

July 26th — Memorial of Sts. Joachim and Anne, Parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary

The story of the conception of Mary echoes that of Samuel (1 Samuel 1:20): Joachim and Anne are a childless couple who pray to have children and promise to dedicate their child to God. Each is told by an angel that they will conceive, and afterward they meet at a gate in Jerusalem and embrace in joy. This event has been depicted in art by artists such as Dürer and Giotto. According to tradition, Mary spent her life at the Temple from the time she was a little girl. Her parents presented their young daughter to the Temple for service and study, in thanksgiving for the great gift God had given them through her. The memorial helps us think about the ways we prepare ourselves for Jesus Christ to be born into our lives.

July 28th — Scriptural Rosary The Scriptural Rosary will be recited on Wednesday, July 28th at 5:45pm in the Church. We will recite the Glorious Mysteries this week.

July 29th — Memorial of St. Martha St. Martha was the sister of Lazarus and Mary. She seems to have organized the dinner in Luke 10:38-42, and she protests when Jesus commands that the stone be rolled from the entrance to her brother's tomb after he'd been dead for three days. She is one of the few in the Gospel to profess her faith in Jesus as the Messiah: "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world" (John 11:27). Martha, her sister, Mary, and brother, Lazarus, fled Judea after the death of Jesus and landed at Marseilles. She is supposed to have traveled to Avignon, where she converted many to Christianity. St. Martha is shown in art bearing the tools of a housekeeper—keys or a broom—and is a patron saint of domestic servants, homemakers, cooks, and single laywomen.

Oct 8-9 — Eucharistic Congress / Sign-Up Today As part of our 50th Anniversary, our Diocese will hold its first-ever "Eucharistic Congress" on October 8th, 6:00pm-9:00pm, and October 9th, 9:00am-6:00pm, at the Renasant Convention Center in downtown Memphis. A Eucharistic Congress is a gathering of thousands of clergy, religious, laity, communities, youth and others to celebrate and show devotion to our Lord's real presence in the Eucharist. All are invited! The two days of celebration and devotion are shown through Masses, speakers, discussions, confessions, adoration, music, youth and family activities and much more. It is a time of joy, fellowship, prayer and unity. A spiritual renewal with the Theme: That All May Be One (John 17:21)!

The first formal Eucharistic Congress was held in Lille, France, in 1881. Since that time there have been more than 40 international Eucharistic Congresses with two of those in the U.S. (Chicago in 1926 and Philadelphia in 1976). Pope St. John Paul II attended the 1976 Philadelphia Eucharistic Congress. There also have been numerous local Eucharistic Congresses in Dioceses throughout the world over the years. Our Eucharistic Congress, marking our 50th Anniversary as a Diocese across West Tennessee, is our first.

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby's birth.

Confirmation - is celebrated with students who are at least in the 8th grade and have completed the requirements for the preparation process in our PRE program.

Matrimony - Couples planning to marry should contact the Pastor at least 6 months prior to the proposed date so all parish and diocesan requirements may be completed.

Holy Orders - If you feel called to a vocation in the priesthood or religious life, please contact the pastor.

Anointing of the Sick - If you wish to receive this sacrament, contact the pastor. If there is an emergency situation, an immediate family member should contact the pastor.

God always provides. He always gives us what we need and brings abundance out of what seems to not be enough, at least to us. In today’s Gospel, Philip states the fact that two hundred days’ wages would not be enough to feed the crowd of five thousand. However, with Jesus, our almighty God, human limitations cease to be limitations. God uses the little we have, and he performs miracles to feed and nourish all of us in abundance.

FIRST READING (2 Kings 4:42-44) Elisha, prophetic successor to Elijah, miraculously feeds his people in a time of famine. Notice Elisha’s firm conviction that God would amply provide for the people with the meager provisions at hand. Ample, indeed! After they had eaten, there was some left over.

This incident takes place during a time of famine. When Elisha receives a gift of bread, he immediately gives it to a large crowd. Given the option of hoarding or solidarity, he shows us how to choose that which promises greater life.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 145:10-11, 15-16, 17-18) Psalm 145 invites the gratitude that God’s people should have in face of his providential care. The entire second stanza focuses on how God nourishes his people with food—most fitting in light of today’s First Reading. The last stanza reminds us that we have only to call on God and he will hear us.

As we pray “The hand of the Lord feeds us,” we need to be aware of how our own hands are often the ones God would use to help others.


SECOND READING (Ephesians 4:1-6) Paul speaks directly to the nature of the Christian vocation, spelling out for his readers not only what it is to which they are called, but also, and perhaps most importantly here, how they are to live in a “worthy” manner. The emphasis is on unity, with one occurring seven times in the space of six verses, not counting the synonymous word unity. Believers have a choice as to how they respond to others.

“Live in a manner worthy of the call you have received.” That might be the one command necessary for a Christian life. It reminds us that we are called by God and that, day by day, we must choose whether or not to accept the grace we are offered for the good of the whole.

GOSPEL (John 6:1-15) Today’s Gospel describes Jesus as Prophet—a title or description not commonly thought of, perhaps. He is one who speaks and acts in the name of God, as the sign of the miraculous feeding of the multitude attests. Several parallels can be found with the First Reading: the barley loaves, the objection by one of the followers, the abundance left over. Note the Eucharistic language: Jesus “took,” “gave thanks,” and “distributed” (John 6:11). Do we recognize our own Eucharistic celebrations as occasions of being fed by Jesus?

The “sign” of the bread includes great generosity and trust. The self-sacrificing generosity of the child who offered all his food prepared the way for everyone to share, not keeping or taking more than needed and offering the rest to the others. Today’s readings remind us that God’s generosity is often expressed through human hands.

REFLECTION There is an old expression, “If you want to get something done, ask a busy person.” Busy people and generous people often go hand in hand. The miracle of the loaves and fishes is about people sharing what they have and there being plenty left over. What are the needs of your parish? Do we need more ministers in specific areas? Have you asked clearly and honestly for what you need? God will provide—a few brave souls will come forward and pave the way. People tend to be extremely generous with their time and talent if they know what the needs are—communication is key.
