Oct 30th Vesper Service for the Beatification of Fr. Michael J. McGivney

Fr. Patrick will celebrate a Vesper Service of Beatification on Friday, October 30th at 6:00pm for The Venerable Servant of God, Fr. Michael J. McGivney. He is the founder of the Knights of Columbus and will be beatified during a special Mass on October 31 at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in the Archdiocese of Hartford, CT. On May 27th, the Vatican announced that Pope Francis, who met with the board of directors of the Knights of Columbus in February, had signed the decree recognizing a miracle through the intercession of McGivney, clearing the way for his beatification. Once he is beatified, he will be given the title "Blessed." The miracle recognized by the Vatican occurred in 2015 and involved an U.S. baby, still in utero, with a life-threatening condition. That baby, Mikey Schachle, is now 5. His parents, Dan and Michelle Schachle, of Dickson, TN, prayed to McGivney to intercede with God to save their son, still in his mother's womb, who was given no hope of surviving a life-threatening case of fetal hydrops. McGivney (1852-1890), the son of Irish immigrants, was born in Waterbury, CT, and was ordained a priest in 1877 for what is now the Archdiocese of Hartford. He founded the Knights of Columbus at St. Mary's Parish in New Haven, CT, in 1882. He originally started the Knights as a service organization to help widows and orphans. At the time, McGivney was an assistant pastor at St. Mary's Parish. He is buried in New Haven. The fraternal order for Catholic men has become the largest lay Catholic organization in the world with 2 million members and sponsors a wide range of educational, charitable and religious activities. McGivney, who will be the first American parish priest to be beatified has long been a hero of working-class Catholics. He died of pneumonia complications at age 38 in 1890, it was during an outbreak of influenza known as the Russian flu in Thomaston, CT. The initial work on his sainthood cause began in 1982 on the Knights' centenary. His cause was formally opened in Hartford in 1997, and he was given the title "servant of God." In March 2008, the Catholic Church recognized the priest heroically lived the Christian virtues, so he was given the title "venerable." Generally, two miracles attributed to the candidate's intercession are required for sainthood — one for beatification and the second for canonization.

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby's birth.

Confirmation - is celebrated with students who are at least in the 8th grade and have completed the requirements for the preparation process in our PRE program.

Matrimony - Couples planning to marry should contact the Pastor at least 6 months prior to the proposed date so all parish and diocesan requirements may be completed.

Holy Orders - If you feel called to a vocation in the priesthood or religious life, please contact the pastor.

Anointing of the Sick - If you wish to receive this sacrament, contact the pastor. If there is an emergency situation, an immediate family member should contact the pastor.

OCTOBER – Month of the Holy Rosary

FIRST READING (Isaiah 45:1, 4-6) The Lord calls Cyrus as king to lead his people. Together, they will subdue nations and kings will fall in their presence. They will defeat Babylon. Through the actions of Cyrus, people will know he is the Lord's chosen and that the Lord is God. There are no other gods for people to worship who will protect and safeguard them as the Lord does.

The Cyrus mentioned in today's First Reading was the Persian king who conquered the Babylonians and allowed the Jewish people to return to their land and rebuild the Temple. Accordingly, Isaiah looks upon him as God's chosen or anointed one regardless of whether he knows Israel's God or not. God's power is at work for his people in and through Cyrus, accomplishing his plan of salvation.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 96:1, 3, 4-5, 7-8, 9-10) Psalm 96 is a song of praise. Everyone is invited to join the chorus, praising the Lord and telling of the Lord's glory. The psalm coincides with the First Reading. The author attests that the gods of the nations no longer exist. As we draw closer to the solemnity of Christ the King, we name the Lord as King and join in worship.

This psalm of praise acclaims the mighty acts of the Lord; in the context of today's liturgy, specifically those accomplished through Cyrus. Note the reference to the nations or Gentiles in each stanza. The Persians are among them.

SECOND READING (1 Thess 1:1-5b) Our Second Reading on the next five Sundays before the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, are taken from Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, the earliest of his letters. Today's reading is Paul's greeting to the church at Thessalonica. The triad of faith, hope, and love appears in the thanksgiving. The hope that Paul preaches is the hope Christians have of sharing in Christ's Resurrection when he comes again in glory. In the interim, Paul encourages the Thessalonians, and we who live in hope today, to continue in their work of faith, living and spreading the Gospel in the Holy Spirit.

As is typical of the structure of a letter in Paul's time, we have first, the identification of the sender and second, the one to whom it is addressed. Paul begins every letter but one with a prayer of thanksgiving for the community to whom he is writing. The Thessalonians are commended for their faith in action and their endurance in hope. The Gospel Paul proclaimed to them was not merely a matter of notional assent to doctrine, but power at work in daily life.

GOSPEL (Matt 22:15-21) The Pharisees, angered by Jesus' teaching in the previous parables, go off and plot against Jesus. They crave to trap him in his own teaching to discount his authority. Unwilling to approach Jesus themselves, the Pharisees send their disciples to ask him about the legality of paying tax to Caesar. Jesus calls the bluff of the hypocrites by simply asking to see the Roman coin and having them identify the image on the coin. What is obvious to many, but not the Pharisees and their disciples, Jesus teaches: Caesar's is Caesar's and God's is God's.

The conflict between Jesus and the Jewish religious leaders continues to mount. In today's text, they try to "set up" an opposition between obedience to civil law and covenant fidelity, thus requiring Jesus to make a choice between them. Jesus sees their ruse and affirms the just claim of both: "...repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God."

REFLECTION Active listening is a skill that is taught to those in counseling and ministerial positions with the purpose being to always fully hear the person speaking and from where they are coming. Jesus was an active listener—knowing he was always being tested, the intention of the questions, and then how to respond so as to answer their question and not fall into their trap. Masterfully Jesus shows us how to listen, receive and shake off planned verbal attacks with ease. Learn about active listening and find ways to practice and then enact this skill with those who communicate with you.
