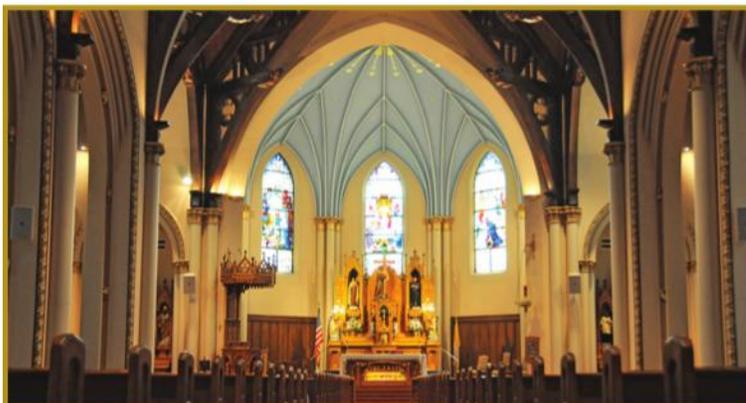

Uptown Canticle by Father Michael

“Dead man walking!” is the cry that goes out when a prisoner walks toward the execution chamber. He is still alive, but walking toward certain death. When Jesus rode on a donkey toward the temple, people thought he was riding to victory, so they shouted: “Hurrah for the Son of David!” But the sound that Jesus heard was: “Dead man riding!” Passion Sunday begins with joy and ends in sorrow.

This scene of great drama would unfold in unexpected ways. You are invited this week to join this “Dead man riding.” Pay attention to the human feelings and behavior of the people especially in the Passion narrative. They are the story of life, or the world. There is joy and singing. There is faith and doubt, greed, treachery, false accusations, mockery, and jeering: the despair of Judas, the lying of Peter, the pride and arrogance of both religious and political leaders, betrayal of friends, the tenderness of the women. Yes, it is all there – life at its best and at its worst. As someone has said “history is a butcher’s bench.” The Passion of Christ is everybody’s story.

How are we to understand the Passion? How are we to enter into the mystery of the Christ-event this year, 2021? Shall we be one of the Twelve, faithfully following Jesus into the unknown and unknowable? Shall we be one of the three most intimate — Peter, James or John? These three were happy to have been present on the mountain as Jesus was transfigured. They were equally joyful to share that special Passover meal where he gave them bread and wine that he identified as his very flesh and blood. But in the garden, when he needed their presence and their prayerful support, these same three privileged friends slept. Shall we also sleep?

Shall we be the woman at Simon’s home in Bethany? She infuriated the disciples by lavishing ointment on Jesus? When the disciples griped about the cost, Jesus directed them to be generous to the poor after he was gone. Can we be as generous with our poor as the woman was with Jesus?

Shall we find ourselves in Judas, betraying a friend who disappointed our expectations? Or in Peter, who denied his friend and master?

Henri Nouwen in his book, *Jesus, A Gospel* has suggested that of all the people with whom we may choose to identify in this Gospel, Simon of Cyrene may be the most appealing. Unable to bear the weight of the crossbar on his own, Jesus needed the help of a stranger to complete his mission. The hard, painful work of salvation is a work in which God chooses to depend on human beings. God, full of power, glory and majesty, chooses to need us. Jesus’ willingness to accept his help and Simon’s willingness to give it join together to teach us a lesson: that we too need help in our efforts for the Gospel. God needs us, too, for proclaiming the Good News.

Nouwen said that every time we are willing to break out of our self-sufficiency and dare to ask for help, a new community emerges, a fellowship of the helped and the helper, the weak and the strong. This fellowship testifies that, in mutual trust and support, we can be a people of hope for a broken world. In helping Jesus, Simon of Cyrene discovered and was welcomed into a new communion. In helping the poor whom Jesus said we would always have with us, and with whom he chose to be identified, we enter into communion with Jesus. In accepting the help of the poor — that is, in accepting that the poor can enlarge our hearts and make us more sensitive to the needs and sufferings of others — we also enter into communion with Christ.

How shall we enter into the Christ-event this year, 2021? By helping and being helped, by loving and being loved. And by acknowledging the communion that is growing among us and within us because of the One who died and rose, helped and was helped, loved and was loved. We are all one with him and, because of him, one in God. Through the Passion this “Dead man riding” becomes “Dead man rising.”

We can never understand fully the story even though we share, in our own lives, much of what happens to Jesus. To hear the story is to hope for strength in difficult moments of life, praying and voting for an end to the death penalty, hoping for tolerance and inclusiveness among both believers and unbelievers and finally, to look for signs of hope and resurrection in our own lives. We cannot enter into and hear this drama enough.

And what does the drama of “Dead man riding” show us? That justice is imperfect; that everyone is doomed to die; that we cannot expect God to intervene in our troubles; that faith matters only if it lasts till the last breath; that God’s ways are not our ways. The death of Jesus demonstrates that salvation depends on our hope that the God who invisibly leads us through life will visibly receive us after death. Only resurrection validates the life of Dead man riding to Dead Man Rising!

As we enter the Paschal Triduum on the evening of Holy Thursday, this weeks’ Catholic Update offers a reflection on balancing the events of these three days in our understanding the Sacrament of Eucharist in this Year of the Eucharist. 
A Stewardship Moment

This weekend we participate in the proclamation of the passion and death of Jesus according to the Gospel of Mark. In the extended version of this weekend’s Gospel reading, Jesus is at Gethsemane, praying to his Father, in much emotional distress. He knows he can save himself. He can escape over the Mount of Olives in the dead of night and make his way safely into the Judean desert. Instead, Jesus chooses obedience to his father and waits for his persecutors. As Saint Paul puts it in the letter to the Philippians, Jesus is “obedient to the point of death.” Jesus’ obedience is a lesson for those who are good stewards of their life in Christ. How might we be more obedient to the will of God instead of our own will?

Sunday, March 28, 2021
Seeing Ourselves in the Story

Today's readings: Procession: Mark 11:1–10 or John 12:12–16; Mass: Isaiah 50:4–7; Psalm 22:8–9, 17–18, 19–20, 23–24; Philemon 2:6–11; Mark 14:1–15:47. As Holy Week begins, we herald Jesus as he triumphantly enters Jerusalem. We cry, “Hosanna!” The excitement of his coming reaches us across time and space. Jesus is the one for whom Israel has been waiting. He will bring about the longed-for kingdom of justice and peace.

From jubilant welcome, the mood shifts quickly, and before long the crowd shouts again, this time not “Hosanna,” but “Crucify him!”

One way that we can reflect upon the events of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection is to imagine ourselves in the

story. If you were part of the crowd, what might have made you excited about Jesus as he entered? What might you have felt as public opinion changed, and people became fearful of him? Are you one of the disciples? How do you feel in the garden as Jesus prays? What is it like when he is arrested? Another perspective you might take is that of the women. They had come with Jesus to Jerusalem and were witnesses to all that had happened. What would it be like to see the passion through their eyes?

Entering into Holy Week, make space for silence, prayer, and reflection. Prepare yourself to celebrate the greatest of all mysteries, the moment that redeemed all of history: the resurrection.



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, March 29

Perfumed Oil

Jesus uses Mary's actions, anointing his feet, to again discuss his burial; like the grain of wheat, his death will bring about much fruit. Everything in Jesus' life at this time is pointing toward the laying down of his life. Look online for paintings of Mary anointing Jesus' feet and use them to enrich your reflection today. *Today's readings: Isaiah 42:1-7; Psalm 27:1, 2, 3, 13-14; John 12:1-11.*

Tuesday, March 30

Light to the Nations

In Isaiah we hear about the servant whose role is to restore Israel and be a light to the nations. This was the great hope of the people. Even those closest to the one we recognize as that servant reject him. Judas begins the work of his betrayal, and Jesus predicts Peter's denial. Because he was fully human, Jesus knew the sting of rejection. He models the kingdom of peace and justice that he inaugurates. *Today's readings: Isaiah 49:1-6; Psalm 71:1-2, 3-4a, 5ab-6ab, 15 and 17; John 13:21-33, 36-38.*

Wednesday, March 31

Betrayed

Jesus knew Judas would betray him but did not seek to protect himself. Isaiah's servant gives his back to those who beat him and his cheeks to those who pluck his beard, trusting that God will vindicate him. Throughout the passion, Jesus accepts what is coming because of this same trust. The evil and injustice in the world are disturbing. Jesus recognizes the brokenness and does not struggle against those who hurt him. But the entirety of his life is bringing about the kingdom of justice and peace, doing the work that will heal the world of its brokenness. How can we follow in this path? *Today's readings: Isaiah 50:4-9a; Psalm 69:8-10, 21-22, 31 and 33-34; Matthew 26:14-25.*

Thursday, April 1

I Have Given You a Model to Follow

Time and again, Jesus upended the expectations of the people around him. "You call me 'teacher' and 'master,' and rightly so, for indeed I am," he says. Those words convey power and authority. What does the master and teacher do? He empties himself of all that the world values. At the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the priest washes feet. If you do not usually attend this Mass, try to do so. The beauty of this moment strikes even young children. *Today's readings: Exodus 12:1-8, 11-14; Psalm 116:12-13, 15-16bc, 17-18; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; John 13:1-15.*

Friday, April 2

By His Wounds We Were Healed

Because Jesus was fully human, he knew all aspects of the human experience, including rejection, suffering, and death. If we jump from this moment to the resurrection, we fail to appreciate that Jesus is with us in our darkest times, waiting with us while we hope in God's ability to transform even those moments. Take time in quiet prayer, reflecting on the cross and Jesus' merciful love. *Today's readings: Isaiah 52:13-53:12; Psalm 31:2, 6, 12-13, 15-16, 17, 25; Hebrews 4:14-16, 5:7-9; John 18:1-19:42.*

Saturday, April 3

At the Easter Vigil, the readings take us through salvation history, from creation to the discovery of the empty tomb. We see how God prepared the world for its redemption. *Today's readings: Genesis 1:1-2:2; Psalm 104:1-2, 5-6, 10, 12, 13-14, 24, 35 or Psalm 33:4-5, 6-7, 12-13, 20-22; Genesis 22:1-18; Psalm 16:5, 8, 9-10, 11; Exodus 14:15-15:1; Exodus 15:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 17-18; Isaiah 54:5-14; Psalm 30:2, 4, 5-6, 11-12, 13; Isaiah 55:1-11; Isaiah 12:2-3, 4, 5-6; Baruch 3:9-15, 32-4:4; Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 11; Ezra 36:16-17a, 18-28; Psalm 42:3, 5; 43:3, 4 or Isaiah 12:2-3, 4bcd, 5-6 or Psalm 51:12-13, 14-15, 18-19; Romans 6:3-11; Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23; Mark 16:1-7.*
