## **We Need Priests!**

Sometimes the headline says it all.

We all know that the Church needs more Priests. The Archdiocese of Washington has done better than most with numbers of vocations. The approximately 655,000 souls that make up the Archdiocese of Washington are served by 188 active diocesan priests with another 95 retired, sick, or Priests on loan to other ministries. With the help of religious Priests, the reality is that each diocesan parish Priest is responsible for about 3,400 souls entrusted to his care. The number of Catholics continues to outpace the number of ordinations. Eight Priests will be ordained for our Archdiocese in May. Some dioceses go several years without an ordination.

The number of seminarians varies each year, but we've had between 75 and 85 studying for the Church of Washington, including several young men from Southern Maryland. St. John Paul II Seminary, our Archdiocesan College Seminary, thrives. In spite of all this promising news, we still need more Priests. And they need to come from our midst; from our own families.

The Priesthood is a wonderful, fulfilling and joyful vocation! Any commitment is challenging and requires sacrifice - marriage certainly does! The Priesthood, however, is still pretty basic: a man becomes conformed to Christ the High Priest through ordination in spite of his own personal unworthiness. Just as a musician plays an instrument, so the Lord uses the Priest to make Himself known in the Church and the world, especially through the sacraments and the preaching of the Gospel. The Priest is neither a social worker, teacher, or administrator primarily. He is an *alter Christus* - another Christ. Priesthood is who a man is – not what he does.

Young men still see this and know it intuitively. Those in various levels of education still ask about the Priesthood or hold some unspoken interest in a priestly vocation. And yes, they're from our Parish! Some are very young gentlemen who are in awe of the Priesthood - who knows what God has in store for them. Did I know at the age of 7 that I wanted to be Priest? Absolutely. – Young men of every age hear God's Voice calling them to be completely His. That Voice can be heard as a child, a teen or an adult.

Why doesn't God send us more priests? Because we don't ask. We only get the Priests we pray for. And listen to our young people. They may be interested in a vocation and we have completely overlooked it! Watch and pray and we'll get more Priests.

# WORLD DAY of PRAYER for VOCATIONS

The sheep follow the Good Shepherd, because they hear and recognize his voice. (cf John 10:4)

## Highlights from the Pope's Letter

*for 2018 World Day of Prayer for Vocations*

Pope Francis, in his letter for today, points out that when Jesus returned after his time of prayer and struggle in the desert, he did three things before he began his mission. He *listened* to the word, *discerned* the content of the mission entrusted to him by the Father, and proclaimed that he came to accomplish it *today* (Lk 4:16-21).

This model—listen, discern, live—can be followed by all of us as we try live out our vocation. Here are some insights from the Holy Father:

**LISTEN** | God comes silently and discretely, without imposing on our freedom. Thus it can happen that his voice is drowned out by the many worries and concerns that fill our minds and hearts. We need to learn to silence the noise around us to listen.

**DISCERN** | We have to resist the temptations of ideology and negativity, and to discover, in our relationship with the Lord, the places, the means, and situations through which he calls us. Discernment requires attentiveness, not distraction!

**LIVE** | Our vocation is lived *today*! The Christian mission is now! Each one of us is called—whether to the lay life in marriage, to the priestly life in the ordained ministry, or to a life of special consecration—in order to become a witness of the Lord, here and now.

## Prayed to the Priesthood



About seven years ago in upstate New York, Sue O'Neal met a young man in her parish named Francis Vivacqua.

Seeing something in him, she asked him if he had ever considered the priesthood. It was a “wow” moment for the young man, setting him on a long path to figuring out his true call in life.

Remarkably, every single day since their encounter, Sue prayed a Divine Mercy Chaplet for Francis. Years after she began praying, he entered the seminary. In 2016, Francis was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Albany. Sue continues to pray for him daily.

## A Financial Wall

*Overcoming barriers to a vocation*

An estimated 10,000 individuals are discerning a vocation to the priesthood or religious life in the US annually. However, one study showed that as many as 40% are blocked from pursuing their call due to student loans.

Most religious communities cannot assume any debt, and most dioceses allow only a limited amount of debt before accepting a candidate.

A Catholic organization called the Labouré Society helps men and women resolve education loans in order to enter the seminary, convent, or monastery. The organization brings together groups of aspirants, trains them to fund raise, then sends them out across the U.S. to tell their vocation stories. Nearly 250 young men and women have been able enter formation with the help of Labouré.

## Why do Seminarians Need our Prayers?

Because formation to become a priest is extremely hard work! Some have likened it to getting a master's degree while having a full-time job. The man's "job," in this case, though, is forming his heart and mind to be like Jesus, the Good Shepherd. Prayer and study are priorities, but recreation and down time are also important—as is spending time with a good spiritual director. A typical day at the seminary may look like this:

## **¡Necesitamos sacerdotes!**

A veces el título lo dice todo.

Todos sabemos que la Iglesia necesita más Sacerdotes. La Arquidiócesis de Washington ha hecho mejor que la mayoría con el número de vocaciones. Las aproximadamente 655,000 almas que conforman la Arquidiócesis de Washington son servidas por 188 sacerdotes diocesanos activos con otros 95 jubilados, enfermos o sacerdotes prestados a otros ministerios. Con la ayuda de sacerdotes religiosos, la realidad es que cada párroco diocesano es responsable de unas 3.400 almas confiadas a su cuidado. El número de católicos continúa superando el número de ordenaciones. Ocho sacerdotes serán ordenados para nuestra Arquidiócesis en mayo. Algunas diócesis pasan varios años sin una ordenación.

El número de seminaristas varía cada año, pero hemos tenido entre 75 y 85 años estudiando para la Iglesia de Washington, incluidos varios jóvenes del sur de Maryland. El Seminario San Juan Pablo II, nuestro Seminario Universitario Arquidiocesano, prospera. A pesar de todas estas noticias prometedoras, todavía necesitamos más Sacerdotes. Y deben venir de nuestro medio; de nuestras propias familias.

¡El sacerdocio es una vocación maravillosa, plena y gozosa! Cualquier compromiso es desafiante y requiere sacrificio: ¡el matrimonio ciertamente lo hace! El sacerdocio, sin embargo, sigue siendo bastante básico: un hombre se conforma con Cristo, el Sumo Sacerdote mediante la ordenación a pesar de su propia indignidad personal. Así como un músico toca un instrumento, el Señor usa al sacerdote para darse a conocer en la Iglesia y en el mundo, especialmente a través de los sacramentos y la predicación del Evangelio. El sacerdote no es ni un trabajador social, maestro o administrador principalmente. Él es un alter Christus, otro Cristo. El sacerdocio es lo que el hombre es, no lo que él hace.

Los jóvenes todavía lo ven y lo saben intuitivamente. Aquellos en varios niveles de educación todavía preguntan sobre el sacerdocio o mantienen algún interés no expresado en una vocación sacerdotal. Y sí, ¡son de nuestra Parroquia! Algunos son caballeros muy jóvenes que admiran el sacerdocio, quién sabe lo que Dios tiene reservado para ellos. ¿Sabía que a la edad de 7 años yo quería ser sacerdote? Absolutamente. - Los hombres jóvenes de todas las edades oyen la voz de Dios llamándolos a ser completamente suyos. Esa voz se puede escuchar como un niño, un adolescente o un adulto.

¿Por qué Dios no nos envía más sacerdotes? Porque no preguntamos. Solo obtenemos los Sacerdotes por los que oramos. Y escuchemos a nuestros jóvenes. ¡Pueden estar interesados en una vocación y la hemos pasado por alto por completo! Mire y ore y obtendremos más Sacerdotes.



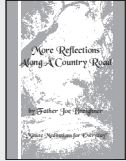
