

Sept 14th — The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross Today's feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross began as a commemoration of a unique event: the miraculous finding of the True Cross by St. Helena, mother of the first Christian emperor, Constantine. Helena journeyed to the Holy Land to see the place of the Lord's Crucifixion. She found the spot, tore down a temple honoring the Greek goddess Aphrodite built a new basilica in honor of Christ. As they began to lay the foundation, the remains of three crosses were discovered, but they did not know which one was the true Cross. The Cross of Christ was eventually revealed when a dying woman was healed after touching one of the crosses. The cross is no longer a sign of torture but of triumph. It leads our processions and stands near the altar of Christ's sacrifice. A symbol of death overcame death because of the perfect obedience of Jesus, who freely accepted it. Jesus reigns from the cross. The basilica was completed, and the Church in both East and West observes this feast in honor of the Cross on the anniversary of dedication.

Sept 15th — The Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows Today, with the Church, we honor Mother Mary, Our Lady of Sorrows, the *Stabat Mater*, standing at the foot of the cross, participated in her Son's work of redemption by uniting her pain and sorrows to those of Jesus, thus offering her life as a spiritual sacrifice to the Lord. Today, we look to her as an example of how to suffer well, and we ask her to pray for us and offer us her motherly comfort and support.

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby's birth.

SEPTEMBER – Month of Our Lady of Sorrows

In our world today, people have many different ideas of who Jesus is. In today's Gospel, Peter responds correctly as he identifies Jesus as the Messiah, the one anointed by God and prepared for throughout all the ages. However, Jesus then teaches that in order to bring about salvation and freedom, the Messiah must suffer, die and rise again. Jesus illuminates and deepens our understanding of the mystery of who God really is.

In this section of the Gospel according to Mark, Jesus tries to teach the disciples that their concept of the Messiah is not his. If they wish to follow Jesus, there will be suffering and the Cross. We are all very comfortable with the powerful, risen Christ. The suffering one who died because of the way he lived is harder to embrace.

FIRST READING (Isaiah 20:4c-9a) This testimony of the Lord's servant acknowledges that the word he speaks is the one he first heard from the Lord. For him, God's word was a call to embrace a way of suffering. At the same time, it was a word or promise of God's help and deliverance.

In today's reading, Isaiah describes the servant of God as one who is willing to undergo torment. The servant expresses nothing but gratitude and recognizes God as the one who opens his ears, who keeps him from disgrace and from being proven wrong.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 116:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9) Today's Psalm is the prayer of one who experiences God's deliverance from the snares of death and the joy of walking before God in the land of the living.

Psalm 116 follows the song of the servant in beautiful harmony. Whereas the servant proclaimed that God had opened his ear, we are invited to join the psalmist in singing the praise of the God who gives ear to our cries.

SECOND READING (James 2:14-18) Faith must be given expression in good works, particularly toward those in need. James insists that genuine faith in Christ is more than intellectual. Real faith is demonstrated through Christ-like actions, such as caring for the needy.

This week's reading from James's letter continues to challenge us to live our faith with integrity so that what is true in our hearts shows through in our actions. What "works" will express our faith? In the Catholic Tradition, the Corporal Works of Mercy include feeding the hungry, sheltering the homeless, clothing the naked, visiting the sick and imprisoned, burying the dead, giving alms to the poor, and caring for creation. Lofty spirituality doesn't matter if we allow others to go hungry and cold. Our faith is meant to be seen and understood in the context of works. When we follow Jesus, we will know life. When we take up the cross, we will know our salvation. We do not earn salvation by the works we do to follow Jesus, James tells us in the Second Reading. But the good works we do are our response to the gift of faith and grace and life we have in God through Jesus Christ. And what a gift that we can present to others by the good we do!

GOSPEL (Mark 8:27-35) "Who do people say that I am?" Jesus poses this question to his disciples on his journey through Caesarea Philippi. It elicits Peter's acknowledgment that Jesus is the Messiah. For centuries Israel had looked forward to God fulfilling his promise to King David by raising up another great leader to restore Israel's kingdom. These hopes had become clouded in political and earthly expectations.

Peter's response, in unambiguous terms, "You are the Christ [or the Messiah]," gives Jesus the opportunity to offer a different understanding. Jesus says that he has come to establish not an earthly kingdom to power but rather a spiritual kingdom in weakness. God's Kingdom will be established through Jesus' death and Resurrection.

A further challenge emerges for Jesus' followers from his revelation that he is going to suffer and die. His followers' lives will embrace the same path of suffering, death, and resurrection. As true Christians, our lives too will share in Jesus' redemptive suffering.
