Dioceses across the U.S., including our Memphis Diocese, will hold events to foster an appreciation for all Vocations and pray for those discerning a vocation to ordained ministry and consecrated life. In his message for the 58th Annual World Day of Prayer for Vocations, Pope Francis offered St. Joseph, the foster father of Jesus, as a model for vocational discernment. “Amid all the upheavals, [St. Joseph] found the courage to follow God’s will.

Nov 9th — The Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica Today the Church throughout the world celebrates a feast in honor of a church in Rome: the Basilica of St. John Lateran. St. John Lateran is not just any church: it is the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome, who is, of course, the pope. “Lateran” was the name of a Roman family whose lands were seized by Emperor Constantine in the 4th century. He proceeded to build a great basilica dedicated in honor of St. John the Baptist, but the name of the family that had once owned the land remained associated with it, and the church is called San Giovanni in Laterano, or “St. John in the Lateran.” For centuries, the old Lateran palace was the residence of the popes. It was only when the popes returned to Rome following the Avignon exile in the 14th century that they moved their residence to the Vatican Hill, which they considered to be a healthier part of the city. St. John Lateran continues to serve as the pope’s cathedral and is a sign of our unity as a Church under the leadership of the Holy Father. As we recall the dedication of this important church, the “mother church” of all the churches of the world, we should look inward as well.

Nov 10th — Memorial of St. Leo the Great, Pope and Doctor of the Church Pope Leo acted to protect the physical welfare of the people of Rome, negotiating with Attila the Hun for the safety of Rome and organizing relief efforts after the Vandals attacked the city.

Nov 10th — Scriptural Rosary The Scriptural Rosary will be recited on Wednesday, Nov 10th at 5:45pm in the Church. We will recite the Luminous Mysteries this week.

Nov 11th — Memorial of St. Martin of Tours, Bishop (316-397) was forced by his father, a pagan officer in the Roman army, to join the military. While serving in the military, he had a life-changing event in which he cut his cloak in half to clothe a freezing beggar. Following this encounter he had a vision of Christ wrapped in the cloak. As a result of this experience, St. Martin chose to be baptized and declared himself a soldier of peace for Christ, refusing to participate in any act of violence. He took up the life of a hermit, thereby introducing monasticism into Gaul. Following his election as bishop of Tours he continued living as a monk, but made numerous trips to visit his people and establish new monasteries. The people of Gaul converted to Christianity due to his example.

Nov 11th — Veteran's Day Let us remember the service of our veterans and let us renew our national promise to fulfill our sacred obligations to our veterans and their families who have sacrificed so much so that we can live free! Take a moment to remember these brave men and women who have valiantly fought to make America the greatest nation on Earth!

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of the parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby’s birth.

NOVEMBER – Month of All Souls

Sometimes we find ourselves surrounded by people who do things only that will further their success. Often, we ourselves do things just so others will think highly of us. But in today's liturgy Jesus warns against vanity, and he praises the humility of the poor woman who, from her poverty, offers her whole livelihood to God in sincerity rather than vainglory like the scribes and Pharisees.

FIRST READING (1 Kings 17:10-16) The widow's powerlessness in her poverty had reached its ultimate limit.; Only death remained. She nonetheless gave the last crumbs of what she and her son had to live on, with total trust in the word of the man of God that God would provide. Her trust was not mistaken.

God speaks through the prophet and brings his words to fulfillment, bestowing blessing. The prophet is the spokesman, but it is God who acts. We see the dawning of a universalism in which God extends a hand of compassion and mercy to draw in all people, demonstrating the love of the one who is Creator of all.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 146:7, 8-9, 9-10) Today's response of praise highlights the Lord's special care for the poor and powerless in his providential care for their needs.

Psalm 146 acknowledges and repeats the teaching of the preceding passage: our Creator and God cares for all, the work of divine hands. This psalm expresses so well God's care for the oppressed, the hungry, prisoners, the blind, the stranger, and the widow and orphan. This is understood as divine justice, affirming the right relationship that underlies authentic righteous behavior.

SECOND READING (Hebrews 9:24-28) Today's readings point to the ultimate realities: the heavenly temple of God and the reality of the now, the present time, as the end of time already begun and moving toward its final consummation when Jesus comes again to gift his faithful ones with the salvation he has accomplished.

This passage in Hebrews tells us that Jesus, our perfect and blameless High Priest, has not taken his own blood and entered the heavenly sanctuary to bring about our forgiveness and reconciliation. He has become the mercy seat of the new law, from which has come our eternal redemption. Another important allusion to the Old Testament is found in the final verse of this passage where it reads, "offered once to take away the sins of many." In the fourth song of the servant in Second Isaiah (read on Good Friday), we find reference to the redemptive death of the servant, which brings about the forgiveness of sins (cf. Isaiah 53:11-12). The author of Hebrews saw Jesus as the fulfillment of both these Old Testament images (the High Priest and the Servant). The author of Hebrews makes the point that this one perfect sacrifice of Jesus need never be repeated, for it has surpassed and completed what the Old Law never envisioned could be accomplished. When Christ appears again, this time it will be to bestow salvation at the end of time.

GOSPEL (Mark 12:38-44 or 12:41-44) Like the widow in the First Reading, the widow in today's Gospel gave from her substance, from what she had to live on. Meager as it was, it was worth more in the eyes of God than all the sizeable donations of those who did not suffer as she would for their generosity. Literally, the Greek reads: "She gave her whole life." Is this not what Jesus would later do?"

Throughout the Scriptures, the biblical authors portray God as caring for the poor. The widow, the orphan, the foreigner and all who are in need are the concern of God and his people. The Gospel shows Jesus in this same light, having a heart open to the needs of the poor, bringing them healing of body and consolation of spirit. The religious leaders fail to show or appreciate the kind of compassion expected of God's ambassadors to the poor. Rather, their religious practice is for show and self-aggrandizement. They understand neither their calling nor their deepest responsibility.

REFLECTION With the widow as an exemplar of giving, this might be a good Sunday for almsgiving—giving from our want rather than our need. The target can be your parish, a local charity or another need somewhere in the world.
