5 months prior to the proposed date so all parish and diocesan requirements may be completed.

Holy Orders - If you feel called to a vocation in the priesthood or religious life, please contact the pastor.

Anointing of the Sick - If you wish to receive this sacrament, contact the pastor. If there is an emergency situation, an immediate family member should contact the pastor.

Nursery

The nursery is located in the classroom next to the kitchen in the parish hall. The nursery is open to children birth to 4 years.

We will only do this with the permission of the sick person or a member of his/her family.
