Thank you for sharing in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass with us today. Please introduce yourself after Mass.

<u>If you are a Catholic</u>, we at Holy Nativity receive Holy Communion kneeling and by intinction (both species on the tongue).

<u>If you are not a Catholic</u>, during Communion we invite you either to come forward with your arms crossed over your chest, or fingers across your lips, and receive a blessing from the Priest or Deacon, or remain in your pew and reflect on the presence of Christ.

Today we celebrate the Epiphany of our Lord, when He was introduced to the wise men from the East. The drama of the revealing of our Lord to the world contains a cast of characters who each have a lesson to teach us.

Herod, the King, jealous of power, unwilling to give up any of his control. Fearful of the prophecy that said the Messiah was coming. More in love with the world's pleasures than in doing what is righteous. How does Herod find his way into our lives? Are there times we fight desperately against God seeking to maintain control? Do we seek to snuff the divine light within because it is inconvenient to do God's will? We can find ourselves in Herod's shoes more easily than we like to admit.

The religious leaders. Not willing to investigate for themselves. Not wanting to give up their position of leadership. Not willing to rock the boat. It takes courage to be willing to dig deeper into ones faith and actually seek to give ourselves to a living relationship with God. Our biggest fear might be that God would ask us to step out of our comfort and actually step out in Faith.

The Magi, willing to invest their lives in the finding of the Messiah. They left their established lives in the East and set out in search of a child. They were willing to stop and ask directions they arrived in Jerusalem. Making the logical assumption they went to the palace to find a child born king. We are told that Herod was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. How awkward the silence must have been when they asked the question, "Where is he that is born King of the Jews?" A frantic call for information from the religious scholars who returned the answer, "in Bethlehem". Interestingly even though they knew the answer, none of them were recorded as running ahead of the Magi to pay homage to the Messiah.

Once the Magi left the palace, they again saw the star and followed it to the house where our Lord was, they were willing to live by faith and give action to their faith. They entered the house and fell down and worshipped the Lord of all. With the eyes of faith, they saw in the face of a child the King and Creator worthy of worship. Consider their gifts: Gold – their riches, and ours, given for the service of God. Frankincense – the gift and duty of worship. Myrrh – used for embalming the dead, and a reminder of our Lord's Passion and our need for mortification. On this Epiphany Sunday, we are encouraged to run to offer our duty of worship to the King of kings, it is a journey of Faith, Hope, and Charity, it is a journey of Joy. O Come, Let Us Adore Him!
