

You can feel so small standing by the seashore. The vastness of all that is before you expands much farther than your eye can see. What is happening on the other side? As tides continue to ebb and flow, what occurs as they come and go remains largely a mystery and the effects of their presence unknown in your sight. Yet, things are moving and changing as you gaze upon the water, as the thumbprint of their presence is left behind. The greater the wind and wave, the greater the effect. But even a gentle breeze leaves its humble mark upon the seashore on which you stand. The smallest pebble still makes a ripple in the great blue expanse of ocean waters. It doesn't need to be big.

You never know the full impact of your smallest gesture or simplest of words. A yes or no, agree or disagree, here or there, this or that can influence time and history in ways you may never know. The Holy Spirit is like that: fierce and torrential, and then almost still and silent, creating and recreating nonetheless. Coming as a gentle breeze or a gusty wind, God's Holy Spirit continues to move over, around, and into the waters of our lives. The Spirit brings fruit and unknown possibilities to what we humbly bring with us and that same Spirit eventually brings all to fulfillment in Christ.

The first disciples didn't have much. They possessed simple faith and a willingness to go into unchartered territory with a love of their friend-God, humble offerings, and a knowledge that they were not alone. This allowed them to do amazing things with very little. Do you believe that you are being led and that you have a purposeful life? We often do not realize our value because we do not think that the little we have is good enough. How wrong we are! A little flour mixed with water and embraced by a prayer of blessing transforms simple offerings into the magnificent Eucharistic presence of God. If the Holy Spirit can do such amazing things with these humble gifts of the earth, even more can happen with you. Don't underestimate the value of the smile you gave a stranger, the door held open for an elderly widow, the listening ear offered to one who was lonely, the tolerance given to the wounded soul who is angry, and the loving shoulder you offered as a cradle under the head of someone in pain. Modest gifts offered with love can be transformed by the Spirit into wondrous blessings you may never know. It's Pentecost. Trust. You are not alone. ©LPi

## RESUMPTION OF PUBLIC MASSES

Capacity for any Mass is limited to 40% of our legal capacity with an added protocol that allows approximately 6 feet of distancing from anyone not your spouse or family members. Therefore, realistically, we will be limited to about 140 people for any Mass. Entry to the church will be through the double glass doors facing the parking lot and the handicap accessible door at the side of the hall next to the church. The Main Street doors and ramp doors remain locked and can be used as exits only.

Except for children 2 years and younger and people with a medical reason for not doing so, everyone must have a mask or face covering to enter the church and wear it during the Mass except to drop it for reception of Communion.

When you enter, a volunteer will offer a squirt of hand sanitizer. You can then enter the church, keeping appropriate distance as you go to a pew. There will be a printed sheet for you to use if you would like containing the text of people's prayers and Liturgy of the Word for the Mass since the hymnals had to be stored for the time being to prevent contamination from multiple users. *Both the prayer sheet and bulletins need to be dropped into boxes that will be at the doors for disposal since we cannot reuse such items.*The Mass will not include processions or hymns. The only parts sung will the Gospel and Eucharistic acclamations. The cantor – who will be in the choir loft will sing a Communion Litany to create a decent atmosphere for reception of Communion.

There will be no altar servers or Communion Ministers used for the time being and no offertory presentation of bread and wine.

For those who would like to receive Communion (in the form of consecrated bread only), ushers will invite people to come forward, one row at a time beginning at the front. As you come out of your pew, open your hand palm up and the usher will spray mist your hand with sanitizer to be spread over your hands. Then come up to the priest who will gently drop the host in your extended hand. Step to the yellow line away from the center, heading for the side aisle, consume your host and put your mask back on and return to your seat. In the 4th century, St. Cyril of Jerusalem described the manner of receiving Communion this way: "Cup your hands, one above the other, to make a throne for your King." This way the priest can simply drop the host into your palm and avoid physical contact with you for the safety of those who follow you. At the end of Mass, everyone will be asked to patiently leave, one row at a time beginning with the first row exiting through the Family Center Atrium and beginning with last row exiting through the Main Street vestibule.

Do not stop and socialize with anyone and keep the required 6 foot distance between yourself and people in front of and behind you.

# FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The parish is continuing to pay ordinary bills thanks to the ongoing generosity of so many of you. At Masses, there will be no collection taken up but those who attend are asked to drop their donations in boxes at the Holy Family Shrine and the doors at the back of the church if you exit through the Main Street lobby. More of our parishioners are now using the online donation link on our website and many of you are mailing or dropping donations in the rectory ramp door slot. ## **PARTNERS IN CHARITY**

Our Lady of the Angels parishioners are continuing to respond to the annual appeal, mailing their 2020 gifts to the rectory or dropping them off with parish donations.
