Return to Ordinary Time

While some may like continue to celebrate the Christmas Season until the Presentation of the Lord on February 2, liturgically we put away the white and gold this week and bring back the green for ordinary time.

Historically, "Ordinary Time" used to be broken into two distinct seasons: this time after the Epiphany of the Lord until Lent, and the time after Pentecost.

To our ears, "ordinary" implies the opposite of "extraordinary." Thus, we tend to fall into a trap of thinking these Sundays are somehow less important than other Sundays of the year, e.g. Easter, Pentecost, Christ the King, etc. But while those holidays are important and clearly deserve special attention, remember that every Sunday is a memorial of the Lord's day. Every Sunday is important.

In fact, when we use the word "ordinary," we don't mean that this time of the year is not extraordinary, or any other synonym that might be associated with that meaning of ordinary. Instead, "Ordinary Time" refers to the fact that it is arranged using the "ordinal numbers," (first, second, third, etc.).

We pray in the preface, "For you laid the foundations of the world and have arranged for the changing of times and seasons; you have formed man in your own image and set humanity over the whole world in all its wonder, to rule in your name over all you have made and forever praise you in your mighty works."

We might consider, therefore, "Ordinary Time" as a time for us to cooperate with God's power. Having reflected on the mysteries of the other seasons, Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, etc., we take the graces we have received, and incorporate them into our lives in an ordered way.

May these weeks leading up to Lent beginning in a month, with Ash Wednesday on February 17, be a time of personal and spiritual growth as we prepare to once again celebrate the Paschal Mystery at Easter.


