Pope Leo: Intelligence is seeking life's true meaning, not having reams of data


VATICAN CITY (CNS) – Access to vast amounts of data and information is not the same thing as having intelligence, which is uniquely human and requires being open to truth, goodness and the real meaning of life, Pope Leo XIV told AI experts and executives.

"Authentic wisdom has more to do with recognizing the true meaning of life than with the availability of data," he said in a written message released by the Vatican June 20.

"Acknowledging and respecting what is uniquely characteristic of the human person is essential to the discussion of any adequate ethical framework for the governance of AI."

The message, written in English, was addressed to people attending the second annual Rome conference on AI, Ethics and the Future of Corporate Governance being held in Rome and at the Vatican June 19-20.

The conference "brings together executives from leading AI companies as well as large enterprises using AI with policymakers, scholars, ethicists and lawyers to consider in a holistic way the challenges facing the ethics and governance of AI, both for companies developing this revolutionary technology as well as the enterprises incorporating AI into their

businesses," according to the event's website.

Speakers included representatives from top Altech firms such as Google, IBM, Anthropic, Palantir Technologies, Cohere and AI21 Labs. Speakers from the Vatican included: Archbishop Edgar Peña Parra, the substitute for general affairs in the Vatican Secretariat of State; Archbishop Carlo Maria Polvani, secretary of the Dicastery for Culture and Education; Archbishop Vincenzo Paglia, retired president of the Pontifical Academy for Life; and Franciscan

A new semi-annual Natural Family Planning Instructor Gathering was also launched, providing ongoing education and fellowship for instructors, clergy and medical professionals.

Additionally, new bilingual instructors and medical professionals are discerning advanced fertility care training, helping ensure that these vital services are accessible across cultures and languages.

Students and their families took up the invitation to encounter Christ, form a relationship, and bring him to the world, making disciples. It was wonderful to see the number of students going above and


beyond what was required to serve others in their community as well as the outpouring of support for the students from families, volunteers and community businesses.

Less than a week after we held the Oklahoma March for Life leading to the capitol to proclaim the sanctity of every human life, the state has again carried out an intentional killing with the Thursday execution of John Fitzgerald Hanson. This is the second execution carried out this year in Oklahoma.

In the aftermath of heinous crimes the victims of violence and their loved ones deserve our compassion and support - spiritual, pastoral and personal. We must pray for healing for those families and assist them to heal from their often unimaginable grief whenever possi-

Execution of the perpetrator, however, cannot heal those terrible wounds. The pain and loss of one death cannot be offset by another violent death. The death penalty remains an inhumane method of punishment. It is opposed to the respect we ought to cherish for human life in our

society as we pursue authentic justice for all.

I encourage all to pray and come together in advocating for an end to the death penalty in our state and nationwide. Let us work to create a society that prioritizes life and justice, and for alternatives to capital punishment that uphold the dignity of all human beings.

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Please join me in praying for the victim, Mary Bowles, and her family, as well as John Hanson and his family.

The Saint Francis of Assisi Knights Council was formed May 19, 1955, with 36 charter members under Father J.L. Walch. Today, the number remains strong with more than 40 members. And they remain committed to carrying on a theme of service.

"As a rural parish," said Deacon Bill Horinek, "we have continued to enable our parish family to remain vibrant and active in the church through social functions in our day-to-day parish life."

A favorite parish event is the turkey bingo and chili fundraiser, which brings out not only parishioners from Saint Francis of Assisi, but also Saint Mary Catholic Church in Ponca City, as well as

community supporters outside the Catholic Church. The program is held in the church gym ahead of the Thanksgiving holiday, with a "bingo" securing a family a turkey.

The organization also has a big program in its 40 Cans for Lent drive, which sees non-perishable food items donated across Kay County.

"Typically, we gather 400-500 pounds of food," Horinek said. "This year, a portion is going to go to New Emergency Resources Agency (NERA), Ponca City and a portion will go to local food pantries in cooperation with several churches."

The work of the Knights stretches outside the parish and into other organizations, not just NERA, but also Living Hope Pregnancy Center in Ponca City. In a way, it comes full circle as many of the founding council members and their families were those who were agricultural producers, families who made their livings in the landfill. Families with members still today, including the Schiebers, Vaps and Horineks.

"A lot of our council members were farmers, and we still have a few farmers today," Curtis Vap said. "Nine of our current members are sons of charter mem-

The goal of the Saint Francis of Assisi Knights is to support the parish behind the scenes, supporting parish activities any way

"We support the social and Liturgical life of the parish," Horinek said, "and we promote families within the parish community, and through our work we help support the clergy."

St. Patrick Catholic Church celebrates 75 years

n the evening of Tuesday, June 10 exactly 75 years from the first Mass celebrated at Saint Patrick Catholic Parish inside Saint Ann's Home for the Aged - clergy, parishioners, former parish school students, special guests and friends gathered to celebrate a milestone anniversary at Saint Patrick Catholic Church.

The festivities featured a "Walk Down Memory Lane" photo exhibit of the construction progress of the "Church that the People Built," while attendees enjoyed a wine and cheese social. More than 100 photos were available for viewing, including a black and white photo of the first Mass in the completed church.

Archbishop Coakley celebrated a 75th Anniversary Mass, along with concelebrant Father Joseph H. Arledge, pastor of Saint Patrick.

Special guests included Masters of Ceremony Father Stephen Bird and Father Rodrigo Serna; additional concelebrating priests Father Joseph Irwin, Father Cristobal de Loera and Father Raul Sanchez; and assisting Deacon Duane Fischer, Deacon Dennis Frazier and Deacon Fernando Marin.

Prelude music featured Brad Kenna on the bagpipe playing "The Little Spree" and "The Highland Cathedral." The processional hymn "The Church's One Foundation" set the tone for the Holy Mass

Immediately following Mass, participants gathered around the Saint Patrick statue at the church entrance for a commemorative photo before processing to a catered reception in the

About Saint Patrick Catholic Church

Saint Patrick Catholic Church began in Northwest Oklahoma City on June 10, 1950, fulfilling the vision of Bishop Eugene McGuinness. The first Mass was celebrated by the first parish pastor, Father Michael McNamee, in

what is now called Trinity Gardens (formerly Saint Ann's Home for the Aged), located west of the church property.

Beginning with 120 families and a priority to construct a school, Father McNamee successfully raised the funds to break ground in January 1951. The Saint Patrick Parish Grade School soon opened in September 1952, serving first-through-eighth grades with an enrollment of 200 students. The Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth, Kansas, were the first teachers to teach the students in the new school.

By 1955, a growing parish of 550 families and a new school under then-pastor Monsignor Kanaly, readied plans to build a new church. The new church needed to be practical, liturgically in keeping with the "mind of the church," and a work of art. These tenets of design guided the plans for a modern church within a church. Built almost entirely by the parishioners numbering in the hundreds, who worked day, night and weekends over more than a two-year span, the new church was dedicated on Sept. 23, 1962.

The modern cathedral, which was designed by architect Robert Lawton Jones of the Tulsa firm Murray Jones Murray and engineer Felix Candela, was awarded the Cardinal Lercaro Gold Medal in 1962, by the North American Liturgical Conference as the outstanding Catholic church

built in the country over a three-year period. Among other honors was one of four equal awards given by the National Council of Churches and the Church Architectural Guild of America in 1963.

The church's design elements have won numerous awards since it was built

The church also was listed among the "Top Five Favorite Sites for Oklahoma City Architecture at its Finest," featured in Oklahoma Today

in 2000, and was featured in The Oklahoman as one of the "Ten Architecturally Significant Religious Buildings in Oklahoma City" by Oklahoma City metro architects in 2002.

The Saint Patrick parish is a culturally diverse parish serving the needs of many including Anglo, Asian, African and Hispanic families. English, Spanish and bilingual Masses are a celebrated part of special events and certain Holy Days within the Saint Patrick Catholic Church community.



Program for teachers is 'a true gift'

Exposure to a new way of teaching has proven invaluable for Mary Cross, a pre-kindergarten teacher at All Saints Catholic School in

Cross is part of a cohort of teachers and staff from the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City and the Diocese of Tulsa who are enrolled in the Catholic Educator Formation and Credential program. The 18-month program is administered by the Institute for Catholic Liberal Education.

"ICLE has given me the ability to teach to the whole child - mind, body and spirt," Cross said. The program "encourages me to nurture not just the students' cognitive skills, but also their moral, social and spiritual growth."

Mary Thibodeau, who will teach Latin in the 2025-26 school year at Saint Philip Neri Catholic School in Midwest City, said "wholeness" has been one of the major takeaways from the pro-

"It is the wholeness that leads to holiness," Thibodeau said. "We don't teach math or English or PE. We don't teach first-graders or middle schoolers. What we teach

are students. We teach students who may come to us as early as 3 years old but will someday be adults. We are teaching the whole person, not just one subject for

A goal of the coursework is to help teachers move from a secular view of education to one deeply committed to Catholicism. The program also provides tools to help teachers improve lesson planning and time management.

"ICLE has shown me a world rich in art, music, literature and beauty that I can now share with my students," said Margaret Acevedo, who teaches Spanish and religion at Saints Peter and Paul Catholic School in Tulsa. "I feel confident taking on my new role as a second-grade teacher thanks to ICLE and am looking forward to sharing my newfound knowledge with them.'

Emily Ginn, a first-year teacher at Saint Mary Catholic School in Ponca City, said the program provided a much-needed foundation and practical skills she could apply in her classroom. Among the fruits: a considerable increase in her fourth-grade students' desire

"I watched their reading stamina grow steadily through the year, knowing it was a direct result of

what I learned through the ICLE program," Ginn said.

"Through mentorship, real classroom feedback and shared experiences, I've become a more confident, capable teacher. This program is a true gift -- not just to me, but to every student I will ever





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Director's Touch

Fr. Bird retiring from Divine Worship office, leaving his mark on archdiocese's major events

n another life, Father Stephen Bird might have been a Broadway director, utilizing a keen eye for great artistic endeavors and a skill for guiding elaborate productions. And he does carry a passion for the arts, particularly the stage.

The Good Lord, however, had a different plan for Father Bird's talents – beyond the priesthood – one that led to a 46-year term leading the Secretariat of Divine Worship, even before the office officially existed. The curtain closes on this extended run July 1 when Father Bird retires from the post, leaving decades of behind-the-scenes orchestration of the liturgy and music and more that has marked the many significant events of the archdiocese.

"Father Bird's service as director of the Secretariat of Divine Worship for all of these years has been exemplary," Archbishop Paul Coakley said. "He has an amazing care for the important details that are so important in the sacred liturgy." "Fat

Father Bird remains pastor of Epiphany of the Lord
Catholic Church in Oklahoma
City, as he retires only from a secondary role that leaned into his strengths, which then-Archbishop Charles Salatka recognized in the late '70s before he handpicked Father Bird for a new position in 1979.

The job has developed and grown at times through the years, and many have aided Father Bird along the way, yet he has served as the point man for providing the details for ordinations of priests and deacons, for priest funerals, for the installation of three archbishops. And he's coordinated major events, like the annual Chrism Mass, the beatification of Blessed Stanley Rother, the Jubilee Year Celebration in 2000 and the 100th anniversary of the Diocese of Oklahoma in 2005 – both held at the Myriad/Cox Convention Center – and the dedication of the Blessed Stanley Rother Shrine, among others.

"Father Bird's commitment to excellence sometimes disappears into the background because it has been practiced for so long," said Father Don Wolf, rector of the Blessed Stanley Rother Shrine. "We get used to it and imagine every celebration and every liturgical moment is well-planned, quietly executed and easily performed, since they all are. But we forget it is not so.

"Father Bird has always been successful working with all those involved in the celebrations of the archdiocese, both clergy and lay. He has never faltered in his insis-

tence on excellence and preparation."

So, what does a director of divine worship do? It's not just in the details; *it is the details*

Fans of Broadway easily relate to the stars and offer standing ovations to cheer their performances. Dame Judi Dench. Julie Andrews. Idina Menzel. James Earl Jones. Sir Ian McKellen. Jonathan Groff. Masters of the craft through the ages.

Yet it's the director's unseen guidance and handling of the details that makes a performance truly rise.

So it is with an ordination or a special celebration or in accommodating a crowd of more than 20,000 as well as bishops from across the U.S. and beyond for the beatification of the first American-born martyr.

For important events and Masses in the archdiocese, large and small, the director plays the lead role in the effective planning, coordinating and execution of all aspects of liturgical celebrations. Working in coordination with the archbishop, they ensure that worship services are meaningful,

and his ability to recognize and compliment people when needed have been truly inspiring."

Father Bird's inspiration began at an early age in Lake Charles, Louisiana, where he jumped into the elementary school chorus. And his love for song and performance only grew, even as his family moved to Oklahoma and he attended Bishop McGuinness Catholic High School, and on to seminary and into his priesthood, where Archbishop Salatka eventually recognized Father Bird's talents and plugged him into a director role that took the place of a commission.

Now he's providing the inspiration, through careful planning and music and atmosphere and liturgy.

"Two celebrations are uppermost in my mind," said Archbishop Coakley, "since my arrival in the archdiocese 14 years ago: the Beatification of Blessed Stanley Rother and the dedication of the Blessed Stanley Rother Shrine.

"I participate in liturgies around the

engaging and in accordance with Catholic tradition. That includes overseeing music, vestments, the liturgical environment and the training of liturgical ministers, as well as written worship materials like pro-

Father Bird likens it to the performer spinning plates atop a pole, like the guy in the old variety shows, hustling from pole to pole, making sure no plates fall.

"That's kind of the way I describe my life," he said, "trying to keep it all straight in my head. But I've enjoyed it. I like details."

And he's a master of the details.

"Father Bird has a great love for the Church and its liturgy," said Michael Scott, an administrative assistant who works closely with Father Bird in the Secretariat for Divine Worship. "His commitment runs deep. He creates meaningful worship experiences, especially the times that the whole archdiocese comes together."

Said Father Zak Boazman, who will be stepping into Father Bird's seat as director: "Over the past four years, I have witnessed Father Bird's unwavering commitment and dedication to his role, as he has consistently taken every decision with the utmost seriousness, as if it were his first day. His meticulous attention to detail

country and I would say that ours are equal to any. I credit Father Bird with establishing a culture within our archdiocese in which reverent, beautiful and prayerful liturgies are not the exception, but the norm."

The director's touch.

"It's something I love, I still love," Father Bird said. "But I also know it's time to let somebody else take it on."


So what's next?

There will be time for Father Bird's other passion, attending plays locally and in New York City when time allows. And he may yet have a production or two still to pull off, beginning with a capital campaign at Epiphany – his other full-time job.

The parish turns 50 next summer, cause for celebration. And planning. And directing.

"You know, our tentative project title is 50/50, celebrating the past 50 and empowering the church for the next 50, preparing it for the next generation of people," said Father Bird, who will coincidentally be celebrating his 50th anniversary in the priesthood. "So that in itself can be a big thing to do, something challenging."

Pope Leo: Intelligence is seeking life's true meaning, not having reams of data

Father Paolo Benanti, a member of the U.N. AI committee and a professor of moral theology at Rome's Pontifical Gregorian University.

In his message, Pope Leo said their presence "attests to the urgent need for serious reflection and ongoing discussion on the inherently ethical dimension of AI, as well as its responsible governance."

"Together with its extraordinary potential to benefit the human family, the rapid development of AI also raises deeper questions concerning the proper use of such technology in generating a more authentically just and human global society," he wrote.

He reiterated Pope Francis' definition of AI platforms as "tools," which, he said, reflect "the human intelligence that crafted them and draw much of their ethical force from the intentions of the individuals that

While "in some cases. AI has been used in positive and indeed noble ways to promote greater equality," he wrote, "there is likewise the possibility of its misuse for selfish gain at the expense of others, or worse, to foment conflict and

all the need to weigh the ramifications of AI in light of the 'integral development of the human person and society," he wrote. That means the material, intellectual and spiritual well-being of the human person must be considered, human dignity must be safeguarded, and the cultural and spiritual riches and diversity of the world's peoples must be respected.

"Acknowledging and respecting what is uniquely characteristic of the human person is essential to the discussion of any adequate ethical framework for the governance of AI."

Pope Leo told participants he hoped the "Ultimately, the benefits or risks of AI must conference would also consider how AI fits in with helping young people connect with older generations and "integrate truth into their moral and spiritual life, thus informing their mature decisions and opening the path towards a world of greater solidarity and unity."






