Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This Third Sunday in Ordinary Time is the second universal observance of "The Sunday of the Word of God," which Pope Francis first called for on September 30, 2019. According to a Vatican News article, "The Pope intends it to be a day dedicated to the celebration, reflection and dissemination of the Word."

You might say (like many preachers), "Well, don't we do this every Sunday?" Gosh, I sure hope so! But only fifty years ago, the Sunday Eucharist did not include as much Scripture as we have now. In fact, the Sacred Scriptures sort of took a back seat to Sacred Tradition, though that certainly was not the intention of the Church. Today, we are nourished first at the Table of the Word, and are then led to the Table of the Eucharist, with the homily serving as a reflection rooted in Scripture, which applies its lessons to our daily lives. Perhaps this Sunday of the Word of God could lead us to a "Week of the Word of God" by spending some time with the Sacred Scriptures and letting them guide our prayer in the coming days.

Speaking of praying at home, I'm hearing good things about our family-based process of faith formation. Some of those good things were on display in last week's bulletin and are again this week. As I have said before, COVID-19 forced us to change the way we do things, although this is an example of something we probably should have looked at changing long before since it has rightly returned the responsibility of handing down the faith to parents and guardians, to whom it first belongs. I pray that this new way forward which we are charting together will help all of us – children and adults – grow our relationship with the Lord through the gift of Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition.

One COVID-related change I have not appreciated (among so many others) is not having altar servers at Mass. We have been blessed by the service of Mike Dazley, who is now less than eight months to diaconate ordination, although we would like to begin scheduling an altar server whenever Mike is not present to exercise his

ministry of acolyte at the Sunday Masses. To that extent, I ask that parents and guardians of any current or perhaps new altar servers please email Kathy Otermat (<a href="mailto:kotermat04@gmail.com">kotermat04@gmail.com</a>) so that we can begin to develop that schedule at our two parishes.

This weekend, the Church in the United States has an opportunity to support the work of the Church in Latin America through the annual national Collection for the Church in Latin America. I think you have an envelope for this special collection in your box. Our donations help build up the universal Church by strengthening families, funding Catholic education, and fostering priestly and religious vocations. Thank you for your financial and prayerful support of the People of God in that part of the world.

Finally, many of you woke up last Monday morning to the news that Rosary Cathedral had been vandalized. Very sadly, by the end of the day, a 24-year-old Toledo Police officer had been shot and killed by the person suspected of that act, who was also shot and killed. Let us therefore pray for the repose of the soul of Officer Brandon Stalker, and ask God to comfort his fiancée, young child, and the rest of his family, including the Toledo Police Department. Let us also ask God, whose mercy is beyond our human understanding, to extend forgiveness to Christopher Harris, who killed Officer Stalker, and to comfort the hearts of those who love him, too.

Our Lady, Queen of the Most Holy Rosary and Mother of Sorrows, pray for us!

### NEW HABITS INSPIRED BY SUNDAY OF THE WORD OF GOD

# "God's word constantly reminds us of the merciful love of the Father who calls his children to live in love."

Sunday of the Word of God is an opportunity for families and households to consider incorporating Scripture more intentionally into their daily and weekly routines. Learning new habits can be challenging but they can also be fun. Here are some simple and fun ways families can routinely bring the Word of God more regularly into their lives. Pick one of these four suggestions and make reading Scripture a new habit for your family.

### USCCB Daily Readings Podcast

The USCCB has a daily podcast with an audio recording of each day's Mass readings. A family can gather in the evening before night prayers and listen to today's (or tomorrow's readings). Then, the family can go around person by person and share one question or thought which came up from these readings. The family can pray their intentions for the day — including thanksgiving for the blessings of the day — and conclude with an Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be, before going to bed.

### Pamily Lectio Divina

Lectio Divina is an ancient practice of prayerfully reading Scripture. A family can take 10 minutes after dinner once a week to read the upcoming Sunday's Gospel. One person reads the Sunday Gospel once, followed by 30 seconds of silence; then a second reading of the same Gospel, followed by 30 seconds of silence; then a third reading followed by 30 seconds of silence. After the third reading and silence, each member of the family shares one word or phrase they thought was most important.

# A Reading the Gospel before dinner

Before eating, read a few verses of the Gospel (just start with the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter 1 here) followed by grace before meals. This can lead to great dinner conversation about the words, parables, or miracles of Jesus.

**Pro Tip:** Pick your favorite story as a "Family Gospel Story" when you complete each of the four Gospels. Use these Gospel stories for special family occasions for years to follow.

## **Family Catechesis**



This week our Family Formation lesson focuses on God's Call to Us. We know that God has special jobs for those who listen and obey. We will learn two new words, discern and Vocation.
