A Call to Serve Our Neighbors in Need

Beloved Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

Recently I spent time with our parishioner Faye Georgeo and sought to learn what motivated her to be so deeply involved in relief efforts in Western North Carolina following the devastation of Hurricane Helene. Truly, her

volunteer work outside of our parish is one of the blessings I have discovered since initiating **“A Call to Action”** this summer – encouraging parishioners to discern their gifts, serve with joy, and help build up the Body of Christ:

Let your faith find expression in service. Let your joy take root in community. Let us build God’s Holy Church—together.

“*Each one has received a gift.*
Use it to serve one another...” – 1 Peter 4:10

I want to take a moment to recognize Faye’s extraordinary commitment—not only has she given of her time and energy, but she has also made significant personal and financial sacrifices to help hurricane disaster families in need.

Faye has partnered with grassroots teams like the Cajun Navy, Mountain Mule Packers, and even Amish work crews. She’s helped organize winter clothing shipments and been witnessed creative methods like goat-scaping to clear debris from damaged properties. Her work is a living example of Christ’s love in action.

I’ve encouraged Faye to share her ministry at our upcoming Philoptochos General Meeting on October 19 under New Business, and I hope many of you will be there to hear her

witness of service and compassion to those who have not yet recovered from the devastation of Hurricane Helene.

But today, I want to invite you to do more than listen—I want to invite you to join her efforts as you are able.

With God's help and ours, Faye would like to organize a weekend relief trip to Western North Carolina in the near future. I plan to reach out to my Brother Priest in Asheville, NC, and solicit him to work with his parish families to host our volunteers on Friday and Saturday nights. On Saturday, we'll help with home repairs, debris removal, and hopefully share time with those we serve. On Sunday, we'll worship together with the local community.

Many people assume that the majority of need in Western North Carolina has already been met—but it has not.

Families are still struggling, and our help is still needed.

"Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others." — Philippians 2:4


This verse reminds us that Christian love is not passive—it moves us to action. By joining this mission, we embody the selfless care Christ calls us to offer. Whether through hands-on service, prayer, or presence, your participation will bring hope and healing to those still recovering.

If Faye can garner the support of our Philoptochos Society, I call upon you to join this effort and speak with Faye, so she can organize sign-ups and coordinate travel and lodging. As Faye has assisted those in need, she has encountered volunteers from other states who are pitching in using their own

The Power of Teamwork:

Faye Georgeo shared photos of her relief work in western North Carolina to help someone she discovered had serious health issues named Tracie. Following Hurricane Helene, Tracie had been homeless for more than a year, living in her car before being given an RV that was run down. Scott, a volunteer carpenter, did electrical work but noted the rubber roof was splitting and only good for another few



months. In the photo at right, Tracie is wearing the purple shirt standing next to Scott's wife, who worked tirelessly with many volunteer groups, coordinating supplies, vetting trailers, everything! The past year has taken a toll on Tracie's health, which was not great to begin with. She



has a goat-scaping business and rents them for events but with all the devastation, it brings in limited income as she seeks to repair her RV and maintain her fragile health.


Pictured at left is Scott, the carpenter from Pennsylvania who came right after the hurricane and helped many people, including a poor woman who was having cancer treatments. He and another volunteer carpenter from Charleston, SC, gutted the floors of Tracie's RV and tore out wallboard up at least a yard, to save her home. Scott and his wife drove down again from Pennsylvania about three weeks ago, met Faye and Tracie and he replaced her leaking RV skylight and advised that she desperately needed a metal pavilion like the one in the third photo to protect her RV when winter weather arrives. It costs between 5 and 8 thousand dollars as it needs to be anchored in cement.
