The buzz around the schools this fall has focused on momentum, optimism, and Holy Spirit's presence with waves of positivity in both measurable and blessed ways.




The Irish's commendable fall sports season is summarized on pages 8-9, highlighting several teams and athletes who finished with outstanding seasons.

St. Augustine Teacher Ryan Moyer Honored as 'Very Best' in Michigan

St. Augustine second grade teacher Ryan Moyer received the 2024 Faith-Filled Educator Award by the Michigan Association of Non-Public Schools (MANS) at their annual Education Conference in Detroit in October.

Each year MANS recognizes two teachers in Michigan who exemplify 'the very best in faith-based education,' who are passionate about their students and models of faith.

"Almost all of our students have been touched by the heart of Mr. Moyer," says St. Augustine Principal Andra Zommers. "Our community is blessed to have Mr. Moyer preparing young students to receive the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist for the last nine years. He loves our Catholic faith, and he wants the same for all our students."

Students celebrated Mr. Moyer Day by wearing red, Mr. Moyer's favorite color, in place of their uniforms. The PTO provided treats for the entire school.

"Mr. Moyer has also inspired our school family to become a singing school, lifting our voices to praise God at each school Mass," says Zommers. "All of this comes from his love of Christ and his desire to help students grow in faith."

rimage on The Sacred Camino De Santiago Trail

In the centuries following the discovery of what are believed to be the remains of St. James in 833, the Camino de Santiago (*Way of James*) has provided a route of sacred Catholic significance. Next summer, Hackett Spanish teacher Mark Voege will begin a nearly 500-mile journey on the trail.

Leading to the shrine of the apostle James in the cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, the trail has three main routes with multiple trailheads originating throughout Spain, Portugal, and France, where Voege will start his journey. Each route culminates at the cathedral shrine in northwestern Spain.

Over the course of the seven-week journey, Voege will be accompanied on the trail by his wife Sharon, Principal of Immaculate Conception Catholic School in Three Rivers.

"This journey fulfills so many aspects of my personality," says Voege who plans to complete the 484-mile route in June and July, averaging nearly 10 miles a day.

"In recent year's, I've become especially driven to be in good

shape, and the conditioning required to endure seven weeks on a rugged trail in the summer heat is going to challenge me in new ways, and I think exciting ways," says Voege. "But beyond the physical aspects, this will be a journey that I expect to bring me to new levels of spiritual awareness that I can't even imagine."

Besides the physical and logistical preparations, the Voeges plan to promote their plans as a means of raising both money and Catholic awareness. Funds raised throughout their endeavor will be evenly divided between their two schools, with 100% going to support Catholic education. Both plan to use their pilgrimage as an opportunity to educate their students of the trail's cultural significance in the Catholic faith.

"There is so much planning involved with this, but upon arrival at the trailhead, that phase ends and the unknown begins," says Voege. "When I take my first step, I will do it with an open mind and heart for whatever God has in store. That excites me."

Student Ambassadors Serve as the Face of Catholic Schools

Hackett Senior Owen Widman's introduction to the high school's Student Ambassador program was typical of many in the group. "I wasn't really familiar with the program until Mrs. (Shelly) Germinder pulled me aside and asked if I would consider interviewing for it," says Widman. "But I was definitely intrigued by the idea when she explained it."

Student Ambassadors are a group of 30 juniors and seniors who are recommended by teachers, staff or current Ambassadors. The expectation is for two years of service, with roles in high-visibility outreach positions that include front-line assignments at CSGK events and community Mass held at HCP.

"This has been a rewarding reboot of a former program at Hackett," says CSGK's Tylina Zimmerman, who directs the program with Allie Stokes, CSGK Enrollment and Marketing Coordinator. "Last year involved a lot of fine-tuning the scope of the program and this year we have really hit the ground running."

Students interested in joining the program go through a rigorous process which includes an interview with Germinder and Zimmerman. "Since most Ambassador duties include

interacting with donors, alumni, parents, and potential new students, the interview is a key part of the process," says Zimmerman.

Ambassadors frequently serve as event greeters, a role that includes the ability not only to welcome guests, but also engage with them at receptions and in other social situations.

"One of my assignments this fall was to greet and escort guests for Hackett's annual Memorial Mass," says Widman. "Afterwards, at the reception, two other Ambassadors and I ended up sitting at a table with some of our senior ladies and we all ended up having a great time learning about each other."

Other service opportunities have ranged from writing thank you cards to some non-traditional positions such as serving as a cook and food runner at one of Fr. Bob Creagan's stately rectory dinners.

An impactful moment for two Ambassadors came in October when Thea Husovska and Grahm Zygadlo spoke to donors at an event at the Kalamazoo Country Club. (See transcripts of speeches on page 6.)

"I was blown away by Thea and Grahm," says Widman. "They delivered messages in ways that captivated that room. They raised the bar for me. We support each other and develop a deeper connection through events like that. We all had interesting conversations with some amazing guests that evening, and we definitely enjoyed bonding over the country club's desserts."

Alumni Memory

When I think back on my years at St. Augustine, I think how it prepared me for life. We went to Mass every school day from grade 1 through 12. The nuns were strict, and they wanted us to learn, and they made me a good student. I especially remember Sister Olympia, my 10th and 11th grade English teacher who inspired me to pursue college.

My family went to St. Monica starting when the parish was first organized about 1953. Father Nadrach, the first pastor, had an office in the back, lower part of the building on the corner of Buchanan St. He had a small altar in the room and held daily Mass there. I never went to St. Monica school. I was out of 8th grade before the school was built. I was at St. Augustine all 12 years.

Graduation meant we were faced with being drafted to go to Vietnam. I wasn't excited to join at the time since 500 servicemen were coming back every week in body bags. I enlisted to avoid the draft because I thought my chances of survival were better, nor did I then or now have any desire to kill anyone. I saw the draft as two years or life, whichever is shorter. The Navy offered a four-year enlistment.

I certainly had experiences I would never have had otherwise, and it changed my direction in life. I voluntarily stayed in the active Navy Reserve for an additional six years. My friends, Stephen, James, and Patrick, I think had careers they would have never pursued otherwise.
