

How to Benefit from the Liturgy (Part I)

1) Attend early: be on time. Do not come after the gospel or even after the first reading. Would you arrive late to work? Could you arrive late to work? The later you arrive, the less the grace of God and heavenly blessings will permeate your soul and the less time you'll have to spend in that short and precious two hour window into heaven.

2) Sing passionately: do not stand there like a statue. Do not fail to offer God due reverence and honor through singing the grace-filled hymns of the

church composed by our saintly ancestors. Sing when the congregation sings. Sing when it is your side's [turn] to sing. Do not deceive yourself as benefiting from the service without singing. St Theophan the Recluse says, "All of our liturgical hymns are instructive, profound and sublime. They contain the whole of our theology and moral teaching, give us Christian consolation and instill in us a fear of the Judgment. He who listens to them attentively has no need of other books on the Faith."

- 3) Be reverent: one of the best ways to do this is to do the sign of the cross reverently, consciously, attentively, neither too fast nor too slow, during the countless times we say "Lord have mercy" in the liturgy. This may initially be awkward, make us become fearful of what others think and lead us to develop prideful thoughts because we think we are holy. Hence isolate yourself somewhere quiet in the altar or somewhere isolated in the pews or first practice reverence in quiet weekday liturgies. Other examples of reverence are prostrating when everyone prostrates, responding with the congregation, raising our hands in prayer formation, closing our eyes and lifting our head up slightly to the heavens. Just like body language is such a profound aspect of effective communication between humans, so is bodily reverence a profound aspect of communicating with God and acquiring His grace.
- 4) Pray the prayer before and after Holy Communion: do this in every liturgy without fail. We learn this from the life of St John of Kronstadt. There is no saint in the history of the church who united himself the most to God in the liturgy than St John (his life story is incredibly amazing). He said that if there was little time and he would have to shorten other prayers, he would still never fail to pray the prayer before and after Holy Communion. Preparation for anything always increases our benefit. [Source: *The Art of Orthodoxy*]

How to benefit from liturgy

- 1) Attend early

- 5) Listen carefully to the readings

- 6) Enjoy the sermon
- 7) Pray the Jesus prayer
- 8) Have faith in the liturgy
- Choose quality over quantity

In our lives on earth, even today, God continues to send us holy people to enlighten and guide us. We receive His Word, His Son, and the ones who call us back to God when we go astray. The Lord is the vine; we are the branches. On this anniversary (9/3) of my ordination to the Holy Diaconate, I glorify our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, Who vanquished evil, sin, and death. He desires us to be part of His Holy Kingdom now and forever, through our faith, worship, communion, witness, and service to Him and His Body.

In today's Gospel we hear: "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The very stone which the builders rejected has become the head of the corner; this was the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes?'" (Mt. 21:42)

Christ is called a stone for two reasons. First, because His foundation is solid and no one who stands upon Him will fall victim to deceitful charms or be moved by the storms of persecution. Second, Christ is called a stone because in Him is the ultimate destruction of the wicked, for just as everything which collides with a stone is shattered while the stone itself remains intact, so also everyone who opposes the Christian faith will himself be ruined, but Christianity will remain untouched. This is the sense in which Christ is the great stone. (Chrysostom)

In Eastern Christianity, the Christogram is sometimes rendered as 'IC XC NIKA' (Ἰησοῦς Χριστὸς νικᾳ), meaning "Jesus Christ Conquers'. This assurance is a clear reinforcement of today's Scriptural lesson of Christ's ultimate victory from the Cross and against all of His enemies.

[The Rose of Sharon blossom and the buds and leaves pictured are from a shrub I purchased and planted last year from Historic Oakland Cemetery in Atlanta. We see God's power in this life and are assured of it in the life to come in His eternal Kingdom. Amen!






- The Annunciation Cathedral will host the Divine Liturgy on September 29, 2024, and the coffee and or meal to follow as well as all meetings taking place from October 1-2, 2024.

- Other activities TBD




