Beloved in Christ,

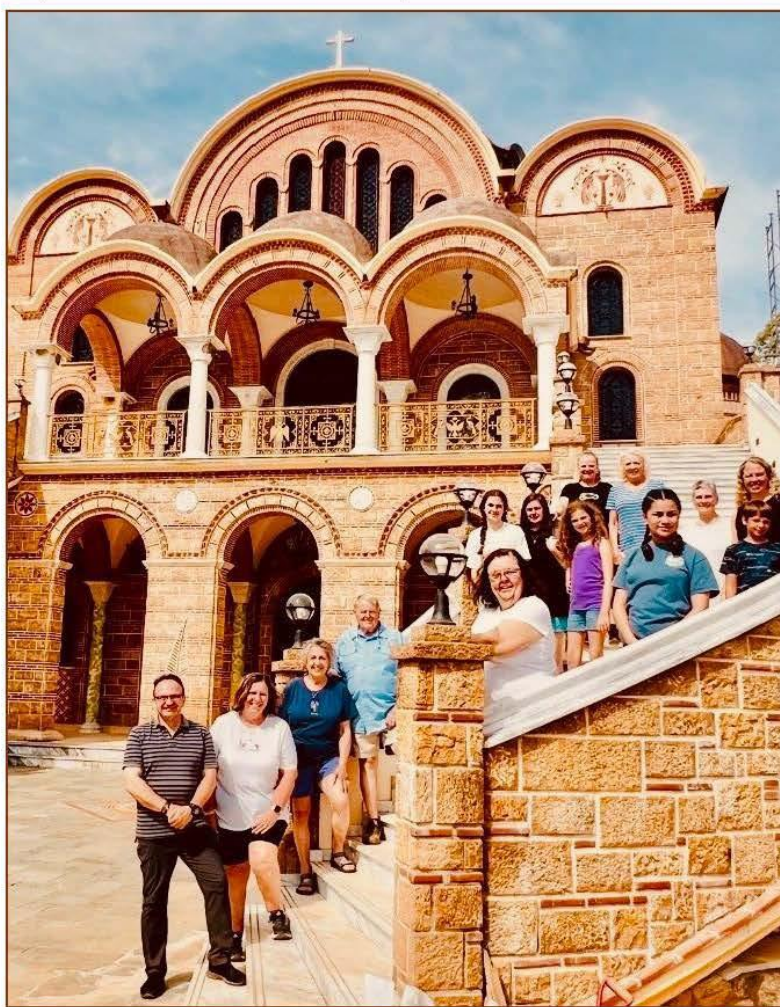
I am seeking your support in honoring His Eminence Metropolitan Alexios because the very existence of our parish is inseparably tied to His faith, His courage, and His unwavering belief in our community. *As the first*



Bishop of our St. Christopher parish, He guided us through our earliest and most vulnerable years. In a remarkable act of trust and pastoral care, He permitted me as Chancellor to share my ministry so that I could serve in Peachtree City and help nurture our mission from its infancy. For twenty-two years we have worshipped in leased facilities, and now, by God's grace, we are preparing to construct our permanent

church. This long-awaited milestone is the direct fruit of Metropolitan Alexios' vision and personal investment in our future.

Upon His retirement, Metropolitan Alexios did not request a banquet, a program, or any formal expression of honor. Instead, under the guidance of our current Bishop, His Eminence Metropolitan Sevastianos, our parishes have been invited to honor Him in a manner consistent with His life of humility and service—by helping to complete the Panagia Chapel at the Alexios Retreat Center. This sacred chapel represents decades of personal sacrifice and dedication by



Metropolitan Alexios. It already serves as a place of formation and prayer at Summer Camp, clergy retreats, parish retreats, Philoptochos retreats, and Lenten retreats. It will continue to strengthen generations of faithful throughout our Metropolis.

Because the initial fundraising goal was not met, this project now requires renewed assistance to avoid

further delay. As a parish that Metropolitan Alexios Himself helped shepherd and sustain, we bear a particular responsibility to respond. Supporting this effort is not merely a financial obligation; it is an expression of gratitude, respect, and continuity—an act of honoring the Hierarch who believed in us, encouraged us, and helped make our present growth possible.

As this blessed Lenten season invites us to renew our faith and deepen our devotion, I ask you to join our 74 sister parishes in keeping the flame of our Panagia Chapel burning brightly.

Just as a fire is strengthened when many logs are placed together, so too does our shared offering—each gift, each family, each parish—kindle the light of Christ's love in our midst.

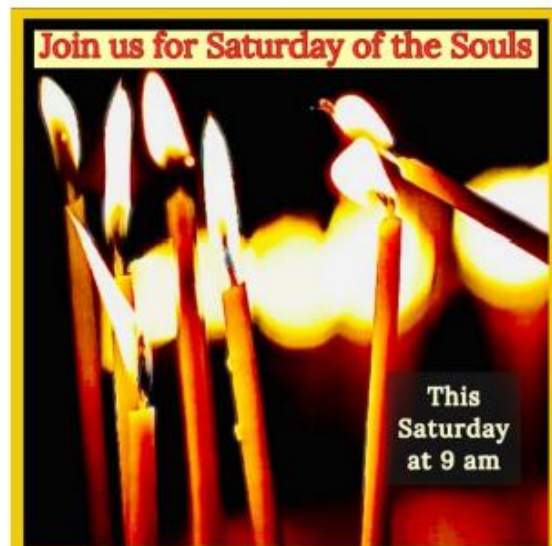

Pastoral Message for Forgiveness Sunday

Opening Prayer

O Lord Jesus Christ, our God,
You are gentle and compassionate, slow to anger and rich in mercy.
You stretched out Your arms upon the Cross to reconcile all creation to Yourself.
Open our hearts this day to the grace of forgiveness.
Cleanse us from resentment, soften our hardened thoughts,
and grant us the humility to seek forgiveness from one another.

By the prayers of the holy Desert Fathers and Mothers—
who taught us the way of repentance, humility, and peace—
guide us into the bright dawn of Your Kingdom.
For You are the source of mercy and the giver of peace,
and to You we give glory: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit,
now and forever and unto the ages of ages. Amen.

Beloved in Christ,

This Sunday, following the Divine Liturgy, our parish will gather for the sacred *Service of Forgiveness*, the holy doorway through which we step into Great Lent. I believe this moment is a profound opportunity for every soul connected to our parish—faithful stewards, those who have grown distant, and our dear catechumens—to be present, to participate, and to experience the healing grace of mutual forgiveness.

How the World Responds—and How the Church Heals

We live in a world quick to judge and slow to understand. Modern life often encourages us to point fingers, to condemn, to distance ourselves from those who stumble. People who make mistakes can find themselves isolated, shamed, and alone. In such an environment, the human heart can grow hopeless.

But the Church is different.

Christ founded His Church as a spiritual hospital, a place where the broken are welcomed, the wounded are tended, and sinners find not judgment but restoration.

St. John Chrysostom famously taught:

"The Church is not a courtroom; it is an infirmary for sinners."

This is the ethos of Forgiveness Sunday.

Here, we do not condemn—

we reconcile.

Here, we do not cast out—

we heal.

Here, we do not isolate—

we restore one another in love.

The Witness of the Desert Fathers

The Desert Fathers, our earliest spiritual physicians, spoke clearly about the danger of condemnation and the healing power of forgiveness.

Abba Moses the Black said:

"If we keep our own faults before our eyes, we will never see those of our brother."

This is not a call to self-criticism but to compassion.

Abba Poemen taught:

"Do not give your heart to that which does not satisfy the heart."

Condemnation never satisfies; only forgiveness brings peace.

An Elder said:

"We have not been commanded to accuse our brothers, nor condemn them, nor speak evil of them, but rather to forgive them."

This is the pure Gospel lived honestly and humbly.

Why Mutual Forgiveness Is Essential

The Fathers remind us that sin—*amartía*—is “missing the mark,” a wandering of the heart. Often our words or actions cause harm without our awareness. *Mutual forgiveness becomes essential: it restores relationships, heals unseen wounds, and strengthens our parish as a family journeying toward the Resurrection.*

Our Lord Himself teaches with clarity:

“If you do not forgive others, your Father will not forgive your trespasses”
(Matthew 6:14–15).

This commandment is not symbolic; it is essential to our salvation.

As your Priest, I pray that each of us finds the courage this Sunday to come forward—to ask forgiveness, to grant forgiveness, and to begin the Lenten journey with renewed humility and love. When we bow before one another, we do not bow to shame, but to Christ Himself, present in each person.

May this holy service soften our hearts, unite our parish, and open for us a Lent filled with repentance, healing, and hope.

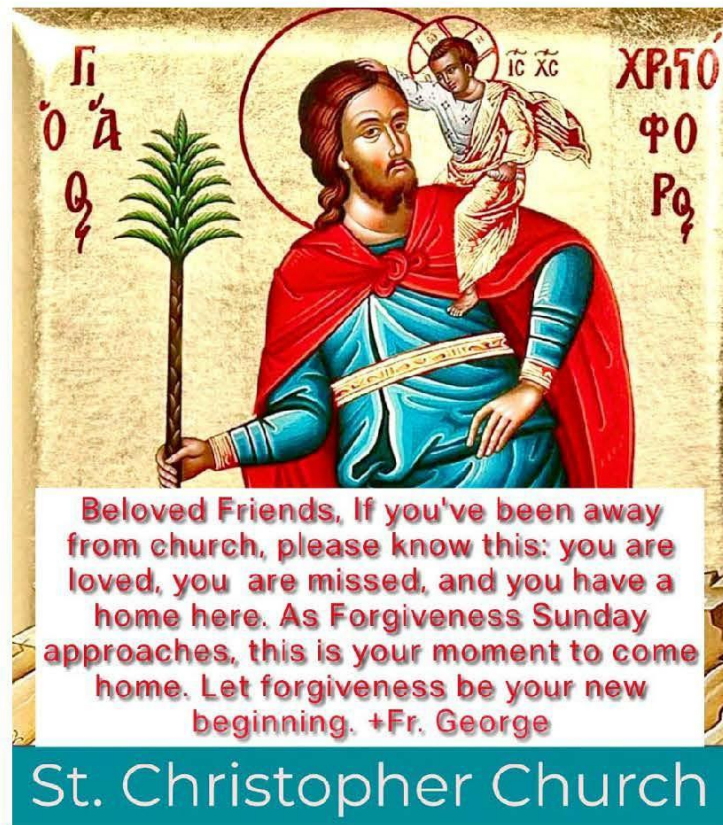
Closing Prayer

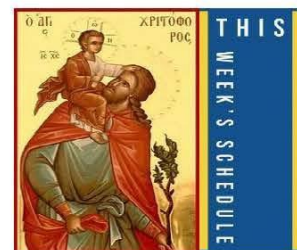
In Greek, the mystery is called Εὐχέλαιον (*Euchelaion*, from εὐχή, 'prayer', and ἔλαιον, 'oil'). The oil carries God's grace both to renew the body and to cleanse the spirit. The service follows the apostolic tradition mentioned in the New Testament: *"Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and have them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord. The prayer of faith will save the sick, and the Lord will raise them up; and anyone who has committed sins will be forgiven."* (James 5:14-15).

Holy Unction is a mystery of great comfort to the faithful. It provides uplifting and asks for patience to accept the will of God whatever the physical outcome. *This service begins early to minimize work absence.*

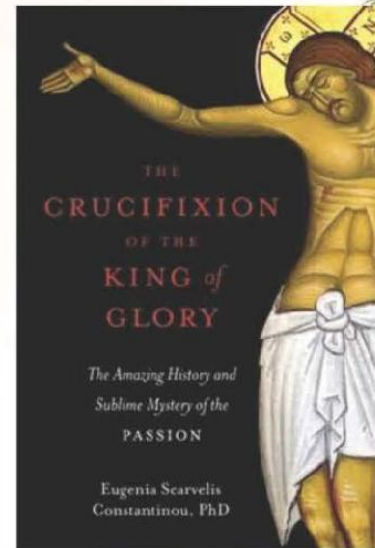

2026 Prayer Shawl Blessing

The Prayer Shawl Ministry at St. Christopher's has been creating and donating handmade Prayer Shawls since 2009. These shawls are the results of the time and talents shared by our members, and friends, to craft these shawls by knitting, crocheting, weaving, or quilting them. Shawls can even be produced by decoratively finishing commercially produced fabric.

As you begin to plan your project, please keep the following guidelines in mind. Consistency in the size and finish of the shawls is important because we often give multiple shawls to one organization. We want the recipients to feel that their shawl was made specifically for them! Prayer shawls can be either triangular or rectangular but need to be long enough to wrap securely around the body. Rectangular shawls should be 20" - 26" wide and 68" - 72" long with fringe or other decorative finish at each end. Triangular shawls should be 60" - 72" across the longest side, 24" - 30" to the point with fringe along the two short sides or other decorative finish all around. Lap blankets should be 36" - 40" on each side. Yarn color is important as we are trying to uplift the spirits of the recipients of the shawls and blankets. Yarn or cloth texture is also important because we want these items to lovingly wrap the recipients in our Christian love. The finished items should be soft and drape or "scrunch" comfortably, something everyone would want to be hugged by!

1800s – The Beginnings of Philoptochos



The very beginnings of Philoptochos can be traced to the late 1800s when hundreds of immigrants were arriving daily in the United States from Greece, Asia Minor, and Constantinople. At that time, women's clubs formed in churches in major cities across the US to tackle the formidable task of welcoming the new immigrants and assisting them in acclimating to their new environment. These clubs continued in various forms until the first part of the 20th century.

Philoptochos was officially founded and organized in its current form in 1931 by then Archbishop, and later, Ecumenical Patriarch Athenagoras I. From its inception, Archbishop Athenagoras charged Philoptochos not only with assisting the needy in their communities, but also with planning family events with music, educational lectures, and performances.

The vasilopites, which were baked to celebrate the name day of St. Basil, were auctioned off to raise funds to care for the orphans of the community. Education was another priority of the Archbishop, and he asked the chapters to support Holy Cross Theological School, which was founded in 1937. All of these programs, which the Archbishop promoted in the 1930s, inspire the programs of Philoptochos to this day.

Established in the midst of a historic depression, Philoptochos responded vigorously to the needs of its community. Over the decades, Philoptochos chapters have continued to respond wherever the need arises — within their local communities, the community at large, and throughout the world.

OCPM Board of Trustees Meeting Report

Our OCPM Board of Trustees meeting was held February 12-14, 2026 in Dallas, TX. Our first evening entailed dinner, with Nico Petrogeorge, the Executive Director of OCPM, board members, prospective boards members, guests and potential donors. This is a relaxed event where we get to know each other, share the good works of OCPM, and answer any questions they may ask. I was blessed at dinner to sit by Father John Mamangakis who is from our Metropolis and currently serving in Panama City, FL. Likewise he joined our meeting on Friday.

Our board meeting was held on Friday at Saint John the Baptist Greek Orthodox Church in their parish hall, their parish priest is Father Vasile Tudora. They have a beautiful Byzantine church that was designed by Father Vasile's wife Presbyteria Mirela, we were blessed to be able to meet both Father Vasile and Presbyteria Mirela and to tour the church after lunch.

In our first session the Executive Director Nico Petrogeorge reported on the state of OCPM, the Spiritual Support Programs, on the work that is being done for recognition of Orthodoxy in Corrections, on the Church Programs and Training Programs. He also reported on Operations, Development and Staffing updates and needs.

Our second session consisted of Board Business with reports from the Finance Committee, the Trusteeship Committee, the Legal Committee, and meetings for the remainder of the year were set.

We learned that OCPM has faithful employees who truly give of their time, talents and treasurers, finances are in order, and that OCPM continues to grow and improve.

The meeting is business, but stories are shared from individuals who have done or are doing in-prison ministry. These stories are hard to hear and complicated, but also truly inspirational to learn that despite their circumstance's prisoners discover redemption and hope in Christ through the work of OCPM.

I feel blessed to be part of this ministry and look forward to our Pascha card event for prisoners on Sunday, March 1, 2026. Please continue to keep OCPM, those incarcerated and their families, and those working with the incarcerated in your prayers.

A heartfelt message on Pascha breaks through the sense of isolation and loneliness. Your card may well be the only one they receive. Your card lets our brothers and sisters in prison know that the Church remembers them, cares about them, and that they, too, are part of the Body of Christ.

ACADEMIC and ENROLLMENT REQUIREMENTS

- Applicants must have a minimum GPA of 3.0 out of 4.0 (or 83 out of 100) and planning to be enrolled full-time at an accredited college or university for the 2026 – 2027 academic year to be eligible.

AREA OF CONSIDERATION and RESIDENCY / OTHER REQUIREMENTS

- Multiple scholarships will be awarded based on scholastic achievement.
- Multiple scholarships will be awarded based on both scholastic achievement and financial need.
- One scholarship will be awarded in recognition of a scholar-athlete.
Applicants for the above 3 categories must reside in the Greater Metropolitan Atlanta Area.
- One scholarship is designated for a student pursuing a graduate degree in Nursing.
Applicants must reside in the state of Georgia and plan to be enrolled in a graduate nursing program approved by the Georgia Board of Nursing.
- Three scholarships are available for students attending Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology.
Applicants must reside in the geographical area within the Greek Orthodox Metropolis of Atlanta and plan to attend Holy Cross School of Theology.
- The Johnny N. Economy Scholarship is available to all students.
Applicants must submit an additional essay on a topic of their choosing regarding Hellenism. This scholarship has no residency requirement.

Note that unless you are from the greater Metro Atlanta area, your residency status is considered "out of area" regardless of your current address, and with the exceptions noted above (Graduate Nursing & Holy Cross student applications) you are only eligible to apply for the Johnny N. Economy Scholarship.

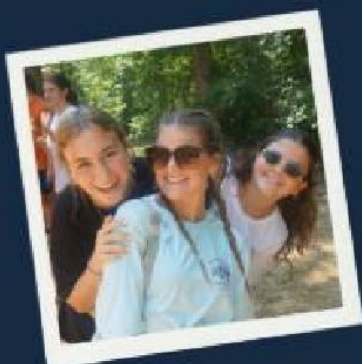

Students can apply to any/all of the 3 program options (but only attend one) in June or July in Athens (ACG or CYA) or Thessaloniki (ACT), each blending language lessons, cultural workshops, historic site visits, and meaningful connections with Greek peers. Criteria for Eligibility (for all programs):

- 18-26 years old and enrolled as an undergraduate/graduate student with a 3.0+ GPA
- A US/Canadian citizen of Hellenic descent*
- Preferably (not mandatory) visiting Greece for the first time

**Hellenic descent is defined as having one or more parents, grandparents, or great grandparents born in Greece or Cyprus. Please note that siblings or first cousins of past and/or current participants, who meet the program's eligibility criteria, may be considered but they must reimburse NHS for all expense related to participation in the Heritage Greece® Program*
