

RECENT CHURCH REPAIRS

Our Church and the Fr. Connors Center had a few recent repairs due to some wind damage in early March as well as aging of the structures. You may have noticed for a few weeks in March an 8-10 foot partition from the roof at the very peak was hanging along the side of the roof due to wind damage. After some professional advice from parishioner Mike Macaruso, we contacted a local roofing company to address the needed work, who in turn brought in a lift to complete the project. While here, they noticed the windows on the Chadwick St. side of the Church had some cracks in the cement above the windows, which they repaired through power-blasting and reconstruction. Also, the front roof at the Fr. Connors Center had a small section of shingles fly off due to the wind, which we had fixed by the same company. The total for all the repairs (as we wait the invoice) will be 8 to 10,000 dollars. The good news is that the roof work on the Church and the Fr. Connors Center is covered by insurance, which, after a deductible, our Parish will be refunded over \$5,000. Thank you to Mike Macaruso for stepping in, offering advice, and seeing the project through.

love for those who are “less rich and famous.” One of the better examples of such a person that I keep returning to over the years, beside Dr. King, St. Mother Teresa, or the great St. John Paul II, is Abraham Lincoln. Sorry for the repeat which I’ve mentioned more than once in a homily, but one of my favorite lines from the late President from the 1860’s was, “God must love common people. It’s why he made so many of them.” Abe Lincoln was someone who understood himself well. He didn’t marry Miss America (poor Mary Todd); he didn’t have lots of money, and what he did make as a lawyer and President, Mary had a bad habit of spending behind his back; he didn’t have the looks of a Hollywood actor, resulting in his self-condescension; because of his height, he couldn’t ride a horse smoothly like his favorite short General, U.S. Grant; Lincoln’s smile would scare away a pack of Salem witches; he dealt with depression much of his life, yet persevered through it all; and, worst of all, he lost two sons at a young age that he loved dearly, Eddie and Willy.

In fact, when President Lincoln arrived in Richmond in early April, 1865 shortly after the city fell to the Union army, he was greeted by crowds of slaves and former slaves who pronounced him as the messiah coming to them, kneeling before him like Cornelius knelt before Peter, and worshipped Mr. Lincoln as the one who set them free. He softly rebuked their approach and told them to stop kneeling before him, to thank God for their newfound freedom, and that he was only a man. It was a scene very similar to what we hear in today’s first reading. One would be hard-pressed today to find a statesman on this level. Abraham Lincoln remains the model citizen for those who wish to humbly be “one of the people,” while carrying out their responsibilities that affect the lives of millions of people.

St. Peter, in like manner of St. John the Baptist, did not breach the walls of heaven and try to steal something from Jesus that didn’t belong to him, like worship. Both saints were spiritually balanced, true to form, exuded humility, and remained on the path that leads to life eternal when the opportunity stood – or knelt – before them to leave the narrow road. The wide path to destruction was a foreign road to them. The signs that led to the wayward road they could read, such as a human being kneeling before them, they rejected altogether.

For this, we thank them and so many others over the centuries who have made the choice of remaining truly humble and truly devout before the majesty of God. And by the way, any person who says they are humble or devout, you can be certain *they are not*. Such language does not belong in the vocabulary of the genuinely humble and devout. Rather, beating one’s breast and openly begging each day for God’s mercy is the leader who can be followed. This is why we are called to imitate Peter, Paul, John the Baptist, St. Teresa of Calcutta, and those outside the Communion of Saints who have been splendid examples for all, such as A. Lincoln and MLK.

FROM THE PASTOR

Y up, worshipping St. Peter was out of the question. Cornelius thought he stood before God almighty. He knelt down at the feet of Peter when before him, doing homage to the great Saint to whom Jesus entrusted the keys of his kingdom. Cornelius likely didn't know this last fact. The fact that Peter could bind and loose on earth what can be bound and loosed in heaven. But worshipping another human being was out of the question. Peter pulled out his best imitation of John the Baptist and told Cornelius, "Get up. I too am a human being just like you. I am not worthy to untie the sandals on the feet of the One whom you will be kneeling before and worshipping. Save it for the Christ, Cornelius."

Isn't it just dandy when the Apostles get it right? Especially in the area of worship and praise. Peter's reaction to Cornelius in this week's first reading from Acts is worth breaking open and expounding on for us here in the 21st century. His reaction of humility and honesty regarding where true worship belongs is one that is does not change over the ages. We certainly admire people who are blessed with all sorts of gifts and talents, be they intellectual, physical, business skills, or that of being a gifted teacher. God has given us gifts that present us the opportunity to marvel at what can be accomplished in the life of one person.

In the 1950's and 60's, how could any sane person not marvel at the message and devotion, the focus and grace of Martin Luther King, Jr. For Peter's sake, the guy was up against all the odds imaginable, yet he still kept his head about him, preaching the message of true peaceful protest in order to change laws, ways, behaviors, and practices that created an unequal setting in our society between African Americans and Caucasians! Unlike the protests we've experienced in this country in the recent year or more, where claims have been falsely made as said protests being peaceful as cities and businesses were clearly burning, Dr. King's message of peaceful protest was carried out, shall we say, to a tee. In fact, I'm certain Dr. King would reject the protests we see occurring today under the guise of trying to change our society for the better. The violence alone speaks loud and clear that such groups, whatever color or nationality they are, do not have in mind or heart a message of positive change for this nation. The violence exposes them as fraudulent peacemakers. They subvert the true message of peace our nation witnessed from Martin Luther King 60-plus years ago. Dr. King was a man to be admired for his persistent work toward making us a better nation through peaceful means. The same cannot be said for the violent-makers today.

However, even though he succeeded to a great degree at the time, Dr. King the Baptist Pastor would never expect any person to bow down in his presence. He was much too humble for such a thought. He would have spoken to Cornelius the same words St. Peter did that day long ago, "Get up. I too am also a human being." Get up and stand with me. Get up and walk with me. Get up and join me on the same level. Get up and let us worship the Christ together as one body, where brothers and sisters are equal before the Lord by virtue of their Baptism. Stand up and let's preach the Good News of the Lord's resurrection together in unison.

St Paul too is so clear in his overall message that no one person is above another. He recognized and taught that in Baptism we are all made equal in God's eyes. St. Paul's brief Letter to Philemon is worth reading in regard to such theology. That God shows no partiality. If anything, God expects more humility from those who hold positions of greater responsibility. Such people, in fact, have a much harder road to arrive past Peter's Gate safely because much more is expected from them by way of virtues. This would include Bishops, Cardinals, and most certainly any Pope. There will always be a few of them, because of politics in the Church, who expect the faithful to bow down before them and kiss their...ring. But the humble servant, the Good Shepherd, like St. Peter before Cornelius, is the model of faithful service to Christ and his Church. For most of us, we admire the "rich and famous" people who have a genuine
