

Each year as the Christmas season approaches, we ask parishioners to consider making a charitable donation to the Saint Vincent de Paul

This past year has been especially challenging for many families. The combined impact of the continued pandemic as well as higher inflation (especially at grocery stores and filling stations) has significantly weakened the safety net for many families. As a result, we have seen the number of assistance requests increase significantly, especially over the past few months. Between now and the end of the year, we will be providing food vouchers and gift cards to struggling individuals and families to enable them to buy both food and presents during the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays.

When our society cannot handle individual requests, we provide information about food pantries, food programs, the St. Vincent de Paul Thrift Store, fuel and rent assistance, and social services. We also offer and suggest prayer to ask God for the strength to cope with their crises.

At this time of the year we often hear about the demise of the real meaning of Christmas and its being overtaken by commercialization. I have to be honest: I myself have bemoaned

this loss when talking with people, as well as in my preaching, and even in articles I have written. It is a very easy target to go after when our Sunday newspaper seems to have more ads than news. We are bombarded with email deals and TV commercials pushing us to buy, buy, buy. But, this year, as I have been contemplating this "truth," I have come to the realization that it is essentially a cop-out.

It is so easy to point outside of ourselves and call out others for what they are doing wrong. This kind of thinking, of course, reminds me of what Jesus said: "Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, 'Let me remove that splinter from your eye,' while the wooden beam is in your eye? You hypocrite; remove the wooden beam from your eye first and then you will see clearly to remove the splinter from your brother's eye." (Matt 7:3-5) Ultimately, if we feel that Christmas is too commercialized, the problem resides with us and *not* with others.

How much other people influence our conception of Christmas can be affective only to the extent we allow them. We really do not have to get caught up in the extravaganza that society has come to equate with the "Holiday Season." Rather, we can make another choice one that allows us to focus on the real meaning of Christmas. I am not saving that we should not buy presents or decorate, but, rather, that these things should be secondary to our real preparation for Christmas-for the coming of Christ. Advent should be a time of prayer and contemplation on the meaning of Christ in our lives. Maybe we can spend some time praying through the gospels: Matthew, Chapters 1 and 2; Luke, Chapters 1 and 2; and John, 1:1-18 which is the original Christmas gospel. If you have young children you can spend time reading to

them about what Christmas truly means. While you're setting up a creche, you can talk to your children about its meaning. And, do we know why we use evergreen trees at Christmas? The Christian use reminds us that in the darkest and longest nights of the year, God's love, like these trees, is ever blooming in our lives. And so we place lights on our Christmas tree to remind us of the light of Christ that came at Christmas and broke through the darkness of sin. We give presents to share God's love in the same way that He shared with us the greatest gift possible—Christ himself.

If Christ has been removed from Christmas, it is not the fault of our society. The fault lies with Christians, and with Christians alone. The real meaning of Christmas exists even in the "mundane" reality of what others see in us as we live out the "meaning" of Christmas. We need simply to rediscover within ourselves the truth of what Christmas is all about and focus on that truth.

I pray that over this coming week this rediscovery will take place in each and every heart, and we will put Christ back squarely where He belongs in our lives. If we can do that, our Christmas will truly be merry and bright.

Christmas traditions are beautiful things. For some people, they pour all their effort into getting thoughtful gifts for their loved ones. For others, it's all about the tree and getting the ornaments hung, to bring joy and beauty to the house. For others still, it might be the long baking sessions as a family, and then enjoying the fruits of your labor. For me, the one tradition that means the most is my family's Nativity set.

For years now, setting up the Nativity has been my biggest priority, and the first thing I want to do in Advent, I don't remember when it became my priority probably the first year I had to set it up on my own without my brother's help. Now though, it's the one thing during Advent I long for the most. I want to hang the angel. I want to place the manger in the middle, with Mary and Joseph kneeling on either side. I can't wait to group the shepherds together on one side and the kings on the other, and I even love arranging the animals all about in the fake hay. Most importantly, I look forward to hiding the Baby Jesus until Christmas morning. And this joy, this expectation, extends to Christmas morning when I rush downstairs to place the Baby Jesus in His proper place, laying in a feeding trough.

You do know that's what the word manger means right? The manger is not the structure/stable/cave: it's the feeding trough, for animals. That's where Jesus was laid after His birth, in a long narrow channel where animals would go to eat. If you're surprised by this, then you are a lot like me, who for a long time thought the word manger meant the structure. However, like many things in our faith, this isn't about semantics. When God set the plan in motion for His Incarnation, He knew exactly what He was doing and all the little details that would go into it. Think about it. While it may sound strange to say Jesus was laid in a feeding trough, it certainly isn't weird for us to associate Jesus with food. This is exactly what we do each Sunday when we receive Jesus in the Eucharist. In a sense, the Mass is our much more, sanitary feeding trough. Just moments after His birth, the Lord was already preparing us for the Eucharist.

This Christmas, remember the manger. While you're setting up your Nativity, while you're placing the Baby Jesus on Christmas morning, or any time you see a Nativity, think of the "source and summit" of our faith. Even during the celebration of His birth, we already see the sacrifice that He will make for us, the sacrifice we remember in the Eucharist. When I place the Baby Jesus this Christmas morning, I will think of the Eucharist, the food of eternal life, and I pray that you will too.

To Gather Crowds Around Us or to Save Souls?

This past Friday of the First Week of Advent we heard in the Gospel that Jesus cured two blind men and then told them to "See that no one knows about this."

Why would our Lord perform miracles and then ask people to tell no one?

Theologians still debate the proper meaning of these words. However, they think it may be one of the three following reasons.

Jesus was always on the move and when He performed miracles people gathered around Him. For instance, see Mark 1:45 and Matthew 8:18. At one point, it says that the crowds were so big that it was impossible for Jesus to enter a town openly. It may be that our Lord commanded the people who received these miracles to tell no one, so that He would be able to enter a town openly and without many people gathering around Him.

Another reason could be that He knew the word was spreading quickly and that more and more people were coming to see His miracles. It may have been the case that He was trying to help people see that His main job was not to be a miracle worker/dispenser but to be a savior of souls. Miracles only aided His mission. Hence, He would close this door of temptation before the Devil would use it to creep into His true mission.

Lastly, in the Gospel of Mark 1:45, we read that our Lord tells the leper to go and tell no one but the priest. Maybe He wanted to legitimize the role of the priest, even though He is the true High Priest; or maybe He wanted to show the priest that He indeed is the Son of God.

Whatever His true reason may have been, it invites us to reflect on our own life and the true meaning behind our good, holy works for the Church or people. Do we do them for fame? To be recognized? To gather crowds around us? Or, to save souls? Let this advent be about the Lord and not us. Let it be a time for opening our hearts to God so that He may work through us and not us through Him.
