



# Liturgical Guide for Sunday, December 30, 2018

ON THIS DAY, THE SUNDAY <u>BEFORE</u> THE THEOPHANY OF OUR LORD, GOD, AND SAVIOR, JESUS CHRIST, WE COMMEMORATE THE HOLY AND RIGHTEOUS FOREFATHERS OF GOD, SAINT JOSEPH THE BETROTHED OF THE VIRGIN MARY; JAMES, THE BROTHER OF THE LORD (IAKOVOS); AND

DAVID, THE PROPHET AND KING. On this day, we also commemorate Anysia the Virgin-martyr of Thessaloniki; Gideon the New Martyr of Mount Athos; Holy Martyr Philetaerus; and Righteous Father Leondus the Archimandrite. *Through their holy intercessions, O God, have mercy on us and save us. Amen.*

## SPECIAL HYMNS SUNG BEFORE/AFTER SMALL ENTRANCE

### 1. Hymn for Second Antiphon – (Hymnal-p.-28):

On the occasion of today's feast, we sing the following hymn instead of the regular <u>Soson imas</u>, "Save us, O Son of God": "Save us, O Son of God, Who was born of the Virgin, Who sing to You, Alleluia.

# 2./4. Special Hymn for the Feast of the Blessed Birth of our Lord (sung before and after the Small Entrance) — (Hymnal-pp.198-201):

"Your birth, O Christ our God, shines forth on all the world with the light of knowledge. For at Your Birth, those who had adored the stars were taught by a star to worship You, the Sun of Justice, and to know You, the Dawn from on high. O Lord, glory to You."

#### 3. Resurrectional Hymn (Plagal of the Second Tone) – (Hymnal-pp.118-121):

It is sung <u>before</u> and <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: The angelic powers appeared at Your tomb, the soldiers guarding it became as dead men, and Mary stood at Your grave seeking Your most pure body. But You made hell a captive; You were

untouched by its might. You came to the Virgin and granted life. O Lord, Who rose from the dead, glory to You.

#### 5. Hymn for Saints Joseph, David, and Iakovos – (Hymnal-pp.202-203):

It is sung <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: Go, holy Joseph, tell David what the angel said. With the shepherds and the wise men from afar, praise the Son of the Virgin, begging Him to save our souls.

#### 6. Hymn Commemorating St. Christopher – (see music distributed):

It is sung <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: Made comely with garments woven from your venerable blood, you stand before the Lord, the King of Heaven and earth, O famed Martyr Christopher. With the choirs of Angels and the Martyrs you chant, singing the thrice-holy hymn and most awesome praises. Thus, by your intercessions with God, save us, your servants.

#### 7. Kontakion of the Blessed Birth of our Lord – (Hymnal-pp.244-247):

It is sung <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: Today the Virgin gives birth to the Transcendent One, and the earth presents a cave to the Unapproachable One. Angels with shepherds give Him glory; wise men follow a star as they journey to Him who is God from all ages, yet for our sake is born as a little child.

# SCRIPTURAL PASSAGES FROM TODAY'S ORTHROS & DIVINE LITURGY

The Scriptures were not given us for this only, that we might have them in books, but that we might engrave them on our hearts.

#### **Gospel Reading During Orthros Service (John 20:19-31)**

"When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' After He said this, He showed them His hands and His side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, 'Peace be with you. As the Father has sent Me, so I send you.' When He had said this, He breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if

you retain the sins of any, they are retained.' But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, 'We have seen the Lord.' But he said to them, 'Unless I see the mark of the nails in His hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in His side, I will not believe.' A week later His disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, 'Peace be with you.' Then He said to Thomas, 'Put your finger here and see My hands. Reach out your hand and put it in My side. Do not doubt but believe.' Thomas answered Him, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him, 'Have you believed because you have seen Me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe.' Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in His name."

#### **Epistle Reading During Divine Liturgy (Gal. 1:11-19)**

For I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that the gospel that was proclaimed by me is not of human origin; for I did not receive it from a human source, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of Jesus Christ. You have heard, no doubt, of my earlier life in Judaism. I was violently persecuting the church of God and was trying to destroy it. I advanced in Judaism beyond many among my people of the same age, for I was far more zealous for the traditions of my ancestors. But when God, who had set me apart before I was born and called me through his grace, was pleased to reveal His Son to me, so that I might proclaim Him among the Gentiles, I did not confer with any human being, nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were already apostles before me, but I went away at once into Arabia, and afterwards I returned to Damascus. Then after three years I did go up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas and stayed with him fifteen days; but I did not see any other apostle except James the Lord's brother.

#### **Gospel Reading During Divine Liturgy (Matt. 2:13-23)**

Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the Child and His mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the Child, to destroy Him." Then Joseph got up, took the Child and His mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called My Son." When Herod

saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more." When Herod died, an angel of the Lord suddenly appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt and said, "Get up, take the Child and His mother, and go to the land of Israel, for those who were seeking the Child's life are dead." Then Joseph got up, took the Child and His mother, and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus was ruling over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there. And after being warned in a dream, he went away to the district of Galilee. There he made his home in a town called Nazareth, so that what had been spoken through the prophets might be fulfilled, "He will be called a Nazorean."

# PASTORAL REFLECTION FROM FR. GEORGE:

"You will be with child and give birth to a son, and you are to give Him the name Jesus." (Luke 1:31)

As we celebrate Christmas, we are encouraged by it being a time when many of us look forward to giving gifts, receiving gifts, or both. For most parents, I believe our joy no longer comes in getting gifts, but in seeing our children respond with delight as they open their packages on Christmas morning.

The day after Christmas, we remembered through our liturgical gathering (synaxis) the most holy Mother of God (Theotokos), who bore our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ. Mary gave birth supernaturally to the Son and Word of God, and thus became the instrument of the salvation of humankind. Indeed, as we continue to reflect on the Holy Nativity of our Savior, we can rejoice on how Mary received a gift on that first Christmas, too. She was given the gift of Jesus. Now, of course, it is true that Jesus was a gift to the human race as a whole. But we should not forget that it was Mary, a woman in a certain place and time, who gave birth to our Lord Jesus.

The fact that God would, in a manner of speaking, give Jesus to Mary as a gift, is not surprising when we consider that God continually gives gifts – tangible and intangible – to His children. And because we have been blessed with gifts from our Father in Heaven, we can, in turn, give gifts to others. We can bless others because we have been blessed.

The world has it half right. Christmas is about gifts, but not the gifts you can buy with your credit card. No, Christmas is about the gift that God the Father has given to Mary, and by extension, to all of us who believe in the person of Jesus Christ. When we give gifts to those we love, we should remember that we are in some small way recalling the greatest gift of all, one that gives new meaning to the phrase "the gift that keeps on giving!"
