

Fr. Colletti: A Special Person

From 1947 to 1963 I attended St. Theresa's Church in Billerica. Important occasions occurred during that time... my brother John's First Communion and mine a year later; my sister Marilyn's wedding in 1950 and a year later my Confirmation.


When I was about 7-8 years old, I remember the beautiful gladiolas on the altar each week as Mass, the music, and the four or five older women, dressed in black, who all sat together in the same pew every week. At the time, it was a very small church.

In 1962, a new church was built on Boston Road. In the early 1960's the Pastor was Fr. McAndrew and his curate was none other than Fr. Arnold Colletti!

When it was announced at St. Mary 7 years ago at 7 am Mass that Fr. Arnold Colletti would be a Priest in Residence at our church, I was so surprised and happy. The next day, as I volunteered with a group of people, I told them that in 1962-63 Fr. Colletti served at St. Theresa's Church in Billerica. Within minutes, who walked in but Fr. Colletti! One of the volunteers told him my story and it was so nice to see him. I had not seen him since 1963! At that time he had black hair!

On June 8, 1963—58 years ago!—Fr. Collettii officiated at the marriage of Lou Robillard and Donna Strom. Sadly, my husband passed away in 2018. Fr. Colletti served at his Funeral Mass which meant so much to me and my family. For these reasons, this is why Fr. Colletti is a very special person to us!

We have truly been blessed.



The Church of God is Convoked in Synod

Pope Francis invites the entire Church to participate in a world-wide conversation. This concept is known as Synod. He wants to hear from the whole Church on how the Church can listen better.

What Does this all Mean?

Here in Boston, it means that we will be gathering, as parishes and as a diocese to pray together and to invite the Holy Spirit to help us to listen deeply to one another.

We in The Holy Rood Collaborative will be taking a very active part of this process by gathering together to answer/discuss a handful of questions. In order to accommodate individual personality styles, there will be three options available to you take part in this process.

- Small Group Gatherings: no more than 5 per group: Must be formed by February 25.
 - If you are interested in leading or participating in a small group gathering, reach out to Sr. Lori at srlori@theholyrood.org or at (978) 251-8571/454-5143/256-2374 ext 235. There will be a format to follow, so no worries about having to do this all on your own.
- Individual Surveys: both hardcopy and online versions will be made available by March 1
- Town Hall Meetings: total of three, one in each church in early March Although you may watch via LIVEVIEW, questions will not be able to be asked through this venue. If you want to be able to ask questions, you will be required to attend in-person.

Please be sure to note that the goal of this synod is not meant to be used as a platform to discuss the issues of the Church, but rather how the Church can better listen to er people.

All feedback received by April 1 will then be consolidated by our Parish Council and forwarded to the Archdiocese in time for the May 1 deadline.

The word "synod" comes from the Greek synados, meaning "an assembly." The principle of synodality is defined specifically as "the actions of the Spirit in the communion of the Body of Christ and in the missionary journey of the People of God."



Shortly after I experienced the death of my friend, Fr. Steve, another important person in my life passed away. Her name is Carole Crino. I met Carole about twenty-four years ago at Saint

John the Evangelist Church in Wellesley—my first assignment as a priest. After meeting me for the first time in the confessional, she decided to come to me for spiritual direction. She told me later that she thought our relationship would not last very long. Well, Carol did not get that quite right. I felt privileged to speak at her funeral, and one of the things I spoke about was Carole's love for icons. Overtime she had become self-taught about all the details and intricacies concerning the making of icons.

One of the things many people do not realize when they look at an icon is that icons are not considered to be painted: rather, they are written. Every aspect of an icon has some unique theological meaning to it. It is not simply the picture that is portrayed, but the types of paint, the colors, the symbols used, the brush strokes and how they are applied, and so forth. As a person writes an icon, they say prayers that are attached to each action they take. The very process of writing an icon takes time, precision, and a really deep faith. Ultimately, when the icon is finished, it is not simply about viewing a particular picture; rather, the whole picture is considered to be a theological symbol. The word 'symbol' in this context does not generally have the same meaning that we give it in English. Instead, the word symbol, as it relates to icons, means that it makes present what it is representing. So, as one looks at and prays through the icon, the very theological truths it is conveying are made present to that person.

As I continued preaching, I explained that in many ways Carole's life was lived as an icon: in a sense she wrote an icon through her words and actions. She was a very simple person but, at the same time, also complicated. Carole was someone who had a deep and abiding faith, and yet struggled with her belief. Much of this had to do with her childhood. She would say to me that she did not believe in God, and yet tell me that when she went to receive the Eucharist she never doubted the true presence of Christ. She said it was always a powerful experience of knowing God's presence in her life.

She was someone who did not want to be noticed; she wanted to live her faith unrecognized. But, her level of charity, kindness, care and concern for others forced her to be there for them. People would tell her what a great Christian she was, and that they sensed a holiness about her. This would

inevitably upset her and she would tell me, "People do not see the real me." My response was always the same (and it did tend to irritate her), "If it looks like a duck and quacks like a duck, then it's a duck."

I do not want to portray Carole as a living saint; she could be difficult and at times irascible. She also could have a real temper, particularly if she felt a true injustice had occurred. However, she was always remorseful if she felt she had harmed another person. She deeply loved her deceased husband, Dick, but when he was alive they could well get into it at times. Nonetheless, she adored her husband and her children, and despite her traumatic childhood she learned to be good wife and mother. If you went to her house for dinner, she was the definition of hospitality. She was gracious and kind, and you were made to feel part of the family the minute you walked through the door. She was also a very good cook: the food was always superb and bountiful.

Carole's life was about writing a true icon and the picture that emerges is that of Christ. All her protestations in her belief about how she lived her life belied the truth of where her heart truly was: it was *always* with Jesus.

What was true of Carole's life—of the icon that she wrote—must be true of ours also. Our words and actions are our way of writing our icon. We must become the icon of Christ. Our lives must be a true symbol of Christ. Our lives must make Christ present to the world. The world must be able to see Christ through us. If Jesus cannot be seen through us, then through whom *will* He be seen? As Saint Paul wrote to the Romans and, therefore, to us, "For everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved. But how can they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how can they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone to preach?"

Our preaching is not simply about our words but, rather, about the life we live. As Saint Francis is reputed to have said, "Preach the Gospel, and when necessary, use words." Christ must be seen and that is only possible through the life we choose to live. We must write an icon of Christ through how we live our lives. At the end of our life, we will show to the Father one of two icons—either an icon of ourselves or an icon of Christ.

Which icon will you choose to write with your life?

Discerning Care

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus tells us that when the Samaritan found the man who had been assaulted, he bound up his wounds, pouring on oil and wine, then brought him to a place where he could recover (Luke 10:34).

One of the glories of our Catholic tradition is the many institutions founded over the centuries to care for the sick. Heroic women and men have dedicated their entire lives to caring for the sick and elderly, and it may be that God is calling you to such a vocation. That is not the path for most of us, but we all should be concerned about healthcare in our nation. As Catholics we should do what we can to further just policies and assist our own Catholic hospitals and convalescent homes.

St. John Paul II reminds us that institutional solutions are not enough. As he recovered from the attempt on his life, the Pope wrote a moving exhortation on the meaning of human suffering, *Salvifici Doloris*. In that remarkable document he wrote, "The institutions are very important and indispensable; nevertheless, no institution can by itself replace the human heart, human compassion, human love or human initiative, when it is a question of dealing with the sufferings of another" (SD 29). During his own recovery, the Holy Father noticed that often doctors talked about his "case" in front of him, without including him in the conversation. They were no doubt very professional, but John Paul recognized how important it is for the patient to feel that he or she is more than just "a case".

Visiting the sick is a work of mercy that calls for special discernment. Illness isolates people, and visits and cards remind them that they are not alone. But we must also be sensitive to individual needs: some people prefer privacy when they are unwell. We need to be humble enough to ask those who are sick what help they may need or want. We should regularly pray for those who are sick and for the light of the Holy Spirit to know how best to serve their needs.

We should be mindful of people who have no friends or family at hand. If we notice that someone we usually see at church has not been around, perhaps a discrete contact is in order. Reach out with a card, a reassuring word, or offer a prayer for them.

We should also not neglect the immeasurable gifts of the sacraments. So few of us even think to have a priest anoint us or a loved one who is sick, or to suggest to a Catholic friend or a neighbor to seek out the supernatural grace dispensed through the sacrament. Reach out and see if it is possible to have someone bring Holy Communion to those who are not able to come to church, or perhaps consider volunteering for this wonderful ministry yourself.

We are told in the Book of Sirach: "Do not shrink from visiting a sick person, because for such deeds you will be loved" (Sir 7:35). The Good Samaritan gave the unfortunate man soothing medicine, and discerning care for others is Christ's prescription, too.

A while ago, Philia, a high-schooler from a particularly dangerous school due to its location, was assaulted on her way back home. Walking along the sidewalk, she felt a sharp object being pinned against her back; "Give me all you have," she hears from what seems to be another student. It was Storgos, another student from humanities class. Philia quickly does what he asks and Storgos leaves with all her belongings.

Now, about a week later, Philia, getting on her bus to go to Church, sees someone getting kicked off because he could not pay the bus fee. Philia's reaction was to approach the bus driver and say that she will pay the fee. Are you sure? the bus driver asked; Philia, looking at the person being kicked off, realizes that it is Storgos. Are you sure? repeated the bus driver. Yes, responded Philia.

About a month later, Philia was going back to Church when, low and behold, one of the new ushers was Storgos. They talked and Storgos apologized for having assaulted her, and he mentioned how that time on the bus really changed him. He said he can pay her back in full.

This, of course, is not a real story but a fictional one. However, it illustrates a story of the virtue of love, even in the midst of difficult times—even when we feel like we are being pinned against the wall with sharp sufferings. Storgos, whose name means love of family, was touched by the actions of Philia, whose name means love of friends.

This weekend's reading from St. Paul tells us that the most important of all virtues is love. We could have all other virtues and gifts but if we have no love, our efforts will be in vain.

- Do we practice Philia's love, even when we feel assaulted by life itself?
- Do we practice the love of family, that being Church, siblings and parents?
- But most importantly, do we turn these loves into Agape, which is the Love of God—
 - A love so powerful that it moves you to sacrifice yourself for the good of others?
 - Becoming the usher for others to experience this same type of love?





