

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Gaudete Sunday - The Third Sunday of Advent - December 15, 2024

Philippians 4:4-5 Gaudete in Domino simper: iterum dico, gaudete.

Dominus enim prope est. Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near.

Zephaniah 3:14 Shout for joy, O daughter Zion! Sing joyfully, O Israel! Be glad and exult with all your heart.

Luke 3:18 Exhorting them in many other ways, he (John the Baptist) preached good news to the people.

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

The Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent are traditionally known in the sacred liturgy of the Roman Rite by the Latin first words of their Gregorian Chant Introits (Entrance Chants), which remain even in the liturgical reform as the official opening music for these days. In Advent it is Gaudete, whereas in Lent it is Laetare; both are exhortations to the people of God to rejoice in the Lord. In fact, during the many centuries when these ancient and venerable chants were used exclusively, the congregation would immediately know the occasion not only by the words, but also by the proper music. It told them that the holy season of Christmas preparation or Easter preparation was half over. There is still the custom in many parishes to switch from violet-colored vestments to rose colored ones, if these are available, but just for these two Sundays. Clearly, the theme in Advent is rejoicing in the grace won for us by our Divine Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Who wouldn't want to be reborn in Christ?

In these days of text-messaging you might try Philippians 4:4. Though a Christian is usually not exempt from suffering, there is always reason to be joyful in the Lord come what may. This joy is not superficial, but enters the depths of one's being in one's heart of hearts. Here, no matter what may be going on, the Lord comes to dwell. Thus, from the Christian perspective, sadness is to live in the state of mortal sin, alienated from God. Authentic Christian joy means to live in the state of sanctifying grace and to grow in that wonderful grace day by day. It is that joy that already gives us a taste of the joy of heaven in this world. That is what the Gospel is all about, meaning in the original Greek, Good News. Right before we receive Holy Communion the priest says: "Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Communion with our Lord is our greatest joy.

In preparation for a joyful Christmas Holy Communion, I encourage all to make a sincere and devout confession. What is Christmas if we are not reborn in the Lord? With this approach we receive the greatest Christmas gift of all.

in trouble and agitation."


It is in the quiet and stillness—through prayer, fasting, and almsgiving—that Catholics will hear him speaking and respond.

Breaking Open the Word

The Catholic Way



This week we hear John the Baptist give concrete examples of what it means to "prepare the way of the Lord." He tells the crowds, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none, and whoever has food must do likewise." Three hundred years later, St. Basil took John the Baptist (and Jesus) so seriously that he wrote "When someone steals another's clothes, we call them a thief. Should we not give the same name to one who could clothe the naked and does not? The bread in your

cupboard belongs to the hungry; the coat unused in your closet belongs to the one who needs it; the shoes rotting in your closet belong to the one who has no shoes; the money which you hoard up belongs to the poor." Do we take these words so seriously? If not, why not?

John the Baptist directed his next two examples of preparing the way for Jesus to particular groups of "middle-men" in his society: the tax collectors and Roman soldiers. Some tax collectors were guilty of padding their wallets by collecting more than the Jewish peasants legally owed to their Roman rulers. Theirs was like white collar crime today—maybe not violent or vicious, but unjust and hurtful, especially to people poorer than them. John the Baptist also challenged the Roman soldiers to stop using their strength and position to extort money out of fear. The Jews had more than enough trials in life without being threatened and falsely accused by the police force of their time. Some parallels might be the racism experienced by people of color in America today (particularly at the hands of the police and criminal justice system), and the power that employers have over undocumented workers and those who don't speak fluent English.

For John, preparing the way for Jesus was about much more than going through a baptismal ritual. It required concrete changes in how people lived their day to-day lives. Perhaps we need to be reminded that when we approach any of the sacraments ourselves. Are we committing to live out what we say we believe?

JOY is essential to the spiritual life. Whatever we may think of or say about God, when we are not joyful, our thoughts and words cannot bear fruit.

Jesus reveals to us God's love so that his joy may become ours and that our joy may become complete. Joy is the experience of knowing that you are unconditionally loved and that nothing—sickness, failure, emotional distress, oppression, war, or even death—can take that love away.

Joy is not the same as happiness. We can be unhappy about many things, but joy can still be there because it comes from the knowledge of God's love for us. . . . Joy does not simply happen to us. We have to choose joy and keep choosing it every day.

It is a choice based on the knowledge that we belong to God and have found in God our refuge and our safety and that nothing, not even death, can take God away from us.
