

Veiling and Unveiling

While the practice has been abandoned in some places, the Church still encourages the custom of veiling statues during the final two weeks of Lent. The Fifth Week of Lent and Holy Week were formerly known as "Passiontide." While no longer called by this name, the tone of this phase of Lent still changes significantly beyond our own need for conversion and our response to our baptismal commitment. Instead the focus becomes the meaning of Christ's Passion and Death. We focus less on ourselves and more on Him.

So why cover the statues? The Church uses this visual act to demonstrate the need to turn our attention away from other things and people and to focus only on the mystery of the Lord's sacrifice. Of course the saints remain important - especially Our Lady and her participation in the events of our redemption. But during this time, all attention should be turned to Christ Crucified. Over these two weeks the story is unfolded for us about what happened that precipitated the Passion.

The Church is reminding us that if something is distracting us, we should simply cover it up in order to maintain proper attention. It's pretty easy to cover statues with purple veils so that we will pay attention to the Liturgy. What distractions do we need to cover up in our own lives so that we can pay closer attention to the Lord? If we can't seem to find the time or the concentration for prayer, maybe we need to "cover up" the distraction of the television, the computer, or some unnecessary work. If we don't have enough time for family and friends, maybe we should cover over some time in our calendars to spend with them. If there is some strong temptation or influence that takes us away from being a good Catholic, perhaps we need to veil it so we're not always distracted by it.

The purple covers only stay up for two weeks. On Holy Saturday the veils are removed and we gain a new appreciation for the familiar statues. We are happy to see the images of our heavenly friends again. The discipline, self-denial and self-discipline of Lent should help us to have a new appreciation for the graces that God uncovers for us at Easter. That's the exciting part yet to come. We have no idea how much God has been using us and helping us during these forty days. If we enter whole-heartedly into the mysteries we celebrate during Holy Week, we will be amazed at what God uncovers about Himself in our lives. And once the Holy Week of our lives comes to an end, we pray for what Saint Paul describes as an experience when the veils are taken away and we see God face-to-face.

Covering Statues – for the Fifth Sunday of Lent the Roman Missal states: "In the Dioceses of the United States, the practice of covering crosses and images (statues and pictures) throughout the church from this Sunday may be observed. Crosses are to remain covered until the end of the celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, but images remain covered until the beginning of the Easter Vigil". The last two weeks of Lent – the Fifth Week and Holy Week – used to be called "Passiontide". While the name no longer survives, there is still a definite shift in the Lenten focus. The first four weeks are concerned with our conversion; the last two weeks focus on Jesus' Passion and Death for our salvation (Oh, the word *rubric* comes from the Latin word for "red" since the directions in the Missal are printed in red ink!)

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults – throughout this Lenten Season, please keep in your prayers all those in our Parish and throughout the Universal Church who are preparing to receive the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and First Holy Communion or to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church at Easter. Lent is a time of intense discernment and preparation for the catechumens (those to be baptized) and candidates (those already baptized into other Christian communities and will become Catholic). May the Holy Spirit guide them and bring many more persons into the Catholic Church.

Lent 2018 Share in Hope Food Drive - The St. Vincent de Paul Society would like to thank all those who participated in the Share in Hope Food Drive for the Archdiocese of Washington last weekend with donations of food and/or monetary donations. Communal Anointing of the Sick - Anointing of the Sick will be administered on **Saturday, April 7, at 1 p.m.** in the Church. **This will not be a Mass**, but a Liturgy with individual anointing. As mentioned in previous bulletins, the Sacrament of the Anointing is not just for those at the point of death, but also for those "in danger of death from sickness or old age"...for those aged in "a weakened condition even though no dangerous illness is present" and for those "before surgery when a dangerous illness is the reason for the intervention" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*). The Campaign That Won't End - As you know, the Saint Peter's Capital Campaign ended on the 31st of December. In January the Priests and office staff were discussing what to do about the Campaign envelope that is included in your envelope packet. Since some people were accustomed to making offerings through the envelope, we decided to simply rename the envelope something like "Building and Repair" or "Church Maintenance". To that end, Father Woods wrote to the Archdiocese to ask permission for this kind of collection, which would be assessed like all collections. Much to our delight and surprise, the Archdiocese suggested that they simply extend the Capital Campaign to be a full 5 year program (most campaigns are for 5 years.) With this permission, any monies put in the Capital Campaign envelopes are exempt from assessment and will allow us to pursue goals from the Campaign - including more artistic preservation work in the Church and HVAC improvement.

Statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe – the warm days we had a few weeks ago provided us with the opportunity to permanently attach the statue of Our Lady of Guadalupe to its pedestal in front of Saint Peter's School. We ask Our Blessed Lady to watch over our whole Parish and entrust ourselves to her prayers and intercession.

Sacrament of Penance – plan now to make sure you have time to make a good Confession before Easter. Catholics must confess serious sins at least once a year. This is a Precept of the Church. The Holy Week flyer in today's bulletin lists the additional Confession times throughout Holy Week. At the entrances of the Church are wonderful cards that provide an Examination of Conscience and Act of Contrition. There is tremendous grace in asking God for forgiveness in this Sacrament and receiving Absolution. This is the reason Christ died for us: to save us from sin.

EMPOWERING YOUTH TO SHARE THE JOY OF LOVE

The Scriptures and stories of saints remind us that God does not wait until someone turns 18 or 21 to call them to great things. Many of our great Christian saints and heroes were young people who listened daily to God in prayer and made courageous decisions to answer His call in their lives. As families and as a parish family we share the responsibility to call young people to great things and support them at every step along the journey.

WE ENCOURAGE YOUTH TO SHARE THE JOY OF LOVE BY...

- strengthening your faith with your family (parents, siblings, grandparents, etc.) by praying and going to Mass and parish activities together;
- actively participating in preparation for the Sacrament of Confirmation and continuing to put your faith into practice as a fully initiated Catholic;
- becoming an active participant in the life of the parish through opportunities such as youth ministry programs, or as altar servers, lectors, Eucharistic ministers, etc.;
- attending a retreat or conference during high school years .

EMPOWERING YOUNG ADULTS TO SHARE THE JOY OF LOVE

Pope Francis reminds us that marriage preparation does not begin when you meet your future spouse or are engaged. "Marriage preparation begins at birth," and continues through each stage of our lives (*Amoris Laetitia*, 208). Whether you are single, engaged, or newly married, the best way to discern, prepare, or live into a vocation is to live your faith wholeheartedly and generously today.



WE ENCOURAGE YOUNG ADULTS TO SHARE THE JOY OF LOVE BY

- not waiting until you feel "more settled" to join a parish community, volunteer and donate regularly;
- finding a small community to belong to: family, young adult community, small group, lay movement;
- finding a mentor or mentor couple you look up to and ask to meet them for dinner to talk with them and learn from their experience. Don't have one? Ask your priest for someone to recommend;
- forming habits today that you want to have later in life: eat dinner together at the table, pray before meals, attend Mass together every weekend, incorporate family traditions or develop new ones;
- learning more about your faith through ongoing spiritual reading, retreats, adult faith formation programs, and other opportunities.

Cardinal Wuerl has written a Pastoral Plan to teach and celebrate the gift and joy of love in the family and help families that are hurting.

HABILITAR A LOS JÓVENES PARA QUE PARTICIPEN EN LA ALEGRÍA DEL AMOR

La Sagrada Escritura y las vidas de los santos nos recuerdan que Dios no espera hasta que alguien cumpla 18 o 21 años para llamarlos a realizar grandes cosas. Muchos de nuestros grandes santos y héroes cristianos fueron jóvenes que escuchaban a Dios en su oración diaria y tomaron decisiones valerosas para responder al llamamiento del Señor. Como familias individuales y como familia parroquial, todos compartimos la responsabilidad de alentar a nuestros jóvenes a realizar grandes cosas y apoyarlos paso a paso en su caminar.

Animamos a los jóvenes a participar en la alegría del amor,

- fortaleciendo su fe con su propia familia (padres, hermanos, abuelos, etc.) orando y participando juntos en Misa y en actividades de la parroquia.
- participando con entusiasmo en la preparación para el Sacramento de la Confirmación y poniendo siempre en práctica su fe como católicos plenamente iniciados
- siendo partícipes activos en la vida de la parroquia uniéndose a programas de pastoral juvenil o como monaguillos, lectores, ministros extraordinarios de la Comunión, etc.;
- asistiendo a un retiro o conferencia durante los años de escuela secundaria

HABILITAR A LOS JÓVENES PARA QUE PARTICIPEN EN LA ALEGRÍA DEL AMOR

El Papa Francisco nos recuerda que la preparación para el matrimonio no comienza cuando se conoce al futuro cónyuge ni cuando los novios se comprometen. "Cada persona se prepara para el matrimonio desde su nacimiento" y continúa durante cada etapa de su vida (AL, 208). Si tú eres soltero, eres un novio comprometido o te has casado hace poco, la mejor manera de discernir una vocación o prepararse para ella es vivir la fe con sinceridad y generosidad.

JÓVENES ADULTOS, LOS ANIMAMOS A COMPARTIR LA ALEGRÍA DEL AMOR,

- sin esperar a sentirse "más afianzados" para incorporarse a una comunidad parroquial, ofrecerse de voluntarios y hacer donaciones periódicas;
- buscando un grupo católico cerca de su casa al que puedan pertenecer, por ejemplo: familias, comunidades de jóvenes adultos, grupos pequeños, movimientos seglares, etc.;
- buscando una persona o una pareja casada que ustedes admiren para que sea mentora e invítenlos a
 cenar para conversar con ellos y aprender de su experiencia matrimonial. ¿No conocen a ninguna?
 Pídanle a su sacerdote que les recomiende una;
- formándose ahora los hábitos y las cualidades que desean tener en el futuro, como cenar juntos, rezar
 antes de las comidas, asistir a Misa juntos cada fin de semana, incorporar sus tradiciones familiares o
 desarrollar nuevas tradiciones, etc.
- aprendiendo más acerca de su fe, por ejemplo, haciéndose el hábito de leer libros espirituales, participar en retiros y programas de formación en la fe para adultos y otras opciones.

El Cardenal Wuerl ha escrito un Plan Pastoral con el fin de enseñar y celebrar el don y la alegría del amor en la familia y ayudar a las familias que sufren.

En su esencia, el plan pastoral ayuda a aplicar la visión de la carta *Amoris Laetitia* del Papa Francisco en el ministerio pastoral de la parroquia y en la vida familiar.

El plan consta de cinco partes:

- 1. La enseñanza de *Amoris* Laetitia

Con Velo y sin Velo

Si bien la práctica ha sido abandonada en algunos lugares, la Iglesia aún fomenta la costumbre de cubrir con velo las estatuas durante las últimas dos semanas de la Cuaresma. La quinta semana de Cuaresma y Semana Santa anteriormente se conocía como " Passiontide". Aunque ya no se lo llama por este nombre, el tono de esta fase de la Cuaresma sigue cambiando significativamente más allá de nuestra propia necesidad de conversión y nuestra respuesta a nuestro compromiso con el bautismo. En cambio, el enfoque se convierte en el significado de la Pasión y la Muerte de Cristo. Nos enfocamos menos en nosotros mismos y más en él.

Entonces, ¿por qué cubrir las estatuas? La Iglesia usa este acto visual para demostrar la necesidad de desviar nuestra atención de otras cosas y personas y enfocarse únicamente en el misterio del sacrificio del Señor. Por supuesto, los santos siguen siendo importantes, especialmente Nuestra Señora y su participación en los eventos de nuestra redención. Pero durante este tiempo, toda la atención debe dirigirse a Cristo Crucificado. Durante estas dos semanas, la historia se desarrolla para nosotros sobre lo que sucedió que precipitó la Pasión.

La Iglesia nos recuerda que si algo nos distrae, simplemente debemos cubrirlo para mantener la atención adecuada. Es muy fácil cubrir las estatuas con velos de color púrpura para que prestemos atención a la liturgia. ¿Qué distracciones necesitamos cubrir en nuestras propias vidas para poder prestar más atención al Señor? Si parece que no podemos encontrar el tiempo o la concentración para la oración, tal vez tengamos que "cubrir" la distracción de la televisión, la computadora o algún trabajo innecesario. Si no tenemos suficiente tiempo para familiares y amigos, tal vez deberíamos cubrir un tiempo en nuestros calendarios para gastar con ellos. Si hay alguna fuerte tentación o influencia que nos aleje de ser un buen católico, tal vez tengamos que velarlo para que no siempre estemos distraídos.

Las fundas de color violeta solo permanecen durante dos semanas. El sábado santo se quitan los velos y obtenemos un nuevo aprecio por las estatuas familiares. Estamos felices de ver las imágenes de nuestros amigos celestiales de nuevo. La disciplina, la abnegación y la autodisciplina de la Cuaresma deberían ayudarnos a tener un nuevo aprecio por las gracias que Dios nos descubre en la Pascua. Esa es la parte más emocionante que está por venir. No tenemos idea de cuánto Dios nos ha estado usando y ayudándonos durante estos cuarenta días. Si entramos en los misterios que celebramos durante la Semana Santa, nos sorprenderemos de lo que Dios descubre acerca de sí mismo en nuestras vidas. Y una vez que la Semana Santa de nuestras vidas llega a su fin, oramos por lo que San Pablo describe como una experiencia cuando se quitan los velos y vemos a Dios cara a cara.


