MARRIAGE ARRANGEMENTS

The policy of the Archdiocese requires a minimum six-month preparation period for marriage, during which the couple meets with the priest or deacon and participates in the Archdiocesan marriage preparation program. Engaged couples should telephone the Parish Center no less than six months prior to the anticipated date of marriage for an appointment with the priest or deacon.

FUNERAL ARRANGEMENTS

The parish priest is to be contacted before the family makes any arrangements with the funeral director. Family members are also asked to meet with the priest to prepare for the Funeral liturgy.

Uptown Canticle by Father Michael

Winston Churchill, the British statesman, was a guest at a dinner in a private home. The dinner hour arrived and the guests made their way to the dining room. Churchill moved to a chair along the side of the table. Mortified, the hostess was quickly at his side, gesturing to the empty chair waiting for him. "Mr. Churchill," she said, "your seat is at the head of the table." To which Churchill responded in typical Churchill style. "Madame," he said, "wherever I sit is the head of the table." And with that -- the Great Man sat down where he was.

This is a rare quality in political leaders. In reality it's a human trait, not a political one. Yet in the rarefied world of politics, where there is by definition a handful of nationally prominent politicians at any given moment, possessors of Churchill's "head of the table" trait stand out. Powerful people know that they do not have to make an effort to appear powerful. With ease, they carry the aura of authority around them. Such was the case with Jesus. Never the politician, he taught with authority often recognized by the people.

In the middle of summer, we continue reading from the Gospel of Matthew (Cycle A). Today we begin chapter 13, sometimes referred to as the chapter on parables. Matthew has Jesus teach seven parables in this chapter. The Hebrew word for "parable" means wisdom saying or proverb. Matthew's story of the parable of the sower says that Jesus "sat" by the shore, but when the crowds grew too large he moved to a boat where he "sat" as well. That particular verb ("sat") recalls the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus also "sat" to teach. The verb indicates the authority of a true teacher—one who sits to dispense wisdom. This is not your ordinary itinerant professor.

Today's parable of the sower is rooted in antiquity with the image of scattering seed on the ground, which would have preceded plowing. Today even gardeners often sow seed by plowing first, planting the seed, then covering the seed with soil. But such is not the world of antiquity.

The parable invites us to stop and consider several questions: What kind of seed are we? Were we scattered on rocky soil or fertile? Will we bear fruit? If so, how much—thirty, sixty, one hundred fold? The seed scattered on rocks can scarcely move itself to the fertile soil. Is it the fault of the seed landing among thorns in an inhospitable environment? Then again, what about the seed that finds itself in fertile soil? Isn't it our responsibility to grow and produce fruit?

We invite you to reserve your seat for the celebration of Eucharist to sit with Jesus and listen to our wisdom teacher. Let us pray for the grace to grow where we find ourselves and to produce as much fruit as possible. One day there will be a harvest and we shall experience new life. Such is the paschal mystery. I want to commend those attending for following the guideline to wear a mask except when receiving Holy Communion and to thank you for assisting in sanitizing the pews for the next mass. During these past weeks our parish was blessed to have the families of our second graders celebrating their First Eucharist. Please take a moment to view the poster in the church vestibule of all our First communicants and continue to pray for them. We are hoping that as we move pass the pandemic, our parish will be able to celebrate a class communion in the future.

In making a reservation for mass, please observe the guidelines in this bulletin and on our parish website. If you are not a registered parishioner, use this occasion to be among the members of the flock of St. Francis of Assisi. You can register on our website www.stfrancisuptown.com

For those parishioners we cannot accommodate in the church or who are fearful to gather with us, Archbishop Aymond has given permission to distribute Holy Communion after mass outdoors. He strongly suggested that we not give Holy Communion to people in vehicles. He recommends that we do so outside where people can form a communion line and observe social distancing. Therefore, this weekend after each mass, weather permitting, I will be available to distribute Holy Communion in the front lawn of the rectory. I suggest that as you approach me to receive the Body of Christ you pray the Lord's Prayer, the Our Father.

Please remember that Archbishop Aymond has dispensed the people of the Archdiocese from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass. If someone is vulnerable and not feeling well, that should not celebrate Mass in church with other people. Baptisms, Weddings and funerals is limited to 100 worshipers. This number will increase gradually.

We will continue to live stream the 9:30 am Mass on Sunday from church. Daily mass in church. Monday, Wednesday through Friday 8:30 am and Tuesday at 6:00 pm. No reservation is necessary for daily mass. We will no longer live stream daily mass.

As we enter the hurricane season, let us implore the intercession of Our Lady of Prompt Succor to hasten to help us and our patron St. Francis of Assisi to make us instruments of the Lord's peace.

General Guidelines for Mass Attendance To sign up to attend Mass:

Entering & Leaving: All entrances are open. Church pews are marked and roped off. When Mass has ended, please do not gather in groups outside of church or in the parking lot. Continue to maintain social distancing.

<u>During Mass</u>: Wear a mask during Mass aside from receiving Communion. Be mindful of social distancing and maintain 6 feet of distance from others at all times. For our weekend Masses, a worship aid will be available at the entrances. After Mass, leave it in your pew. You may place your regular offering for support and other collections in the baskets in the center aisle and side doors. The Offertory procession is omitted. We can express the sign of peace by means of a smile and/or nod of the head.

Reception of Holy Communion: Bring hand sanitizer to use before receiving Communion. During the distribution of Holy Communion, form a single line and observe the social distancing blue lines on the floor of the aisles. We ask everyone to receive Holy Communion in the hand rather than on the tongue. You will receive the Body of Christ in the form of bread only. When approaching the priest or Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion, place your hand flatly atop the other and fully extend your arm toward the priest or minster who will place the Host on your hand in a manner to avoid any contact with your hand.

A Stewardship Moment

"Gross is the heart of this people, they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed eyes, lest they see with their eyes and hear with their ears and understand with their hearts and be converted, and I heal them."

Jesus is quoting to the people a passage from Isaiah [6:10] in which God is lamenting the hardness of the hearts of the people, despite all the good He has done for them. Jesus had healed the sick and the lame; restored sight to the blind and hearing to the deaf; raised the dead; and taught them by word and example to love God and to love their neighbor as themselves. They marveled at the wonders he had done, but they wondered about that love your neighbor thing. They were intrigued when Jesus did things for people who were complete strangers to him without seeking or accepting a reward from them. But they did not seem to grasp that he expected them to do for others, neighbors and enemies alike, what he had done for them, and to use all that God had given to them for themselves and for others. The people in the time of Jesus ere apparently no different than the people in the time of Isaiah. Are we any different today? We are supposed to be. The Good News compels us to get to know and imitate Jesus.



Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Isaiah 55:10-11

Life-Giving Word

We cannot live without water. Rain has a job to do. It comes from the heavens and waters the earth. The earth then brings forth seed for crops and enables the baking of bread and the preparation of essential foods. Water returns to the sky, the prophet Isaiah says, but only after it has done its job.

We cannot live without the Word of God. It has a job to do as well. It comes from the heavens to bring its fruitfulness to the earth. It announces God's love, provides direction for the wayward, and gives hope to those who despair. God's Word returns to heaven, but not before it has done its job.

Sometimes we squander these gifts. Household plants may be inches away from water, but they will not grow unless we give them a drink. We may be inches away from God's Word. It comes to us in the Scriptures, in the order of nature, in the counsel of friends, and in the community of believers. But we cannot grow unless we lift the cup and take a drink.

Where does God's Word speak around you? What occasions do you have to listen? God's Word has a job to do. Put it to work.

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Suffering Nothing

The older we get, the more we groan. Muscles ache. Memory fades. Taste buds fail. Hearing diminishes. Eyesight darkens. Stature bends. Our physical health decays, and suffering intensifies. Growing old, as they say, is not for wimps.

For many people, aging might be cause for despair. But for Christians, it is just another aspect of the imperfections of life. We have grown accustomed to the disappointments of this life. They are nothing compared with the promise of salvation. We put up with the inconveniences we experience because we believe in the joy that lies ahead.

St. Paul writes to the Romans, "I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us."

Paul believed in God's promise, that there was more ahead for him after he died. He believed that promise extended to all the faithful, and indeed to all creation. Creation itself has been groaning, awaiting a more perfect life. Perfection comes to all the world through Christ.

We may be growing older, but we are always children—God's children. We may be heading toward death, but we are really heading toward birth-birth to a new kind of life. The sufferings of today are as nothing. We are groaning in expectation of a joy that is to come.
