with students enrolled in kindergarten through eighth grades for the 2026-2027 school year, with new grades added each year until the academy is K-12.

The first millennial saint, Carlo Acutis was born in London and

raised in Milan. He is known for his devotion to the Eucharist, which he shared with young followers across digital media. An

uided by Catholic teaching, Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City continues to fulfill its mission of serving those in need by partnering with Key to Home, a community-wide initiative comprising more than 50 organizations working together to address homelessness differently in Oklahoma City.

Catholic Charities plays a frontline role in the Key to Home Partnership, providing case management for the Encampment Rehousing Initiative, which moves people directly from encampments into housing with ongoing support. The agency also leads the new Diversion and Rapid Exit program, embedding case managers in local shelters to help those who are newly homeless find quick, practical solutions before becoming entrenched in the system.

Theresa Flannery, senior director of social services for Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City, said their work aligns

Living the Jubilee, sharing the mission of Catholic Charities

In this Jubilee year, we are called to be "Pilgrims of Hope." In the spirit of the great Jubilee tradition, we are invited to live this sacred time not merely as an anniversary to be observed, but as a season of grace – a time to restore what has been lost, to heal what is broken and to bear Christ's light into a dark world that longs for his peace.

Hope is not a vague wish for better days. Christian hope is rooted in the certainty of God's promises. In Pope Leo's new, but already inspiring pontificate, he has reminded us that "Christian hope is like an anchor that grounds our hearts in the promise of the Lord Jesus. Charity is not just a promise. ... It is a present reality to be embraced with joy and responsibility."

That "present reality" is visible every day in the work of Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City. In our parishes, on our city streets, in rural communities and small towns, Catholic Charities becomes the hands and feet of Christ, reaching out to those who are hungry, unhoused, grieving or afraid.

The mission is simple yet profound: to serve, to accompany, to love. But, as I have seen firsthand, it is never just about services. It is about witness and relationships – about seeing the face of Jesus in those we serve and allowing them to see his face in us.

Catholic Charities is a place where individuals find a warm welcome, where single mothers receive guidance and support, where the elderly are visited and cared for, where those without shelter are given warmth and safety. These works of mercy are not abstract concepts; they are real, tangible moments when hope takes flesh in the lives of our neighbors.

Earlier this year, Pope Francis, whose passing we mourned in the spring, called on the whole Church to listen closely to those on the margins.

"May the voices of the poor be heard throughout the Jubilee, which is meant to restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone," he said. That call echoes loudly here in Oklahoma. Through Catholic Charities, your generosity makes it possible for those voices to be heard – and for their dignity to be honored.


On the weekend of Sept. 20-21, Catholic Charities will launch its annual appeal in parishes across the archdiocese. In the spirit of the Jubilee – when God's people are called to restore, to set free and to rejoice – this campaign invites each of us to be a living sign of hope for our brothers and sisters in need.

I am deeply aware that the needs in our communities are great. The landscape of poverty,

uncertainties for the most vulnerable.

And yet, we also live in a time of grace. God has placed us here, in this corner of his vineyard, to be

his witnesses, his instruments, his hands of mercy.

The Jubilee year reminds us that mercy cannot be hoarded; it must flow outward. It must be shared. Just as the Israelites celebrated a Jubilee to release debts and restore land, so too are we called to restore relationships, to release burdens and to make space for God's new beginnings.

When you give to Catholic Charities, you are participating in that restoration. You are helping a family keep their home. You are helping a child begin school with the supplies they need. You are helping a mother learn English so she can provide for her children.

These are not just acts of assistance; they are acts of hope. And hope, as Pope Leo reminded us, is anchored in Jesus himself.

I often think of the early Christians who sometimes gathered in hidden places to worship and encourage one another. The catacombs in Rome were not only burial sites; they were sanctuaries for the living.

In the dim light, the faithful celebrated the Eucharist, told the stories of Jesus and prayed for the strength to endure. They emerged from those gatherings renewed in hope – ready to face the world as witnesses to the Good News.

In our own way, Catholic Charities is like that sanctuary. It is a place where those who are weary can rest, where the hungry are fed, where the brokenhearted are consoled, and where the forgotten are remembered. It is a place where hope is renewed, not only for those who come seeking help, but for those who serve.

This September, I invite you to join me in making the work of Catholic Charities part of your Jubilee journey. Whether you give financially, volunteer your time or pray for those in need, you are helping to anchor hope in the hearts of our neighbors.

May the Lord bless you abundantly for your generosity. And may this Jubilee year be a time of deeper conversion and renewed joy in the mission Jesus Christ has entrusted to us.

The series is organized by the cathedral's director of music and organist Nolan Patrick Reilly, who began the series a year after he joined the parish in early 2022. Reilly also accompanies and directs the Cathedral Choir, a dedicated and talented group of singers, during the series.

The over 100-year-old cathedral features tall, barrel-vaulted ceilings and hard, reflective marble floors, providing strong acoustics, giving the organ a round, full sound.

"To reinforce a very ancient idea that cathedral churches are patrons of the arts and through that patronage, we are able to offer the community art that is beautiful and also glorifying to God," Reilly said.

Vespers is an evening prayer service, the second-to-last set of prayers in the Liturgy of the Hours. Vespers are around dinner time, a moment for the community to sing psalms and hymns, give thanks for the day that has just passed, and pray for protection during the night to come. Each of the cathedral vespers during the series is preceded by a half-hour recital played by organists from the local or larger community, an opportunity to hear how different hands affect how the organ sounds.

About the 2025-26 program

The program kicks off on the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, which falls on a Sunday this year. The Cathedral Choir will sing Anton Bruckner's "Christus factus est," one of his "most iconic and fantastic pieces of choral music for the Catholic liturgy," Reilly said.

Cathedral Arts Series second season revealed

The prelude recital will be played by Joseph Ripka, canon musician at Saint Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in Oklahoma City and a concert organist who regularly plays across the country.

On April 30, Vincent Dubois, titular organist at Notre Dame (Paris) will present an hour-long concert. This free, world-class performance was underwritten by parishioner Doug Eason, in honor of his late wife, Tish Eason. The performance will include a projector with a video livestream of Dubois' playing from up in the choir loft, providing a close up of the detailed hand and foot work involved in playing the massive, complex instrument.

Notable seasonal performances include Spooktacular, a short, family-friendly concert at the end of October. Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor and other Halloween-associated pieces will be performed, highlighting the organ's spooky side. Immediately following the concert is the cathedral's annual Fall Festival, which includes trick-or-treating for kids, food, refreshments and live music.

This year, All Souls Day falls on a Sunday, and as part of the series, the Cathedral Choir will perform Fauré's Requiem during the 10 a.m. Mass. Originally composed for the Requiem Mass, the piece will be sung in its intended liturgical setting.

On the Second Sunday of Advent is Advent Lessons and Carols, a tradition that began in England in the 19th century. It has been a part of the cathedral's Christmas season for decades. Lessons and Carols is a musical telling of the Advent season. Advent carols are sung along with the scripture readings that the carols are based on. Childcare is available for this

event. Lessons and Carols will also be broadcast live on local classical radio station KUCO (90.1 FM).

The Cathedral Arts Series is free and open to all. Aside from the Spooktacular and Fall Festival, every event is followed with a wine and cheese reception. The series concludes in spring 2026. Additional dates for the series, including concerts by both the OCU and UCO choirs, are to be announced. For details, like the dates and start times of each event, visit cathedralokc.org/arts.



Altus family shines through its blended parts

National Stepfamily Day is celebrated annually on Sept. 16

There are few, if any, examples of "perfect families." Even the New and Old Testaments reveal all sorts of family issues – divorces, deaths of spouses, adoptions, stepparents and blended families are detailed throughout the Bible.

In 1893, Pope Leo XIII designated the Holy Family as a model for Catholics to emulate. Pope Benedict XV designated the Feast Day on the Sunday between Christmas and New Year's Day, celebrated this year on Dec. 28.

The feast honors the Holy Family for placing God at the center of their lives and serving as the "domestic church" or a sacred place where family life is nurtured. It encourages all families to embrace virtues like mutual support, prayer, and trust in God, even amidst modern challenges.

National Stepfamily Day was launched in the U.S. in 1997, a day to recognize and honor the unique bonds within stepfamilies and blended families.

Due to his role as the head of the Holy Family, Saint Joseph is the principal patron saint of families, as well as fathers, workers and the Universal Church. Saint Eugene de Mazenod is a patron for dysfunctional families and families experiencing upheaval or crisis. Saint Eugene is also the patron saint of children of divorce.

In Altus, the Mutchler family offers an example of a blended family taking up its cross and following Christ. Active members of Prince of Peace Catholic Church, Christ and the Church provide the foundation during a challenging stage of this family's life.

Anthony and Linda Mutchler have four children - Shannon, Jimmy, Richard and Daelin. Their children have followed them into the

Catholic faith. In addition, they are blessed with eight grandchildren and a great grand-

Linda began showing signs of slurred speech in 2017 and eventually was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (Lou Gehrig's Disease). Anthony retired and became a full-time

Jimmy Moncada is a 44-year-old, hardworking, married father of two boys. Earlier this year he found out he had stage-five kidney failure and had to start dialysis. Jimmy's wife Liz

take turns giving Jimmy his four-hour dialysis

"My biological Dad is out of the picture. However, my 'stepdad' - real 'Dad' - came into my life when I was 15 years old and he followed the path of Saint Joseph," Moncada said. "He comes over, cannulates my arm, sits with me during my four-hour treatment, and then makes a meal for me.

"He is the pillar on which this family sits on,

and it is strong because of his faith and love for God. He is also taking care of my mother, volunteering at the church and is at all my kids' events. I am proud that I named my oldest son

Moncada said he leans heavily into his faith.

"Perhaps some people would lose their faith over something like this, but I have got closer to Christ because of it," he said. "I asked Jesus to deliver me from all this. However, I went to church on Ash Wednesday, and then I asked God to make the pain tolerable. Ever since then, Jesus has answered that prayer for me,

> and the pain is tolerable." Anthony said he admires Moncada's faith through so

many challenges. "I am just so impressed," he said. "His wife Liz is an angel. Giving Jimmy those treatments is rough. We must insert two 15-gauge needles into him, one for fluid going in and the other to go out. He is handling the unbelievable pain and discomfort of the four-hour ordeal

"My biggest concern as you can imagine is missing the poor kid's veins and making him go through it repeatedly."

Moncada is on the list for a kidney transplant at University Oklahoma. His siblings have volunteered to give up their kidneys if they are matches for Jimmy.

"Father David and I are inspired by the family's faith and their willing-

ness to help our parish," said Judy Cosway, parish secretary of Prince of Peace Catholic Church. "Jimmy, Anthony, Linda and the whole family are prayer warriors. Instead of the parish helping them, they always want to help other people. There is no self-pity for their challenges."

Jeffreys serves as the director of development for the Blessed Stanley Rother Shrine.




Mingura will join her efforts as the director of communications to promote the mission of the shrine to cultivate a culture of faith.

with the corporal work of mercy, "to shelter the homeless," and that case management services in both the Encampment Rehousing Initiative (ERI) and diversion programs embody this mission.

"Staff are the hands and feet of Christ, meeting those in need where they are, regardless of their faith," she said.

Flannery said Catholic Charities has provided case management for the Encampment Rehousing Initiative and now leads the Diversion and Rapid Exit services. Catholic Charities embeds three case managers at local overnight shelters: Salvation Army, City Care and City Rescue Mission.

"This is a strengths-based, solution-focused approach to ending someone's homelessness. It is designed for those who are 'new' to the system," she said.

Jennifer Kill, director of family support services for Key to Home at Catholic Charities, said that since launching the diversion program earlier this month,

they have recently celebrated the program's first success.

"Our diversion case manager assisted a young pregnant moth-

One of the goals of Key to Home is to rehouse 500 unsheltered individuals through the Encampment Rehousing Initiative, pairing them with 12 months of case management support by the end of 2025. To date, 445 people have been housed.

er and her 5-month-old baby in safely reconnecting with her family in New Jersey," Kill said. "It was truly rewarding to witness her joy and relief, knowing she would now have safe, stable housing and be surrounded by the support of her loved ones.

"This success reflects the heart of what we do at Catholic Charities by upholding the dignity of every person, supporting the family as the central unit of society, and ensuring that the vulnerable are cared for with compassion and respect."

Oklahoma City stepped into a lead role with Key to Home in 2023, centralizing data and coordination to make the response to homelessness more effective. The change frees nonprofits to focus on serving people directly, while the city manages system-wide strategy and accountability.

Erika Warren, communications manager for the City of Oklahoma City's homeless services, said making significant strides in reducing homelessness requires a team dedicated to system-level thinking and problem solving.

"As the lead agency, Key to Home staff coordinate efforts, align resources and remove barriers for our homeless response system to work more effectively and efficiently," said Warren.

According to Key to Home's mission, the goal is to make homelessness in Oklahoma City "rare, brief and non-recurring." Since establishing its board of directors in 2023, the partnership has made measurable progress toward this vision. The goal to house or divert 100 youth by 2025 has already been surpassed, with nearly 300 housed or diverted to date.

Key to Home also set a goal to rehouse 500 unsheltered individuals through the Encampment Rehousing Initiative, pairing them with 12 months of case management support by the end of 2025.

Warren said 445 people have been housed and that the initiative is on track to reach its goal by the end of the year.

"We continue to work toward stronger coordination, strengthening provider capacity, and elevating youth voices in our efforts to reduce youth homelessness moving forward," Warren said.

Said Bishop Konderla: "Carlo loved video games, computer programming, soccer, school and spending time with friends, but most of all, he loved our Lord Jesus Christ. Deeply devoted to the Eucharist, Carlo used his knowledge of the internet to create a website documenting Eucharistic miracles, which has since inspired and educated people

around the world. His life exemplified humility, piety, devotion, and discipline. His faith-filled life continues to inspire young people everywhere."

And that faith-filled life will be a model for the new school.

"Saint Carlo Acutis said To be with God, that is my life project," Smith said, "and everything we at the academy do walks us closer to unity with Christ."

Book Review: 'God's Influencer'

Alleluia! Praise God! Carlo Acutis is now a saint and, according to Pope Leo IV "in the canonization of Carlo Acutis, we have God putting his hand not just on a person but on a way of life."

"God's Influencer" provides firsthand insight into Carlo's life and the nature of his influence. The content of the book comes from an interview conducted by Giorgio Maria Carbone, Order of Preachers, with Carlo's parents, Andrea Acutis and Antonia Salzano. Carlo is our first millennial saint. While as a child his parents didn't fully embrace Catholicism, his nanny served as a role model by taking him to daily Mass and answering his many questions about the Catholic faith. As a

teenager he lived a somewhat ordinary life, playing sports, going to school, spending time with friends, dressing in blue jeans and spending time on the internet.

The Sophia Insti-Book tute Press wrote that Review Carlo "was a brilliant catechist


who also created numerous displays about the faith, most notably the Eucharistic Miracles exhibition of worldwide fame."

He also created his own website, posting information about holy sites he and his family visited, biographical information about various saints, and his thoughts about various aspects of the Catholic faith.

He had special appreciation for the Holy Eucharist, believing "the Eucharist is the highway to heaven," and he took advantage of every opportunity presented to receive the Body and Blood of his Savior, Jesus Christ.

New statue of Bl. Carlo Acutis unveiled in Assisi

(OSV News) - A new statue depicting Blessed Carlo Acutis is a message that conveys to the world that the Catholic Church is not an old institution but a young and vibrant church with a relevant message for today's culture, said the statue's sculptor.

Unveiled Aug. 15 outside the Shrine of the Renunciation at the Church of St. Mary Major in Assisi, where the soon-to-be-saint is buried, Canadian sculptor Timothy Schmalz said that "the church is for the youth and it's a growing

"I know that Carlo Acutis mentioned that he wanted to be buried in Assisi. I'm sure he would be delighted to know that not only is his tomb there, but now there is a sculpture that celebrates him, cast in bronze, that will be there for more than a thousand years." Schmalz said in an interview with OSV News Aug. 22.

The 11-foot-tall bronze statue, titled "St. Carlo at the Cross," depicts the young teen, canonized Sept. 7 by Pope Leo XIV, kneeling beside Christ crucified. Contrary to more classic depictions of saints, Blessed Acutis holds a laptop in his hand that displays a chalice and paten.

Before his death at age 15 from leukemia in 2006, Blessed Acutis put his knowledge of computers to create an online database of eucharistic miracles around the world

"I wanted to do a very heroic, large sculpture to show the connection between the cross with Christ, Carlo Acutis and modern-day technology. So there are three essential elements in there that kind of celebrate the story of this modern saint," Schmalz explained.

"Oftentimes, when I do a sculpture of a saint, I'm using very historical elements that the saint holds. So I was like, 'Whoa, here he is holding a laptop! I'm actually doing a sculpture of a saint holding a laptop!' That was absolutely amazing.'

Schmalz is known for several works that are displayed outside St. Peter's Square, including "Angels Unawares," a 20-foot bronze statue depicting a boat carrying migrants and refugees from different eras in history.

The late Pope Francis admired the artist's work and, before his death in April, approved the installation of a second statue titled "Be Welcoming" - near the showers and medical clinic the Vatican runs for people in need.

Schmalz told OSV News that the statue was initially set to be unveiled that month in Rome to coincide with the teen's canonization. However, it was postponed due to the pope's death, and the Vatican shipped the statue to its permanent home in Assisi.

Another unique feature of the sculpture is the inclusion of a sling hanging from the side of the

teen's backpack. The Canadian sculptor explained that its inclusion was a reference to David and Goliath,



a connection he said "was revealed to me throughout the process of the piece."

"As I was working on this, the David and Goliath story was always with

me, about how here's this young man that's in a sense using our modern-day sling, which is our

technology – to fight this 'Goliath' of mainstream media that oftentimes trivializes spirituality, Christianity, and especially Catholicism," he explained.

The new statue's location in Assisi and its most notable saint, St. Francis, also factored into its design. The depiction of Blessed Acutis kneeling at the foot of the cross was a "kind of nod to

the traditional representation of St. Francis with Jesus."

"His head is leaning on the cross, and his hand is wrapped around the cross. He almost merges as a part of the cross, and I wanted that emotion to be put there. Yes, he's on his knees showing his being a very humble per-

son, but I think it's the reaching of it, the wrapping of the hand, and the gentle leaning of his head on the cross," the artist explained.

Blessed Acutis "was so much in love with St. Francis," Schmalz said, adding that he was certain the teen "would appreciate these elements that are put within the sculpture."

"I wanted to show that intensity and that passion and that devotion, just like St. Francis of Assisi," he said.

Schmalz told OSV News that the modern elements included in the sculpture, as opposed to the more traditional, saintly garbs in other statues of saints, were an important feature that showed that Blessed Carlo Acutis is "a contemporary."

"No Roman skirts; just jeans, a sweatshirt and a backpack," he said. "So, I do believe that this saint is here for a reason, and it's to encourage and act as a role model for young people."

Holy Angels Education Center shepherding immigrants

uis Soto stood before a crowded room gathered for the grand opening of Holy Angels Education Center, leaning on his own journey in offering hope to those in the Hispanic community facing challenges today.

"As an immigrant myself," Soto began, "I learned some time ago that immigrants, particularly Hispanic immigrants, are not a problem to solve or a challenge to overcome, but an asset to invest in.

"Particularly in the Catholic Church, even more preeminent here in Oklahoma, where about half of all Catholics are Hispanic, and the vast majority of them newcomers. It is time to invest in them, in the desire to integrate into our society and bring out the best."

With an emphasis on "Christ's call to love God and neighbor," Holy Angels Education Center celebrated its grand opening on Aug. 20, with many in attendance, including Archbishop Paul Coakley, Oklahoma senators, community leaders and more, including student success stories who have already benefited from the center

One of the students, Miguel Escobedo, said he initially helped in remodeling the church building which would become Holy Angels, only to learn more and decide to take advantage of the classes offered. Escobedo eventually went on to take the course and successfully passed the classes which would lead to him to U.S. citizenship.

Another student, Martin Rodriguez, also took the classes and was pleased to tell Sooner Catholic he, too, had passed the classes and looked forward to being integrated into American life and society, following a positive experience at Holy Angels.

In a statement, Coakley made it clear that he is "proud" of the work Holy Angels does and pleased that the ministry helps "those in transition as they seek a deeper integration into our community and culture."

Those in attendance were informed of the U.S. Citizenship classes the students take, English as a Second Language and "digital literacy for job readiness."

The ceremony began in the main church building, at 317 N. Blackwelder Avenue, the same place where Holy Angels Catholic Church served parishioners until it was shuttered in 2023. Speakers included Escobedo and Rodriguez, two Mexican men learning English, American history and financial literacy, among other subjects offered at the center and important to those wishing to integrate into American society.

But it was Luis Soto, the senior director who operates Holy Angels, who had a vision of a place that would offer educational opportunities to immigrants – particularly Spanish-speaking folks – to learn what it is to be American and what one must do to integrate into the society. Helping Soto in the directing of Holy Angels is Hilda De Leon Xavier.

"The center, it's a place where we can offer immigrants, particularly Hispanics, the opportunity to integrate into American society by learning English, the history and culture all while becoming citizens of the country," Soto said. "Learning how to start their own business, learning finances and tax preparation and everything" that goes with integrating into American life.

More than 175 students have gone through the program since it was introduced last fall, following the

soft opening of Holy Angels.

When asked if immigration status comes into play when someone comes to Holy Angels, Soto said it does not, adding that he felt that subject did not need to be delved into at that time.

Still, Soto reiterated that "everyone is welcome." Soto added that information about Holy Angels is being shared through many of the parishes in the Archdiocese of Oklahoma City that serve Spanish-speaking parishioners.

Following the presentation at the old church, the event shifted to the education center itself, beginning with a ribbon cutting at the front door, where Larann Wilson, associate director of the Secretariat for Evangelization and Catechesis, offered remarks.

"Friends, we gather not only to open the doors of a new building, but to unlock the potential within it," Wilson said. "This center represents more than just brick and mortar, it stands as a beacon of learning, opportunity, community and growth."

Wilson continued, highlighting the "passion, perseverance and partnership" that came together to make Holy Angels a reality.

Father Joseph Irwin, senior pastor of Saint Joseph Catholic Church in Norman, said he thinks Holy Angels will be a "wonderful resource for the Catholic community and the Oklahoma City community."

Annette de Dios, who works as the program coordinator at Holy Angels, told Sooner Catholic that the grand opening "went better than anticipated" and "I'm really excited the way things came together.

"If they go through Facebook or our website all of our classes are there."

The U.S. citizenship class is "almost at capacity," with 30 students, de Dios said. "I've got 60 overall, 65% capacity. We're still excited!"

Beatriz Hernandez, who came to check out the grand opening, spoke to the importance of the center to the community.

"It will give our people opportunities," she said.

The hope is that many take advantage of the opportunity.

"We are grateful for the dedication of the staff, the volunteers, who have only begun this important work," Coakley said.

'Educated, equipped and empowered'

Miguel Escobedo first arrived at Holy Angels Education Center to do remodeling work.

Then he went to work remodeling his journey to becoming a U.S. citizen.

"I live really close by and I was very involved in the beginning when they started remodeling for the classes they were starting to teach," said Escobedo, an immigrant.

"So, I started with English classes, and they later offered citizenship classes, so it was really great for me to be involved in both."

How great?
"I passed the (citizenship) test on
June 27 and now I am awaiting my
naturalization ceremony," Escobedo

With more and more immigrants seeking to integrate into society, Holy Angels Education Center is dedicated to helping immigrants become "educated, equipped and empowered."

Escobedo stands as but one example of the fruits of the center's various programs designed to offer immigrants an educational hub.

"I would like to encourage the community to take advantage of the classes," Escobedo said. "English is in high (demand). People have the ability to become citizens and get help with that as well.

"So the only other thing I'd like to say is that we want to motivate the community to take advantage of the opportunities here at Holy Angels."

More and more immigrants are seeking out Holy Angels as the word gets out via social media and word of mouth.

"I feel very happy and very grateful for all of the people helped me to speak English," said Escobedo.

Martin Rodriguez, who currently works as a vehicle upholsterer, said he learned about Holy Angels through social media.

"When I arrived people treated me

very well," he said. "When you are starting in the process you learn there is a lot to learn through the process.

"I'm in basic English, but I am able to tell people that I have a wife and family."

Rodriguez and Escobedo both exuded a cheerful disposition and confidence as they shared their stories and urged others in the immigrant community to take advantage of the services offered at Holy Angels.

"Do not be ashamed to ask for information," said Rodriguez, who mentioned he had been in the United States for the past six years and had only used his cell phone to translate. And now he has basic understanding of the English language, thanks to Holy Angels.

And Rodriguez made it clear he understood the importance of embracing the language and culture of his new homeland.

"It's not our country, so we have to learn the language and the values of this country," Rodriguez said. For more information on the Holy





A woman ahead of her time

For many years, our religious community was best known in the United States as half of a college sports parody comparing the worst teams to the Little Sisters of the Poor.

Since 2013, we have been in the limelight for a completely different reason as we found ourselves involved in a lawsuit against the federal government over the HHS Contraceptive Mandate.

After 12 years and three victories at the Supreme Court, we were in the news once again this summer as a U.S. District Court in Pennsylvania vacated our hard-won religious exemption in

We are grateful for the prayers and support of many people of good will who appreciate our commitment to our

At the same time, however, we would prefer to be known for who we are - the spiritual daughters of Saint Jeanne Jugan, and for what we actually do. Our mission is to accompany and care for needy elderly persons of every race and religion.

In this month when we celebrate the feast day of our foundress, Saint Jeanne Jugan, I would like to highlight her life and spirit, which were heroic and which are, I believe, more relevant than ever.

On a recent Sunday Pope Leo XIV preached about Jesus' words in Saint Luke's Gospel, "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing" (Luke 12:49).

Jesus was speaking here, the pope said, of "the fire of love – a love that

stoops to serve, that responds to indifference with care and to arrogance with gentleness; the fire of goodness, which doesn't cost like weapons do, but freely renews the world."

There can be no greater peace, our Holy Father said, than having this fire of love in our hearts.

Saint Jeanne Jugan was "all heart" she welcomed this flame of divine love into her own heart from an early age.

Precocious and fervent in the practice of her faith, in her youth some of Jeanne's peers found her a bit too austere but this didn't stop her from following Jesus, poor and humble of heart, in

By the time she left home in her early 20s, Jeanne had already turned down a marriage proposal, citing a vague inner certainty that God wanted her for himself, for "a work not yet founded."

Jeanne's season of discernment lasted for many years, during which time her friendship with Jesus Christ grew stronger and her selfless service to the poor and abandoned more committed. God was preparing her for greatness, although it would be a greatness couched in humility and poverty.

When the moment of God's choosing arrived, Jeanne Jugan recognized the face of Jesus Christ in the person of a poor, blind old woman in need of assistance. Her name was Anne, and she would be the first in a long line of elderly persons who would be welcomed into Jeanne's home; there they would be warmed by the fire of love bursting forth from her heart.

Jeanne Jugan threw in her lot with the poor, holding nothing back for her-

self and identifying herself completely with them.

She epitomized the ideal described by Pope Leo when he spoke of the fire Jesus brought to earth.

The pope thanked those who carry the fire of charity to others and encouraged them not to distinguish between those who help and those who are helped, between those who seem to give and those who seem to receive.

"We are the church of the Lord," the pope said, "a church of the poor, all precious, all subjects ... Each is a gift to

It is when the fire that Jesus came to bring burns the prejudices and fears that marginalize those who bear the poverty of Christ, the pope explained, that we truly become the Body of Christ. Pope Leo beseeches us to see Our Lord in the poor, to welcome them into our lives, our homes and our churches.

Saint Jeanne Jugan often said, "Never forget that the poor are our Lord."

She would have fully agreed with these words of our new pope. She was a woman ahead of her time, a woman on fire with the love Christ came to bring to earth.

May you allow yourself to be guided by love – the fire of love that stoops to serve, that responds to indifference with care and to arrogance with gentleness; the fire of goodness, which will renew


