

The following is from Fr. Dela Cruz's flock notes dated March 5, 2021:



MESSAGE FROM FR. LEANDRO 'Lines' DELA CRUZ

Dear Parishioners and Friends.

In this Sunday's gospel, John narrates Jesus' encounter with those profaning God's Sanctuary. His action simply demonstrates that He is actually God's wisdom and the fullness of the Law. His zeal distinguished Him from the authorities. Instead of representing God's interest, they represented their selfish economic and social interests. It also distinguishes Him from temple pilgrims who simply visited the temple without real devotion to God.

What do we learn from today's gospel? First, we are not supposed to keep quiet or remain indifferent while things go wrong. This is especially true in the house of God, our homes, offices or any place at all. We must also not allow our personal selfishness to destroy the lucidity of our church, family, state, or country. The Church is the house of God and a place of worship. We must keep it holy and respect it. Also, it reminds us that our body, and the body of Christ, is the Temple of God. So, we must not defile it.

Finally, Christ prophesied about His own death and resurrection: "Destroy this temple and I will raise it up in three days." This prophecy will be fulfilled during the paschal mystery. Therefore, this Sunday's gospel keeps the events of this season in perspective. It reminds us of where we are heading to this season, the death and the glory of resurrection of Jesus Christ.

So, as we march forward this season, let us continue to abide by the commandments of God fulfilled in Jesus Christ, the perfect wisdom. Let us acclaim Christ: "You, Lord, have the message of eternal life!"

An approval of a new vaccine, from Johnson and Johnson has been announced. Along with the approval also comes the questions on the morality of taking this new vaccine. Herewith, I provide to you the official statement of the Chairmen of Doctrine and Pro Life Committees of the USCCB.

Our Lenten and Easter schedule is released, kindly check the box below. We enjoin you to reserve your seats for Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. (Reservation Links for Holy Thursday and Good Friday will be posted on Monday.) As always, all the liturgies will be livestreamed. We excitedly await to participate at our Holy Week and Easter liturgies this year as we have missed out on these wonderful celebrations last year. We still continue the practice of giving communion to those following liturgies in their cars. Also, please know that the bishop continues to give dispensation on Sunday and Holy Day obligations.

Kindly note that the bishop also granted a diocesan-wide special dispensation from Lenten obligation of abstinence from meat on Friday, March 19, 2021, in honor of the Solemn Feast of St. Joseph, spouse of Mary. This is given as we dedicate this year as the "Year of St. Joseph." By the way, please check our March 18 schedule at 7PM, and in his honor, there will be a special virtual celebration of this very ordinary but amazing man prepared by Sr. Pat and her invited guests. Let us take the time to know who this man is. Kindly register/sign up at this **link**.

On behalf of the Knights of Columbus, I thank you for the amazing outpouring of your generosity to last Sunday's food drive. There was a 220 bags of food donation compared to a usual 150 bags that we ordinarily receive. Our acts of penances are indeed becoming fruitful as our hearts go out to help the poor and the needy. Continue to journey this 40 days of Lent without leaving no one along the way and always be conscious of God's presence as the source of holiness, kindness and strength in your life.

Let us continue to be safe and healthy for each other. While some of our parishioners have already received the vaccine, it is still not yet a reason for us to let our guard down. We shall continue to implement the regulations and protocols we have set to follow while we are in Church. While we are already allowed to increase our indoor attendance to 50% capacity, our safe seating capacity following social distancing norms allows us only up to 25-30%, which is 107 people at an individual distance. When there are more families-attendees, then a little more can be accommodated. We will stay with this number, for the very reason of health, safety and it being the prudent thing to do.

The pandemic trifecta is still a thing to do and practice: wear masks properly, sanitize constantly and follow social distancing.







GOSPEL

March 14, 2021 - John 3:14-21

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

Jesus said to Nicodemus: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him. Whoever believes in him will not be condemned, but whoever does not believe has already been condemned, because he has not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the verdict, that the light came into the world, but people preferred darkness to light, because their works were evil. For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

REFLECTION

Even during Lent we remain a joyful people, for we believe that God loves us despite our sinfulness, loves us so much that Jesus Christ sacrificed himself so that we may be redeemed and born into eternal life. Today on Laetare ("Rejoice") Sunday, we anticipate the joy we will feel on Easter. Let us give thanks to God for the grace and mercy we have regularly received and trust we will continue to receive throughout our lives.



Stream the Stations with Bishop O'Connell this Lent

Bishop David M. O'Connell, C.M., will lead a special, multimedia experience of the Way of the Cross, which will be available for streaming on the Diocese of Trenton's YouTube channel beginning Friday, February 19. The presentation will feature the watercolor portrayal of the 14 stations by popular 19th century French painter James Tissot, one of Bishop O'Connell's favorite artists. After experiencing a spiritual vision while visiting the Church of St. Sulpice in Paris, Tissot dedicated his artistry to portraying the life of Christ in 350 watercolors based upon the Gospels — 14 of which depict the Stations of the Cross. The entire collection was purchased by and remains on display with the Brooklyn Museum of Art.

Lord Jesus, at your command, the sick were made well! Come to our aid now, in the midst of the Global spread of the Corona Virus, that we may experience your healing love.



Fourth Sunday of Lent

Focus

A crucifix (with the figure of Christ) and a candle.

Introduction

St Augustine once said, 'In the Old Testament the New is concealed, and in the New Testament the Old is revealed.' In today's Gospel we reflect on an incident from the Book of Numbers that sheds light on Christ's mission to be the Saviour and Light of the World.

Gospel Acclamation

Light the Gospel candle and say together:

Alleluia, alleluia, may the Word of God make our thoughts loving, our words kind, and our hearts warm.

Gospel

A reading from the Gospel of St John (3:14-21) (See page 379.)

Reflection

Few children will know the Old Testament story about Moses that Jesus refers to in today's Gospel. Begin by sharing this story which can be found in Numbers 21:4-9. (See page 380.)

Moses raised a bronze serpent in the desert. How would the Son of Man be raised?

'Son of Man' is a phrase used to describe Jesus, the Son of God. Jesus would be raised up on Good Friday when he was nailed to the cross and crucified. Both Moses and Jesus acted in obedience to God's will; one lifted up the serpent in the desert, and the other lifted up his life on the cross.

God saved his people from death in the desert by raising a serpent for them. How did he save his people for ever by raising his only beloved Son on the cross?

At the time of Moses and Jesus, the Israelites had allowed sin to take hold of their hearts and minds. Just like the serpent's venom, this sin poisoned their lives and resulted in their spiritual death, as it destroyed their loving relationship with God. Moses lifted up the serpent and God lifted up his Son. These images portray both the sin that was destroying their lives and the means by which God would save his people. The Son of Man was lifted up and became the source of healing for all who believe in him. Christ our Saviour willingly carried the sins of the world with him to Calvary, and as he was put to death on the cross, they died too.

What did Jesus promise to those who believe in him? Jesus said that whoever believes in him will have eternal life. As Jesus died, all our wrongdoings and sins died with him; as he rose to new life, we were reborn with him.

Who is described as 'the Light of the World'?

Jesus often referred to himself as 'the Light' who had come to shine in the darkness of our sinful world and

show us the way back to God. He calls us to be children of the light.

Why do some people prefer the darkness to the light? Keeping ourselves in the dark means that we can say that we can't see what we should be doing. If we can't see the way to go, then we can stay where we are, without changing or moving on with our lives. We can make excuses and go through life refusing to know or experience God's love, or allowing it transform our lives.

Why should we choose the light instead of darkness? The love of Jesus will shine in our lives, filling them with warmth and life if we choose to let it. His light will allow us to see the chances we are offered every day to live for God instead of ourselves, to love him and one another above all else. Flooding our hearts with light means that the shadow and darkness of sin and selfishness can have no place in our lives, as we choose God's way instead of our own.

Activity

Photocopy the cross designs on to thin card and cut out. Help the children to decorate these in bright colours to reflect the light that Christ brought into the darkness of our world by dying on the cross. Sellotape safety pins on to the back so that the children can wear their crosses as badges for the world to see!

Intercessions

As brothers and sisters in one loving family, together let us pray to our heavenly Father:

Let the light of Christ shining in our lives change the darkness of hunger, poverty, and injustice in our world.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Let the light of Christ guide and direct the Church and her leaders.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Let the light of Christ transform the darkness of sadness for those who mourn.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.


Let the light of Christ warm cold hearts with forgiveness and friendship.

ADULT CONFIRMATION PREPARATION 2021

Not to be confused with the R.C.I.A. process (designed to bring people into full communion with the Catholic Church), this process is designed for Catholics (16 years of age and older) seeking the sacrament of Confirmation, who are baptized Catholic, and have had some instruction in the Catholic Faith. There are many reasons that a number of Catholics never had the opportunity to confirm their faith through the Sacrament of Confirmation—a move, a change of parish, or just lost touch with my faith. Whatever the reason, we can help. The parish usually confirms adults who have completed their preparation on the Feast of Pentecost at the 11:00 a.m. Mass.

Catholic Liturgy & Our Participation in the Paschal Mystery

Ideas from Bishop Ken Untener, late Bishop of Saginaw Adapted for The Church of Saint Ann

Liturgy of the Eucharist II (Eucharistic Prayer)

e have seen that the third "movement" of the Mass is the Liturgy of the Eucharist which has three parts. We will now look at the second part—the Eucharistic Prayer.

In the earliest days of the Church there were no fixed Eucharistic prayers. Presiders remained faithful to the Lord's command to "do this in memory of me," and used their own words in doing so. Gradually, as the Church grew, this prayer took on a set pattern, and then set words. Various forms developed in different places. In the United States we currently have several Eucharistic prayers.

The Eucharistic Prayer is like a toast: on behalf of the entire group, one member speaks to the person who is being toasted. In this case the presider (who is part of the assembly) speaks on behalf of the entire assembly to God, and we give acclamations along the way. It is important to keep this in mind; from beginning to end the Eucharistic Prayer is addressed to God—not to the assembly, not to the bread and wine, but to God. And the whole group is part of what is being spoken to God. The presider never says "I". It is always "we".

Unless we recognize this, we can become simply recipients of the prayer, passive spectators, rather than people actively making this offering! Our part in it is clear in the prayer immediately following the words of institution. Note whom is being addressed (italics), and who is making the offering (bold print):

"Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemp tion. We recall Christ's death, his resurrection, and his ascension to your right hand; and, looking forward to his coming in glory, we offer you his body and blood, the ac ceptablesacrifice which brings salvation to the whole world."

In the Eucharistic Prayer, time dissolves. Christ on the cross is made present to us and we to him. We join with him as, with great trust, he gives himself completely to the Father, and with him all of us. This is why we come to the Eucharist. This is what we do each time we place ourselves on the altar.

When it comes time for us to die, we should be able to say, "I've done this over and over. Time after time at the Eucharist I have joined with the Lord in his dying on the cross, trusting, trusting that for me as for him it is a birth...that in giving myself completely to

God, I discover my destiny, a fullness of life I would otherwise never have come to know."

Listen to what the General Instruction of the Roman Missal says about the offering that takes place in the Eucharistic Prayer:

"The Church—and in particular the Church here and now assembled—offers the spotless victim to the Father in the Holy Spirit. The Church's intention is that the faithful not only offer this victim but also learn to offer themselves, through Christ the sole Mediator, to an ever more complete union with the Father and with each other, so that at last God may be all in all."

That is why the Eucharistic Prayer ends with what we call "the Great Amen." It is a crescendo, a summary of what we have done, a final uplifting of all of us, all creation—with Christ—to God: "Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever. Amen."

And with that "Amen," the second part of the Liturgy of the Eucharist ends, and we move into the third part, the Communion Rite.

Applying the Eucharistic Prayer to Daily Living:

- Acknowledge the presence of others, especially at home or work.
- Be present to (give your undivided attention to) those people you are committed to: spouse, children, parents, coworkers, friends.
- See Christ's presence in all people.
- Be a person of gratitude, going out of your way to thank others for small things. Thank God at all times, especially for the many blessings you have.
- Offer your life to God, striving to make meaningful your days at work or at home by setting aside time for God in prayer, discerning what and where God is calling you.

"New Stimulus Package Approved by Congress"

Section 2204. Allowance of partial above the line deduction for charitable contributions. The provision encourages Americans to contribute to churches and charitable organizations in 2020 by permitting them to deduct up to \$300 of cash contributions, whether they itemize their deductions or not.

Section 2205. Modification of limitations on charitable contributions during 2020. The provision increases the limitations on deductions for charitable contributions by individuals who itemize, as well as corporations. For individuals, the 50 percent of adjusted gross income limitation is suspended for 2020. For corporations, the 10 percent limitation is increased to 25 percent of taxable income. This provision also increases the limitation on deductions for contributions of food inventory from 15 percent to 25 percent.
