


Liturgical Guide for Sunday, December 7, 2025

**ON THIS DAY, THE 10TH SUNDAY OF ST. LUKE, THE CHURCH
COMMEMORATES** Ambrose, Bishop of Milan (+397);
Athenodoros the Martyr of Mesopotamia; & Righteous Father
Gerasimus, Ascetic of Euboea (4th cent.). *Through their holy
intercessions, O God, have mercy on us and save us. Amen.*

SPECIAL HYMNS SUNG BEFORE/AFTER SMALL ENTRANCE

1/2. Resurrectional Hymn (First Tone) – (Hymnal-pp. 98-101):

It is sung before and after the Small Entrance: Although Your tomb was sealed with a stone, O Savior, and Your most pure body was guarded by the soldiers, You rose on the third day giving life to all the world. Therefore, O giver of life, the powers of heaven praise You: Glory to Your resurrection, O Christ. Glory to Your kingdom. Glory to Your saving wisdom, O only lover of mankind.

3. Hymn Commemorating St. Christopher – (see handout):

It is sung after the Small Entrance. Made comely with garments woven from your venerable blood, you stand before the Lord, the King of Heaven and earth, O famed Martyr Christopher. With the choirs of Angels and the Martyrs you chant, singing the thrice-holy hymn and most awesome praises. Thus, by your intercessions with God, save us, your servants.

4. Kontakion – Preparation for the Nativity (11/26-12/24) – (Hymnal-pp. 240-243):

It is sung after the Small Entrance: Today the Virgin goes forth, making her way to a cave where from her, ineffably, God the eternal Word will be born. Let the world be filled with joy, hearing these tidings. Joining the angels and shepherds, let us give glory to Him who is God from all ages, yet wills to be seen as a little child.

SCRIPTURAL PASSAGES FROM TODAY'S DIVINE LITURGY

The Scriptures were not given us for this only, that we might have them in books, but that we might engrave them on our hearts. – St. John Chrysostom

Gospel Reading During Orthros Service (Luke 24:1-12)

But on the first day of the week, at early dawn, they came to the tomb, taking the spices that they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they went in, they did not find the body. While they were perplexed about this, suddenly two men in dazzling clothes stood beside them. The women were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, “Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Remember how He told you, while He was still in Galilee, that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners, and be crucified, and on the third day rise again.” Then they remembered His words, and returning from the tomb, they told all this to the eleven and to all the rest. Now it was Mary Magdalene, Joanna, Mary the mother of James, and the other women with them who told this to the apostles. But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. But Peter got up and ran to the tomb; stooping and looking in, he saw the linen cloths by themselves; then he went home, amazed at what had happened.

Epistle Reading During Divine Liturgy (Ephesians 5:8-19)

Brethren, walk as children of light (for the fruit of light is found in all that is good and right and true), and try to learn what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but

instead expose them. For it is a shame even to speak of the things that they do in secret; but when anything is exposed by the light it becomes visible, for anything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it is said, "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give you light." Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise men but as wise, making the most of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery; but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart.

Gospel Reading During Divine Liturgy (Luke 13:10-17)

Luke 13:10 Now He was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. 11 And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. 12 When Jesus saw her, He called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." 13 When He laid His hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. 14 But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day." 15 But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the sabbath untie his ox or his donkey from the manger, and lead it away to give it water? 16 And ought not this woman, a daughter

of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the sabbath day?" 17 When He said this, all His opponents were put to shame; and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things that He was doing.

PASTORAL REFLECTION FROM FR. GEORGE:

Today, I kindly ask you to consider this parable about hidden needs. A nurse asked the doctor treating a patient, "Should I replace the bandage on his ankle? It looks well enough to be removed now."

The physician replied, "Yes, give him a new bandage. He doesn't really need it there, but I want him to come back, so I can check up on something else about him. Without the bandage he won't return."

Many times patients are brought to the doctor by members of their family for some hidden reason because the patient will not

come for the true reason. This is done to avoid unnecessary rebellion or anxiety. It is important that the trouble be ascertained, and the cure administered.

People sometimes come into our midst for some selfish reason, but whatever brings them to us can lead to a good result. When they meet us at church, many ask the question, "Why did this happen to me?" Defeats sometimes set the stage for victory. Those who suffer great sorrow may become equipped to give understanding, love and help to others. The alcoholic may be more willing to receive assistance from one who suffered the same failing.

My brothers and sisters in Christ, thousands of good deeds are performed daily in patterns that circumvent the barriers of human pride. Each of us may ask, "What hidden blessings has God in store today?" Challenging difficulties can cause us to build character and faith or give us opportunity to serve others in Christ's spirit.

This is the message the Apostle James was teaching when he offered, *“My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy, because you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance; and let endurance have its full effect, so that you may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing.”* (James 1:2-4) Amen!

On this the 1080th Sunday of our St. Christopher's parish community, we continue to thank each of you for your presence and support. Although it may seem like we are just a handful of men, women, and children, if we commit ourselves to serving our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, we will experience the miracle of growth as the Holy Spirit brings others into His service to help us build His new church in the Peachtree City, Georgia, area for the glory of God! 





Here are four family reflection questions from Fr. George based on today's Epistle (Ephesians 5:8–19) and Gospel (Luke 13:10–17). They are designed to encourage family discussion and practical application in your spiritual lives.

1. Walking in the Light

Saint Paul says in today's Epistle reading: "*Walk as children of light.*"

Question: What does it mean for our family to "walk in the light" in our daily life?

Can we name one habit or attitude we need to change this week to reflect Christ's light more clearly?

2. Practicing Goodness

The Epistle reading teaches that the fruit of light is **goodness, righteousness, and truth.**

Question: How can we show **goodness** to someone outside our family—especially someone who may have hurt us or is difficult to love? What is one concrete act of kindness we can do together this week?

3. Making the Most of Time

The Apostle Paul urges: "*Make the most of the time, because the days are evil.*"

Question: How can we use our time during the Nativity Lent wisely? What is one spiritual practice (prayer, Scripture reading, attending a service) we can commit to as a family this week?

4. Responding to Christ's Call

In the Gospel reading for today, Jesus calls the bent-over woman forward and heals her.

Question: What "burdens" or "weights" keep us from standing upright spiritually? How can we bring these to Christ together—through prayer, forgiveness, or confession—so He can heal us?
