### REFLECTION FOR 5<sup>th</sup> SUNDAY OF LENT

Even though we say that we believe, there is a part of us that doesn't. There are many times in our lives when we experience death, whether it be the physical death of someone we love, a failed relationship, the loss of a job, or a broken dream. As we are going through these death experiences, we can easily find ourselves reaching out to God to make it better and fix it! We think that the proper order of life is to maintain the things of this world, especially those things that are essential to our sense of well-being and security. We do not like change. The grieving that comes from our death experiences can keep us stuck and in despair. If we have lost something or someone of great value, the very meaning and essence of life is lost with them. We need gentle companions to lift us from despair and that is precisely who God desires to be in our life as well.

God calls us out of our tombs, where we have been closed up in fear and despair, and shouts, "Come out!" He desperately wants to show us the path to hope and the new life that is possible after loss and death. But our faith can be weak, and we still prefer to cling to the memory of what we had rather than the joyful possibilities of tomorrow. We sometimes live as if God is not real and that the

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transformative power of His resurrected presence is a story found in the Bible rather than a narrative unfolding in our lives.

God is the God of surprises, not our demise. God opens new possibilities, begins new chapters, creates new verses, and brings us to new heights! We spend so much time and energy ruminating over what we left behind yesterday that we are far too tired to see what can unfold tomorrow. Loving someone new doesn't negate our past loves. Embracing the love of a person, God, or life itself tomorrow doesn't diminish the love of yesterday. Each of our loves is different, and one cannot be replaced by another. They don't cancel each other out. God truly has tended to every detail of our lives, and if we listen to each detail, we find that they all lead us back to Him. Jesus wants us to come out of our closed-up tombs. Are we going to listen this time?

**DONATING TO THE PARISH**

Thank you to those who donated online last week or mailed or brought envelopes to the rectory.

With the onset of uncertainties due to the Coronavirus pandemic, we remind people that while we are unable to gather for Mass, the parish still has need of financial support to pay our bills.

An excellent way to do this regularly is to use our secure VANCO link for transfer of funds to the parish account from your designated account.

Go to our website and click on the **ONLINE** icon at the top of the homepage. You will be directed to the secure link and it will walk you through creating your personal profile with password. Once you set that up, you can make donation one week at a time manually or set up regular transfers on a monthly or weekly basis. There is a complete list of all parish and second collections for which you can designate your donations.

If you need help setting this up, feel free to contact Fr. Monroe and he will walk you through the process.

**You can always mail donations to the rectory as many people now do or drop it in the mail slot at the ramp door of the rectory if you are out doing food shopping.**

**HOW TO MAKE A SPIRITUAL ACT OF COMMUNION**

Begin by examining your conscience and making a good Act of Contrition. Then pray one of the prayers recommended by the Saints for inviting Christ into your heart. Here is one by Saint Alphonsus Liguori:

**My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already there, and unite myself wholly to you. Never permit me to be separated from you.**

**Amen.**

A Spiritual Communion can never fully take the place of receiving Holy Communion at Mass, but in these extraordinary times it can help us to stay close to Jesus in the Most Blessed Sacrament of his Body and Blood and unite ourselves with fellow parishioners with whom we usually worship on Saturday or Sunday.

**HOLY WEEK**

With Governor Baker's **Shelter in Place Advisory** in effect until at least April 7<sup>th</sup>, there will obviously be no public Palm Sunday Masses. Fr. Monroe will do a private Mass that day to bless the palms for this year.

We have been given permission to allow people to come to the parking lot and remain in their cars to receive palms. Fr. Monroe will go car to car with gloved hands and distribute the palms through an open car window. He will do this at 10:00 am and 12:00 noon on April 5<sup>th</sup>.

**Bishop McManus will preside at simplified liturgies for Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday at St. Paul's Cathedral with a congregation limited to 10 people (musicians, lector and servers) -- Holy Thursday at 7:30 pm, Good Friday at 3:00 pm and Holy Saturday Easter Vigil at 7:30 pm.**
