### **Pastoral Message from Fr. George, October 8, 2025**

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,



A special gift from God is my family's beloved Caleb, a Mountain Cur whose drawing you see—a sketch that captures not only his form, but his spirit. Caleb is not just a dog. He is a companion in the truest sense. His loyalty is unwavering, his discernment keen, his presence a balm in times of trial.

Mountain Curs are known for their intelligence, their endurance, and their protective instincts. Caleb embodies all of these. He often senses danger before it arrives. He guides us with quiet confidence. He remains faithful in chaos and steady in uncertainty. In his eyes, I see the watchfulness of a shepherd and in his posture, the strength of a guardian. He chooses to stay near us, to protect, to love—not out of duty, but out of something deeper. Something revered.

I named our dog **Caleb** because of the strong devotion the Old Testament Caleb had for God. His unwavering faith and courage continue to inspire me—not only through Holy Scripture, but through the past 12 years of daily companionship from our adopted dog we found as a stray to the Diakonia Retreat Center. Had we not adopted him, he would have been taken to a shelter and euthanized. Our choosing him is God's reminder to us that we receive new blessings each day. Caleb's trust and devotion resemble his Old Testament namesake.

From the biblical accounts, we see Caleb as a faithful man who trusted God to fulfill His promises, even when others allowed fear to override their small faith. His devotion did not waver with age; into his later years, Caleb remained steadfast in belief and obedience. God blessed him for his faithfulness and patience, and his life stands as a powerful encouragement for us to believe God wholeheartedly.

Like the biblical Caleb, we, God's people, are called to follow Him in every circumstance—patiently waiting for our Lord to fulfill His

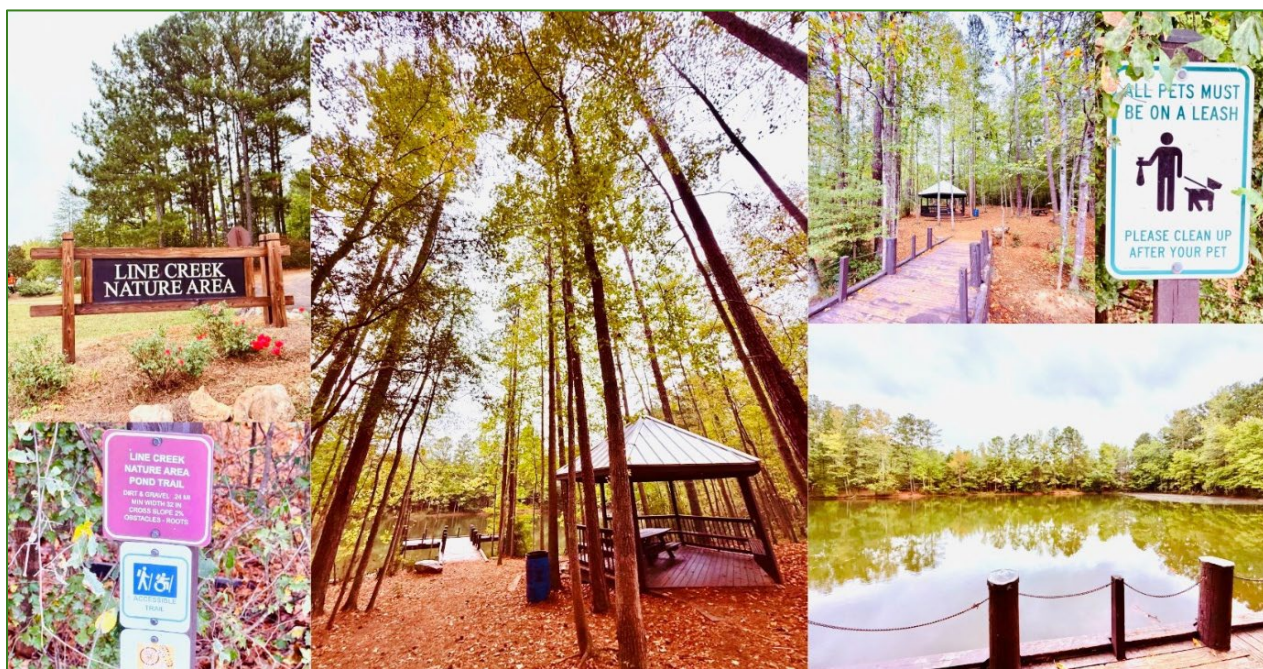
promises and ready to act when the time is right. In our own lives, may we reflect the same trust and devotion. I am reminded of this daily through Caleb, whose loyalty is unwavering and whose trust in me and his family is complete. He follows us without hesitation, listens to our voices, and rests peacefully in our presence—never questioning our care and never doubting our intentions. His devotion is not earned through grand gestures, but through the quiet consistency of love and presence. In many ways, Caleb's companionship mirrors the kind of faith we are called to have in our relationship with God: a faith that walks beside Him without fear, that waits patiently for His guidance, and that responds with readiness when He calls. Through Caleb—both the faithful servant of Scripture and my beloved companion—I am reminded of the profound blessings that come from walking loyally and trustingly with our Lord.

In response to the gifts we receive from our animal companions, I invite our St. Christopher families to join me for a few minutes as I honor our beloved animal companions through prayer and blessing. All our pets—large and small—are welcome!

This **Blessing of the Animals** is reserved for our parishioners' pets and will be on Sunday, October 26<sup>th</sup> from 2:30 – 3:30 p.m. It will not be promoted publicly since we are planning a public community event next Spring. This will be a family opportunity for us to thank God and to bless our pets for their loyalty, their love, and their companionship that do not ask for anything in return. May we learn from them. May we be as faithful, as discerning, and as courageous. And may we never forget to give thanks—for the seen and unseen blessings that walk beside us every day.

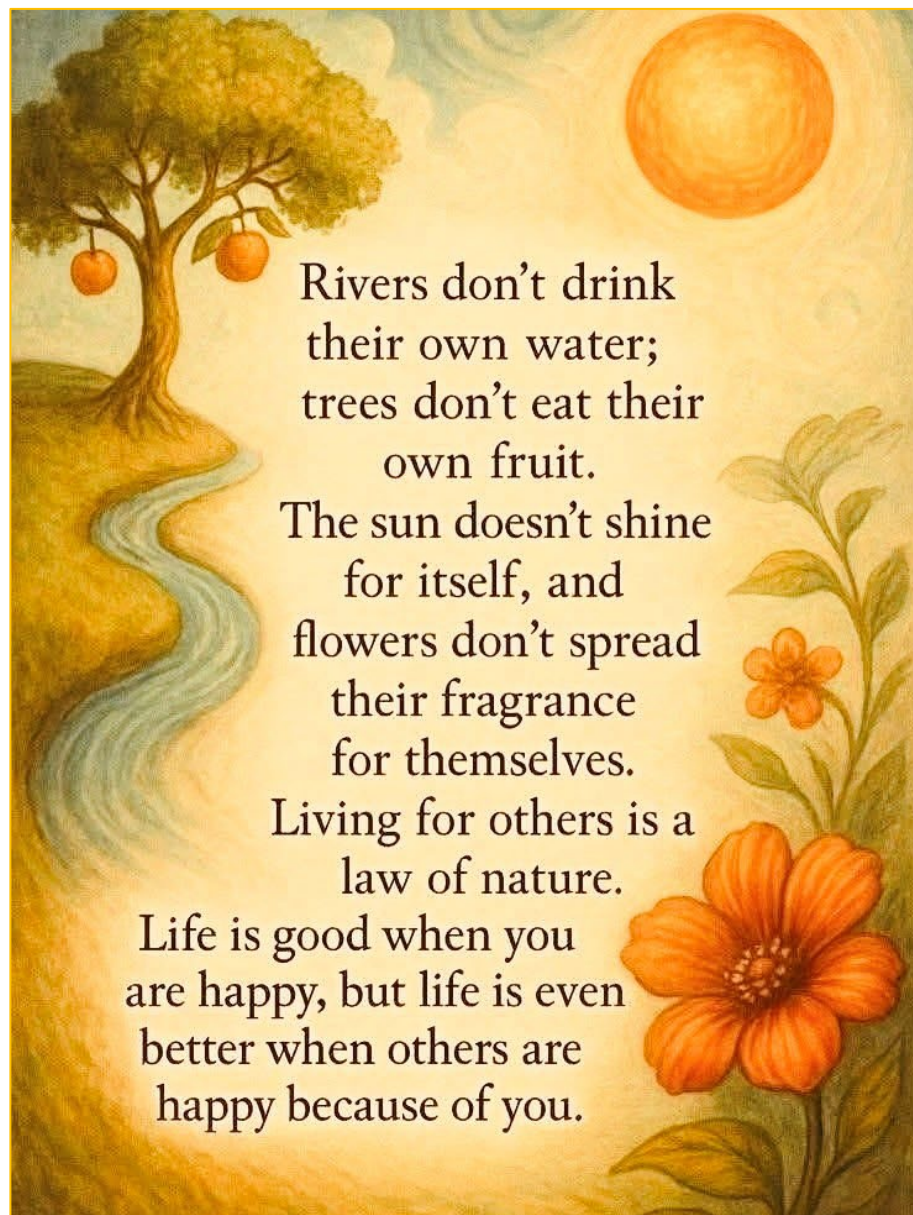

Not too far from our parish, we encounter this intersection—marked by the sign “**Welcome All Road**”. As we gaze upon this image, we are reminded that the road to God’s heart is never closed, never gated, and never reserved for a select few. It is open, wide, and paved with grace. Just as this



road welcomes every traveler, regardless of where they’ve come from or where they’re headed, so too does our parish welcome every soul into our midst.

In the life of the Church, we are not merely spectators—we are participants. Each person who walks through our doors brings with them a sacred offering: their time, their talents, their stories.
