



Jan 17th — Memorial of St. Anthony, Abbot Early in his life St. Anthony of Egypt (251-356) discovered the importance of solitude in knowing oneself in relationship to God. As a hermit in Egypt, Anthony is considered the “Patriarch of the Monks” and the founder of religious life. Solitude provides the vehicle through which one battles demons and removes worldly distractions that distance the heart from the will of God. St. Anthony journeyed in the desert for nearly 30 years where he lived a life of solitary prayer and self-discipline—a life of utter dependence on God. After this time in the desert, he emerged as a man of balance, ready to share all he learned regarding the human thirst for God. Realizing that the spiritual life takes root within a community of believers, he founded a group of monks. While serving as abbot, a spiritual father, to the monks, St. Anthony mentored them in the ways of contemplative prayer and helped them overcome illusory thinking. His dynamic personality continued to attract individuals. As a result, he counseled a steady stream of pilgrims and laid the foundation for many monasteries.

Jan 18-25, 2022 — Week of Prayer for Christian Unity This international Christian ecumenical observance began in 1908 and focused on prayer for church unity. The dates of the week were proposed by Fr. Paul Wattson, co-founder of the Graymoor Franciscan Friars. He conceived the week beginning on the Feast of the Confession of St. Peter, Jan 18th, and ending with the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul on Jan 25th. Pope Pius X officially blessed the concept, and Benedict XV encouraged its observance throughout the entire Roman Catholic Church. Each year, Christians from many denominations observe a special week of prayer for Christian unity. Coming together in a variety of ways, through joint prayer and meetings, we remember how much we share, and we look honestly at the issues that still keep us apart. It is a time to reflect on Christ’s prayer the night before he died. For Catholics, the unity of all Christian believers is more than just one more dream; it is central to the Church’s mission.

Jan 19th — Scriptural Rosary The Scriptural Rosary will be recited on Wednesday, Jan 19th at 5:45pm in the Church. We will recite the Sorrowful Mysteries this week.

Jan 20-22 — March for Life in Washington DC On January 22, 1973, the United States Supreme Court handed down a decision known as Roe vs. Wade, which made abortion legal throughout the country, and struck down many states’ laws restricting abortion. Since that decision, more than 50 million abortions have been performed in the United States. In all the dioceses of the USA, this day is observed as a day of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion, and for the full restoration of the legal guarantee to the right to life. We pray not only for the innocent children who are not able to be born, but for all mothers and fathers who are considering abortion and those who have had abortions. On this day, thousands will participate in pro-life marches. The largest takes place in Washington, DC, where some 400,000 gather on the Mall and march up Capitol Hill to witness to the Gospel of Life. On this day, let us remember that all life is sacred.

Jan 22-23 — Collection for the Church in Latin America Next weekend, Jan 22-23, we will take up the Collection for the Church in Latin America. In Peru, the 14 villages of Chazuta, in Moyobamba, are all located away from the city center, with the most remote only accessible by boat. The faithful in these communities do not have access to catechetical formation, and members often feel separated from the life of the universal Church. Through a grant from the Collection for the Church in Latin America, the religious congregation of the Missionaries of Jesus was able to provide faith formation, spiritual retreats, and workshops to nearly 250 people. Upon completion, participants were better equipped to help others deepen their faith and answer questions. The program also renewed their sense of commitment to their parishes and created stronger bonds within their own families. Through this program, members of the Chazuta villages felt the love and support of the universal Church. Please support programs like these and give generously in next week’s collection.

SACRAMENTS

Baptism - A preparation class is required of parents requesting Baptism for their first child. Parents and godparents are encouraged to attend the class before the baby’s birth.

First Communion – is celebrated with students who are at least in the 2nd grade and have completed the 2 year required preparation process in our PRE program.

Confirmation - is celebrated with students who are at least in the 8th grade and have completed the 2 year required preparation process in our PRE program.

Matrimony - Couples planning to marry should contact the Pastor at least 6 months prior to the proposed date so all parish and diocesan requirements may be completed.

Holy Orders - If you feel called to a vocation to the priesthood or religious life, please contact the Pastor.

Anointing of the Sick - If you wish to receive this sacrament, contact the Pastor. In an emergency situation, an immediate family member should contact the Pastor.

JANUARY-Month of the Holy Name of Jesus

The Church has moved into another liturgical time, not one of preparation like Advent, or of solemn celebration like Christmas Time, but a time of growing and deepening in our relationship with God. This period is called Ordinary Time and its color is green, the color of growing things.

In following Jesus Christ, there is always something better to come. Jesus's first miraculous sign at the wedding feast of Cana communicates to us the profound hope that underlies the Christian life. The better wine saved for the end of the festivities, like the joy of eternal salvation, is what we anticipate with hope in the here and now. Christ who is risen from the dead reveals to us that the best is yet to come and this joyful outlook colors our experience of life. In Christ, we can always trust in ultimate triumph over our lacks, our needs, our problems and our struggles. Let us let Christ surprise us with the bounty of God's Grace.

FIRST READING (Isaiah 62:1-5) The First Reading comes from the portion of the Book of Isaiah known as "Third Isaiah," dating to the period when Israelites began returning to Jerusalem from their time in exile. The language is filled with hope and the promise of new life. Israel's situation is totally transformed and the nation's relationship with the Lord is renewed. The marriage imagery tells us that the people have a fresh start, a second honeymoon.

Jerusalem, the city once desolate and forsaken at the time of the Babylonian destruction, will be restored and shine with the glorious light of the Lord. All nations will see it. The imagery of the Marriage relationship, the symbol of God's covenant with Israel, is the focus of versus 4 and 5. Joy abounds as God renews his covenant of love with Jerusalem his bride.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Psalm 96:1-2, 2-3, 7-8, 9-10) If we read the psalm in the context of the First Reading, we can see it as the response of the people Israel to their renewed relationship with the Lord in the land that he gave them. They respond with joy and praise, recognizing that all the good they have experienced is due to the Lord's power and his mercy.

The post-exilic restoration of Jerusalem, a result of the conquest of Cyrus of Persia, was indeed perceived as God's marvelous deed for his people (see Isaiah 44:28—45:25). Although the word "joy" does not occur in today's response, it certainly is implied. References to nations, lands and all peoples occur in each stanza (see Isaiah 2:2).

SECOND READING (1 Corinthians 12:4-11) Speaking to the oft-divided Church in Corinth, Paul introduces the concept of unity in diversity. He reminds the Corinthians (and us) that, though the Spirit has bestowed a variety of gifts, these gifts have a single purpose: to build up the common good. By placing our gifts at the benefit of the community, Christians build up the Church and the Kingdom of God.

The various gifts God bestows upon believers are yet another marvelous deed. Paul speaks of the variety of gifts. All are manifestations of God's spirit. They are distributed to various individuals, as God deems fit, to be used for the benefit of others. What is your gift?

GOSPEL (John 2:1-11) John calls Jesus' first miracle at the wedding at Cana "the beginning of his signs." At his mother's urging, Jesus transforms the situation, turning water into wine and changing what could have been a social disaster into a triumph. The seemingly unlimited fine wine calls to mind the "pure, choice wine" that the Lord has promised to provide on his holy mountain and so "his disciples began to believe in him."

Again, a wedding is the focus. In the New Testament, the heavenly banquet in the kingdom of God is sometimes depicted as a wedding feast (see Matthew 25:1-13; also Revelation 22:1-5). In this first sign (the Johannine word for miracle) performed by Jesus, water is changed into wine at a wedding banquet—another marvelous deed of God! In so doing, Jesus manifested his glory, a glory that would be fully revealed at the "hour" of his death, which is also, in the Gospel according to John, the hour of his exaltation.
