A Call to Action: Reaching, Shining, Building Together

Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

Today, let us look to a surprising image for divine inspiration: the giraffe. With its neck stretched toward heaven, it reaches for leaves no other creature can touch. It moves with quiet dignity, not struggling to fit in but embracing its purpose in God's creation.

This noble creature reminds us of our own spiritual calling. Christ tells us in Matthew's Gospel:

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden."

These are not simply poetic words—they are a call to action. We are meant to reach upward and outward,

to let our faith find expression in service, and our joy take root in community.

Faith Finds Fruit When We Serve

"Through Mountains and Mist: Seeing the Lord in Creation"

When parishioners travel, I often ask them to share photos with me which I find soothing and informative. After receiving the following photos from John and Brigid, I prayed and reflected on what spiritual nuggets they might offer. My thoughts below were inspired by their photos and captions. Like artwork, beautiful and unexpected photos can take us to new realms of understanding.

On a sunlit morning last week, John and Brigid began their journey to Michigan with prayer and joyful expectation. As they traveled through the




lush folds of Tennessee, with the mountains rising, they encountered many scenic overlooks. For me, mountains remind me of the soul's upward journey—

challenging yet glorious. In their height we're prompted to answer the calling to holiness and the pilgrimage toward divine presence.

While driving in the mountains, their eyes were drawn to a rock witnessing a message etched from the Book of Lamentations: "Yet hope returns when

I remember this one thing:
The Lord's unfailing love and
mercy still continue, fresh
as the morning, as sure as
the sunrise. The Lord is all I
have, and so in Him I put my
hope." (from Lamentations
3:21–24)



This Old Testament passage poetically lamenting the destruction of Jerusalem in 586 BCE gives rise to serious reflection. Even in sorrow, there is renewal. Even in silence, God speaks. I offer thanks to the Lord Who inspired someone to inscribe such majesty into the landscape to be shared with all who are blessed to discover and read its message.



John and Brigid came upon a high overlook where the land opened wide—mountains rising, valleys sinking, and a thick fog clinging to the ridges and hollows. The vapor rolled in soft

waves, obscuring the depths with mystery. For me, fog is not an obstacle, but resembles a holy veil—a reminder that faith often requires us to trust what we cannot yet see. Just as the light still touches the hidden valleys beneath the mist, so too does God's mercy reach us even when clarity eludes us. The overlook's obscured valleys become a metaphor for the soul's unseen paths, where God's mercy is present even when direction isn't clear. It's in the fog we learn to walk by faith, not by sight.



In Elizabethton,
Tennessee, the town
glows with quiet beauty.
A mural stretched
across a brick wall,

radiant with color exhibits local flora and fauna. Nearby, an old tree stands strong, drawing John to leave behind his earthly cares and ponder the stillness of time, so richly surrounded by God's natural creation. The tree represents spiritual endurance—the kind forged through seasons of trial. Its roots reflect the unseen depth of faith that



anchors us through storms, like the Prophet expressed: "He shall be like a tree planted by the waters." (Jeremiah 17:8)




A bridge arches gracefully over the Doe River, inviting travelers to cross not just water but into community, memory, and prayer. The bridge seems to whisper: *Mercy has a way of crossing any divide*. Indeed, a bridge invites movement from separation to union, echoing Christ's role as mediator between humanity and divinity. Every crossing over it is a spiritual act of reconciliation and peace.

During their trip, John and Brigid spent time with their close friends, Lazarus, Zacharias and Sydney. Their spirit offers a vision of sanctified friendship—a fellowship that reflects the unity of the Trinity and the Church. To love another faithfully is to shine Christ's light into the world.



By the lake in Kalamazoo, Michigan, they paused to savor the joy of their friendship, and the possibilities God always provides. They shared stories—not just of faith, but of daily renewal... how each morning brings fresh mercy and how God's light, as referenced in this past Sunday's Gospel lesson from Matthew, shines in every loving act: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden." This is lived out through these friends' witness and joy.



In addition, the still waters reflect the soul at peace, mirroring God's renewal through baptism, confession, and quiet contemplation. Lakes call us to drink deeply of divine serenity, like in Psalm 23: "He leads me beside still waters."

Our Orthodox faith invites us to see sacraments everywhere—not just in the chalice, but in coffee shared with friends, trees that whisper songs, and bridges that echo unity. "If the world is God's cathedral, every breath is liturgy." The word "liturgy" indeed is derived from two Greek words meaning "work or service for the people". For me, these images offer reminders of God's presence in our midst; they enable us to see the Lord's hand in creation.




Upon seeing the images that Brigid took and John shared with me after their return, I am reminded of how God's wonders are easily seen in the mural, the bridge, the tree, the mountains, and the lake. Their journey through Tennessee and Michigan reflect our soul's own movement toward God every day. His created world reflects His handiwork and His presence. It is our choice to follow life's roads that lead us to new encounters. When we do, we use our potential and discover new opportunities to serve God.

I thank John and Brigid for sharing their photos; they reflect the divine made manifest through God's blessings. Indeed, their trip to be with cherished friends heartens us to spend time enjoying the range of nature, engaging in fellowship with our family and friends, and seeking human warmth by gathering with others that we love and appreciate.

In closing, I am grateful for being reminded that our Lord's mercy is renewed each morning, even when fog covers the valley. As His children, we are called to trust in God's steadfastness. In confronting life's darkness, St. Paul offers us steadfast hope: "Not only that, but we rejoice

in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope. And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit Who has been given to us."

My brothers and sisters in Christ, this Scriptural passage assures us that even in the darkest seasons, suffering is not wasted. It becomes the soil from which endurance and character grow—and ultimately, hope. And this hope is not fragile or fleeting; it's anchored in the love of God and poured into us by the Holy Spirit. Just like the earlier photo of the fog, the mist may obscure our path, but the light of hope still burns within, guiding us forward even when the way is hidden. "Glory to God for all things." Amen.


