# Liturgical Guide for Sunday, December 31, 2023

On this day, the Sunday after the Holy Nativity of Our Lord, God, and Savior, Jesus Christ, we commemorate the Holy and Righteous Forefathers of God, Saint Joseph the Betrothed of the Virgin Mary; James, the Brother of the Lord (Iakovos); and David, the Prophet and King. On this day, we also commemorate the Leave-Taking of the Nativity of Our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Melania the Younger, Nun of Rome, & The Martyr and Presbyter Zoticus of Rome, Patron of Orphans. *Through their holy intercessions, O God, have mercy on us and save us. Amen.*

# SPECIAL HYMNS SUNG BEFORE/AFTER SMALL ENTRANCE

#### 1. Hymn for Second Antiphon – (Hymnal-p.-28):

On the occasion of today's feast, we sing the following hymn instead of the regular <u>Soson imas</u>, "Save us, O Son of God": "Save us, O Son of God, Who was born of the Virgin, Who sing to You, Alleluia.

# 2./4./10. Special Hymn for the Feast of the Blessed Birth of our Lord (sung before and after the Small Entrance) — (Hymnal-pp.198-201):

"Your birth, O Christ our God, shines forth on all the world with the light of knowledge. For at Your Birth, those who had adored the stars were taught by a star to worship You, the Sun of Justice, and to know You, the Dawn from on high. O Lord, glory to You."

#### 3. Resurrectional Hymn (Plagal of the First Tone) – (Hymnal-pp.114-117):

It is sung <u>before</u> and <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: To the Word, co-eternal with the Father and the Spirit, born of the Virgin for our salvation, let us, the faithful, give praise and worship. For He willed to be lifted up on the Cross in the flesh, to endure death and raise the dead by His glorious resurrection.

#### 5. Hymn for Saints Joseph, David, and Iakovos – (Not in Hymnal):

It is sung <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: Annunciate the miracles to David the ancestor of God, O Joseph. You saw the Virgin pregnant. You glorified with

the shepherds. You worshipped with the Magi. And you were warned by an Angel. Entreat Christ God to save our souls.

## <u>6. Hymn Commemorating St. Christopher – (see music distributed):</u>

It is sung <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: Made comely with garments woven from your venerable blood, you stand before the Lord, the King of Heaven and earth, O famed Martyr Christopher. With the choirs of Angels and the Martyrs you chant, singing the thrice-holy hymn and most awesome praises. Thus, by your intercessions with God, save us, your servants.

#### 7. Kontakion of the Blessed Birth of our Lord – (Hymnal-pp.244-247):

It is sung <u>after</u> the Small Entrance: Today the Virgin gives birth to the Transcendent One, and the earth presents a cave to the Unapproachable One. Angels with shepherds give Him glory; wise men follow a star as they journey to Him who is God from all ages, yet for our sake is born as a little child.

#### **8.** Megalynarion (Hymn to the Theotokos) – (not in Hymnal):

Today, instead of "Axion Estin" or "Truly it is proper to call you blessed...", we sing: O my soul, magnify the ever-virgin Maid who from the curse has redeemed us. Easier for us is from fear to love silence, free of any peril as it is, O Virgin; whereas to weave stirring hymns out of longing in earnest, is difficult. Therefore, O Mother, give us strength to match our volition, we pray you.

## 9. Communion Hymn – (Hymnal-p.326):

On the occasion of today's feast, the following hymn is sung instead of "Aineite" or "Praise the Lord": "The Lord has sent redemption to His people. (3) Alleluia."

#### SCRIPTURAL PASSAGES FROM TODAY'S ORTHROS & DIVINE LITURGY

The Scriptures were not given us for this only, that we might have them in books, but that we might engrave them on our hearts. —St. John Chrysostom

## **Gospel Reading During Orthros Service (John 20:11-18)**

"But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid Him.' When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? Who are you looking for?' Supposing Him to be the gardener, she said to Him, 'Sir, if you have carried Him away, tell me where you have laid Him, and I will take Him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to Him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to Me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to My brothers and say to them, I am ascending to My Father and Your Father, to My God and Your God.' Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that He had said these things to her."

## **Epistle Reading During Divine Liturgy (2 Tim. 4:5-8)**

As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully. As for me, I am already being poured out as a libation, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have longed for His appearing.

#### **Gospel Reading During Divine Liturgy (Mark 1:1-8)**

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight," John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing

their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The One Who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of His sandals. I have baptized you with water; but He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

#### THIS WEEK'S MEMORY VERSE (TRY TO COMMIT TO MEMORY):

"For a Child has been born for us, a Son given to us; authority rests upon His shoulders; and He is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9:6)

# PASTORAL REFLECTION FROM FR. GEORGE:

Each of us has opportunities to make our world more beautiful. I am hoping it will motivate us to pick out – before 2023 ends – real and creative plans you and others can focus special attention on. Let your aim be to help sustain and benefit God's creation. I encourage us likewise to pray and seek God's will to view our earthly existence with renewed conviction that our world is a priceless treasure. May we be reminded that God depends on each of us – as part of His Body – to use His blessings and our talents in new and inspiring ways... to serve one another and make our world more beautiful!

As spiritual refreshment, I lift up a few verses from *An Akathist in Praise of God's Creation*, by Metropolitan Tryphon (Turkestanov), 1934. Take the next few moments to separate yourself from your worldly cares and read and ponder these words praising God for your existence. In so doing, you harken back to your origin as part of God's divine plans. *Likewise, you can see yourself and your potential to join others to make our world more beautiful*.

#### Kontakion 1

Incorruptible Lord, Your right hand controls the whole course of human life, according to the decrees of Your Providence for our salvation.

We give you thanks for all Your blessings, known and unknown: for our earthly life and for the heavenly joys of Your kingdom which is to come. Henceforth extend Your mercies towards us as we sing: Glory to you, O God, from age to age!

#### Ikos 1

I was born a weak, defenseless child, but Your angel, spreading his radiant wings, guarded my cradle. From my birth, Your love has illumined my paths, and has wondrously guided me towards the light of eternity. From my first day until now, the generous gifts of Your providence have been wonderfully showered upon me. I give You thanks, and with all those Who have come to know You, I exclaim:

Glory to You for calling me into being,

Glory to You for spreading out before me the beauty of the universe,

Glory to You for revealing to me through heaven and earth the eternal book of wisdom,

Glory to Your eternity within this fleeting world,

Glory to You for Your mercies, seen and unseen,

Glory to You for every sigh of my sorrow,

Glory to You for every step in my life's journey, for every moment of joy,

Glory to You, O God, from age to age.

#### Kontakion 2

O Lord, how lovely it is to be Your guest: breeze full of scent; mountains reaching to the skies; waters like a boundless mirror, reflecting the sun's golden rays and the scudding clouds. All nature murmurs mysteriously, breathing depths of tenderness, birds and beasts bear the imprint of Your love, blessed are you, mother earth, in your fleeting loveliness, which wakens our yearning for happiness that will last forever in the land where, amid beauty that grows not old, rings out the cry: Alleluia!

#### Ikos 2

You brought me into this life as into an enchanted paradise. We have seen the sky, like a deep blue cup ringing with birds in the azure heights. We have listened to the soothing murmur of the forest and the sweet-sounding music of the waters. We have tasted fragrant fruit of fine flavor and sweet-scented honey. How pleasant is our stay with You on earth: it is a joy to be Your guest.

Glory to You for the feast-day of life,

Glory to You for the perfume of lilies and roses,

Glory to You for each different taste of berry and fruit,

Glory to You for the sparkling silver of early morning dew,

Glory to You for each smiling, peaceful awakening,

Glory to You for eternal life in us, a messenger of heaven,

Glory to You, O God, from age to age. Amen!




