# OCIA, STRUCTURE OF PERIODS AND STEPS

We have been considering the *Order of Christian Initiation of Adults* in anticipation of the release of the new translation in November of this year. We now turn to an examination of the structure of the official Order, namely, as arranged as a series of periods punctuated by "steps."

Christian initiation, by its very nature, requires time. And by its nature, Christian initiation is a communal enterprise. The unbaptized adult encounters the Gospel, and the gradual process of conversion begins. While we do not doubt that God can bring people rapidly to a point of deep faith and trust, the Church prudently structures this gradual process over an extended period of time in order to successfully and organically incorporate catechumens into the community of the faithful. Each catechumen's "spiritual journey" is unique and must be treated as such, but it is not an individual journey. It is a journey in the context of a community, and the Christian community reflects with the catechumens as they pass from period to period, celebrating with them each step along the way. The parish community has a responsibility to celebrate these rites with the catechumens as they progress through their spiritual journey.

Specifically, Christian Initiation is divided into 4 periods, separated by 3 steps. The first period "consists of inquiry on the part of the candidates and of evangelization and the precatechumenate on the part of the Church" (RCIA, 7.I). This period ends with the rite of acceptance into the order of the catechumenate. This first step is

celebrated in the parish community itself.

The second period is the catechumenate itself. This period can last for an extended time, even for several years, and includes catechesis and the rites connected with catechesis. During this period, the catechumen grows in their relationship with the Christian community. This period ends with the rite of election. This step is normally celebrated in the context of the local Church community, celebrated with the local Bishop and other catechumens from the diocese.

The third period marks a more immediate preparation for the celebration of the sacraments, and it is referred to as the period of purification and enlightenment. The catechumens, now numbered among the elect, join the Christian community in a period of intense preparation for the celebration of Easter. For the elect, this includes the celebration of the rites belonging to this period, especially the scrutinies. This period ends with the celebration of the sacraments of initiation, namely baptism and confirmation, which normally happens in the parish itself during the Easter Vigil. The neophytes also receive first communion. This celebration of the sacraments of initiation comprises the third and final step of Christian Initiation.

Study Editions: English, Spanish The fourth and final period extends throughout the Easter season after the neophytes' initiation, and it is usually referred to as the period of postbaptismal catechesis and mystagogy. "It is a time for deepening the Christian experience, for spiritual growth, and for entering more fully into the life and unity of the community" (RCIA, 7.4).

As the order itself notes, "the whole initiation must bear a markedly paschal character" (RCIA, 8). This is clearest when the order is aligned to the liturgical year, and the sacraments are celebrated at the Easter Vigil, on Easter Sunday, or during the Easter Season. The paschal character of baptism is particularly emphasized within the celebration of the Easter Vigil, and so reserving the Easter Vigil for the celebration of adult baptism (and the neophytes' subsequent confirmation and reception of communion) is most appropriate.

These periods and steps only apply to the unbaptized. Those who are already baptized do not pass through these steps and periods, strictly speaking. The only step for them is the reception into full communion and their confirmation (and subsequent reception of the Eucharist). Nonetheless, their process of conversion is analogous, and the Order gives rites which the church can celebrate as these candidates prepare for reception into full communion, such as the calling of candidates to continuing conversion. Each of these is optional.

In the months ahead, we will examine each period and step individually as accompanied by the newly translated *Order of Christian Initiation of Adults*.
