All Souls Remembrance Envelope On the day after All Saints comes All Souls' Day – Commemoration of the Faithfully Departed, in which the Church prays for all who have died. On All Souls' Day, we pray for our deceased loved ones, trusting that God will hear and answer our prayers that they know eternal light, happiness, and peace. **This year All Souls' Day is Monday, November 2nd.** Holy Angels would like to remember your departed loved ones through prayer and reflection during our All Souls Masses. Please use the special All Souls Remembrance Envelope that can be found in your envelope packet or use one provided by the church that can be found at the canopy entrance. List those loved ones you want remembered and drop it in the collection basket. A list of names will be compiled and placed in the Book of Holy Souls. May they be at peace, knowing that they will rest in God's arms for all eternity.

Oct 30th Vesper Service for the Beatification of Fr. Michael J. McGivney
Fr. Patrick will celebrate a Vesper Service of Beatification on Friday, October 30th at 6:00pm for The Venerable Servant of God, Fr. Michael J. McGivney. He is the founder of the Knights of Columbus and will be beatified during a special Mass on October 31 at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in the Archdiocese of Hartford, CT. On May 27th, the Vatican announced that Pope Francis had signed the decree recognizing a miracle through the intercession of McGivney, clearing the way for his beatification. Once he is beatified, he will be given the title "Blessed." The miracle recognized by the Vatican occurred in 2015 and involved an U.S. baby, still in utero, with a life-threatening condition. That baby, Mikey Schachle, is now 5. His parents, Dan and Michelle Schachle, of Dickson, TN, prayed to McGivney to intercede with God to save their son, still in his mother's womb, who was given no hope of surviving a life-threatening case of fetal hydrops. McGivney (1852-1890), the son of Irish immigrants, was born in Waterbury, CT, and was ordained a priest in 1877 for what is now the Archdiocese of Hartford. He founded the Knights of Columbus at St. Mary's Parish in New Haven, CT, in 1882. He originally started the Knights as a service organization to help widows and orphans. At the time, McGivney was an assistant pastor at St. Mary's Parish. He is buried in New Haven. The fraternal order for Catholic men has become the largest lay Catholic organization in the world with 2 million members and sponsors a wide range of educational, charitable and religious activities. McGivney, who will be the first American parish priest to be beatified has long been a hero of working-class Catholics. He died of pneumonia complications at age 38 in 1890, it was during an outbreak of influenza known as the Russian flu in Thomaston, CT. The initial work on his sainthood cause began in 1982 on the Knights' centenary. His cause was formally opened in Hartford in 1997, and he was given the title "servant of God." In March 2008, the Catholic Church recognized the priest heroically lived the Christian virtues, so he was given the title "venerable." Generally, two miracles attributed to the candidate's intercession are required for

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby's birth.

OCTOBER – Month of the Holy Rosary

FIRST READING (Exodus 22:20-26) Today's First Reading is from a section in Exodus that explains some of the prescribed social norms. In the first half of the reading, the Lord teaches we must not wrong the widow and orphan, among those considered the least in society. If we do harm them, we will face the Lord's wrath. The second half of the reading addresses the practices of borrowing money and taking a neighbor's cloak as a pledge. Neither charging interest nor failing to return to the cloak before sunset is acceptable. Should our sinful practices lead others to call out, God will respond with compassion.

A very rich wisdom underlies these words of the Lord commanding Israel to show care and concern for the poor and needy. For God in effect, says to Israel: remember, this was once your lot when you were enslaved in Egypt. Indeed, it was because of God's compassion for Israel when they cried out in their slavery that there was deliverance. So will God hear the cries of the poor in every age and place?

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 18:2-3, 3-4, 47, 51) This is a thanksgiving song attributed to David. It is also found in 2 Samuel 22:2-51, with a few minor differences. The psalm expresses thanks for God's help in the time of need. God is our Rock, keeping us safe from our enemies as God did for David and Israel. For this, all we can do is express our love of the Lord as we do in the refrain.

It is only the one who has experienced his or her own weakness and powerlessness that can truly experience the Lord's strength. Psalm 18 is a beautiful prayer of thanksgiving from one who has known the Lord's saving power and deliverance.

SECOND READING (1 Thess 1:5c-10) Our reading of 1 Thessalonians is continuous from where last Sunday's Second Reading concluded. Paul expresses his gratitude for the faith of the Thessalonians even in the face of persecution. He mentions how the Thessalonians have imitated himself, Silvanus and Timothy in their reception of the word and also how they have imitated the Lord. Their perseverance in faith is a model for others for they have turned to Christ from idols and now await his return. Can the same be said of us?

GOSPEL (Matt 22:34-40) The Pharisees are persistent. Last Sunday, Jesus' response to the disciples' questions about the Roman coin, thwarted their scheme. This Sunday's Gospel begins by noting that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees. Previous to this, Jesus had responded to the Sadducees manipulative question about the resurrection by showing them that the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob is the God of the living. In the third series of questions, the Pharisees inquire of Jesus about the greatest commandment. Jesus knows the law better than they do. Love of God and love of neighbor compose the two commandments.

Although the opening line of today's Gospel points to a situation of conflict and challenge, the wisdom of Jesus' answer quickly silences his opponents. *All* of God's teaching; *all* of God's commandments—can be summarized in two ideas: to love God with one's whole being, and also, to love one's neighbor as oneself. Notice that this second commandment is equal to the first.

REFLECTION If you are to love your neighbor as yourself, consider some small random act of kindness and do this for another. Pay some portion toward the bill of the person in line behind you. Water your neighbor's grass (probably while doing your own). In small delights, great changes are made to one's frame of mind. Next, consider the questions you ask. Are you seeking to silence a person or to affirm their opinion? In respecting the gifts of the person in your presence, you allow the dignity God places in each person to be honored and therefore learn to love God more in the life created.
