

The Black Face Masks

From the Office of the Bishop: The Shelby County Health Department says it has stopped distributing the black, knitted face masks made by the sock company, Renfro Corp. over concerns about a chemical that was being applied to them. The health department says, the masks were treated with a chemical called Silvadur, an anti-microbial agent that prevents the growth of odor-causing bacteria. “Until more information is made available about Silvadur and its application to the masks, SCHD has stopped all distribution of the masks and is asking partnering agencies to also stop distributing them,” the agency said. If you have one of the masks, you’re encouraged to stop using it and get a new one. You can also use a bandana or scarf if needed.

June 7th The Most Holy Trinity The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, observed on the Sunday after Pentecost, dates to the 7th century; it has been on the Church's universal calendar for nearly 700 years. "The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life," the Catechism tell us. "It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 234). As Christians, we believe in one God in three Persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Through the centuries, saints and artists have helped us to understand the Holy Trinity through images and comparisons. St. Patrick is said to have explained the Trinity to the people of Ireland by showing them a shamrock, with its three leaves on one stem. St. Ignatius Loyola compared the Trinity to a chord played on an instrument: three distinct notes forming one sound. The early iconographers of the Church in the East depicted the Trinity with imagery from the Old Testament story of Abraham's angelic visitors. A familiar symbol of the Trinity is a triangle with rays radiating from it, and in the middle of the triangle an open eye, representing the all-seeing Providence of God.

This feast, which falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost (the 50th day after Easter), should make us mindful that actually every Sunday is devoted to the honor of the Most Holy Trinity, that every Sunday is sanctified and consecrated to the triune God. Sunday after Sunday we should recall in a spirit of gratitude the gifts which the Blessed Trinity is bestowing upon us. The Father created and predestined us; on the first day of the week He began the work of creation. The Son redeemed us; Sunday is the "Day of the Lord," the day of His resurrection. The Holy Spirit sanctified us, made us His temple; on Sunday the Holy Spirit descended upon the infant Church. Sunday, therefore, is the day of the Most Holy Trinity.

Today, on Trinity Sunday, we celebrate the divine qualities that have been revealed about our Triune God: mercy, fidelity, love, grace and fellowship.

June 11th Memorial of St. Barnabas Even though St. Barnabas (1st century) was not one of the original Twelve Apostles, he was given the title of "apostle" by St. Luke and the early Church fathers due to his apostolic endeavors on behalf of Christianity. His original name was Joseph, but the Apostles gave him the surname Barnabas, meaning "son of encouragement." Together with St. Paul, he extended the missionary efforts of the Church beyond Jerusalem to Antioch, and after much success moved on to other places throughout Asia Minor. After parting ways with St. Paul over issues regarding circumcision and the Mosaic law, St. Barnabas embarked on further missionary journeys with John and Mark (Acts of the Apostles

June 13th Memorial of St. Anthony of Padua (1195-1231), a member of a noble Portuguese family, joined the Canons Regular of St. Augustine at a young age, but later joined the Franciscans to engage in missionary work. Although his missionary dreams were halted due to illness, he received public acclaim for his preaching style, which led to the conversion of many from heresy, earning him the title "the Hammer of the Heretics." He had the privilege of meeting St. Francis of Assisi in person and was later elected provincial of Northern Italy. His writing is extensive, especially in the area of sermons; therefore, he was named a Doctor of the Church. People invoke his name when trying to find lost items. This comes from the story in the saint's biography when a young novice took Anthony's Psalter, but returned it in a hurry when the angry saint appeared to him in a vision!

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby's birth.

Confirmation - is celebrated with students who are at least in the 8th grade and have completed the requirements for the preparation process in our PRE program.

Matrimony - Couples planning to marry should contact the Pastor at least 6 months prior to the proposed date so all parish and diocesan requirements may be completed.

JUNE – Month of the Sacred Heart

Today’s solemnity commemorates the central dogma of Christianity: the Trinity. One of the greatest gifts of the Christian faith is the dogma of the triune God: God is three (tri) in one (une). The Christian God—Father, Son and Holy Spirit—is relational. How amazing and wonderfully mysterious at the same time!

FIRST READING (Ex 34:4b-6, 8-9) Moses has begged to see the glory of God, and God grants his request. On Mount Sinai, God proclaims his name, and lets Moses glimpse his glory as he passes by. But must revealing of all is what God cries out about who God is: (verse 6) “The Lord, a merciful and gracious God, / slow to anger and rich in kindness and fidelity.” It is a text that recurs several times in the Old Testament. This is how the Israelites remembered and loved God. It is how God promised to be for them in covenant fidelity. This solemnity does not explain God, but gives us a glimpse of God as a community of love and a fountain of mercy.


CANTICLE (Daniel 3:52, 53, 54, 55) Today’s text comes from the Book of Daniel and the song of the three young men cast by Nebuchadnezzar into the fiery furnace. It is a long hymn, sung by Azariah and his companions from the midst of the fiery furnace where they had been thrown in punishment but stood unharmed. Azariah praises God enthroned in glory in the heavenly Temple but who nevertheless looks into the depths, even into the fiery furnace where Azariah and his companions have been cast. The canticle expresses God’s sublimity, transcendence, and omniscience.

SECOND READING (2 Cor 13:11-13) The simple words of St. Paul to the Corinthians come in sharp contrast to the splendid imagery of the first two readings. God does not confine himself to a throne, high above the cherubim: wherever his people live in peace, reforming their lives, encouraging and supporting each other, God dwells there also.

Relationships within the community of believers are to be characterized by joy, loving concern for others, uprightness, unity and peace. For such are the characteristics of God, and so must we be, in God’s image. The last sentence in this passage is a clear expression of the Triune God, and one that is echoed almost verbatim in the greeting at the beginning of Mass.

GOSPEL (John 3:16-18) In these famous words from John, we meet the same God of overflowing love that Moses encountered on Mount Sinai in today’s First Reading. We hear Jesus’s revelation of God’s love for the world, so great that he sent his Son that all might have eternal life through their faith in him. This reading is full of contrasts: perish/live, condemn/save, disbelieve/believe. Notice that the word “believe” occurs four times in three verses. Our passage is not about God’s revelation, but about human faith. Jesus relates to God as Father, source of life. So is our relationship, our life, through faith. God’s will is always for our life and salvation, and Jesus comes to be savior, not judge. Through faith, we enter into this relationship of love. The third person of the Trinity, the Holy Spirit, is not explicitly mentioned, yet we know that it is through the Holy Spirit that we come to faith in God.

REFLECTION The impossibility of fully understanding God is shared today: God as Parent, God as Child, God as Spirit. Knowing God, in all his ways, is vital to living the message that was given. Which aspect of God’s nature allows you to speak God’s name so others believe? While all natures are vital, our prayer and spirituality is influenced deeply by the Divine nature that makes most sense to us. Uncover your answer and then be bold enough to seek out conversation with faith-filled friends and ask them their thoughts too; in doing so you share the Gospel.
