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

Pastoral Message from Fr. George, August 13, 2025

On Sunday, August 10, Fr. George blessed the religious educators and parish youth and adults as we begin the 2025-2026 school year. He gave everyone a daisy to remind them of his spiritual encouragement in the following message: "Children's Sermon - The Daisy and the Divine Light".



As you begin this new school year, I want you to think about a simple daisy blooming in a field. It doesn't try to be the biggest or the brightest flower—it simply turns its face toward the sun and soaks in the light. That light helps it grow strong, beautiful, and full of life.

Each of you is like that daisy. When you turn your heart toward Jesus, you begin to reflect His love and light in everything you do—whether you're learning in school, helping a friend, or being kind at home.

Now here's something special: once a week, I water the plants in my office. If I forget, they start to droop. But when I care for them, they perk up and bloom again. In the same way, each Sunday we gather in church to receive the blessings God gives us—especially through worship and the Holy Eucharist, His precious Body and Blood. That's how we stay fresh and strong in our faith, just like the daisy that needs water to stay vibrant.



So as you begin your school year, remember to turn toward the light of Christ, and come each Sunday to be nourished by His love. You are His


beautiful creation—meant to grow, shine, and bless the world around you.

Did you know Orthodox Christians observe the Sabbath on Sunday — the Lord's Day?



In the book of Exodus, God commands His people to keep the Sabbath — Saturday — as a day of rest, because on the seventh day, God rested after creating the world (Exodus 31). This was a holy command for the people of Israel, shaping their entire rhythm of life.

But everything changed with Christ's Resurrection. In the Gospel of Matthew (Matthew 28), we read that "after the Sabbath, at dawn on the first day of the week," the women came to the tomb — and found it empty. Christ had risen. That first day of the week, Sunday, became "the Lord's Day" (Κυρι α κή in Greek), the day of joy, of new creation and eternal life in the light of the Resurrection.

The early Christians, including the Apostles, gradually shifted communal worship from Saturday evening into Sunday, celebrating the Holy Eucharist (the breaking of bread — what we now know as the Divine Liturgy) and gathering in the joy of the Resurrection.

The Didache, a first-century Christian text, tells believers to gather and give thanks on "the Lord's Day." By the second century, Saints like Ignatius of Antioch encouraged Christians to worship on Sunday, not the Sabbath. By the time of the First Ecumenical Council in 325, Sunday had become the central day of Christian worship.

In Greek, we don't call it "Sunday" but Kyriake (Κυριακή) — "the Lord's Day." We don't rest because of the seventh day — we rejoice because Christ is risen. We worship the Risen Son of God, who fulfilled the Sabbath and gave us eternal rest in Him. [From Greek Orthodox Archdiocese Religious Education]

Panaghia's motherhood is prayer, offering, and love. In her, every woman finds a holy example.


Mother of Every Mother

- 3. He who set the measures of the earth, God the Word, deigned to be contained, O Pure one, within your womb How do you now fit within a tiny tomb?




She shares a candid and deeply personal account of life as a Christian in the Holy Landnavigating challenges few outsiders truly grasp.


Against the backdrop of geopolitical indifference, she exposes uncomfortable truths: how Western Christian support of Israel often ignores the struggles of local Christian believers.

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
