

Last Sunday, at the conclusion of the St. Mary 11 am Mass, Boy Scout Troop 77 presented the Bronze Pelican Award to Fr. Brian.

The pelican is an ancient Christian symbol which has several meanings. One aspect of the symbolism describes the relationship of Jesus Christ with His people by referring to how a mother pelican will give her life's blood for her young to nurture and protect it.

Early Christians had a liturgical symbol of the pelican as a representation of Christ. The significance of the bronze pelican emblem is Christ-like devotion to youth. It acknowledges that adults in Scouting are called to nurture and raise our scouts in Catholic ideals. It recognizes adults in Scouting who have made contributions to the spiritual development of youth in Scouting.



Each parish in the Archdiocese of Boston is given a Catholic Appeal Fundraising goal. This goal includes your parish Appeal Assessment (8% of your parish base revenue: a 3-year average of offertory and Grand Annual). The assessment is the goal for many parishes, including ours.

Some parishes consistently surpass their assessment and therefore have a larger goal (calculated by taking the average of all Catholic Appeal paid pledges in years 2019-2021).

Parishes that exceed their assessment, meet their donor goal, and have a volunteer Appeal Coordinator are eligible for a rebate, which is calculated at 50% over assessment. Parishes who do not meet their assessment are charged for the shortfall.

As you can see from the above reported numbers, each of our churches will receive rebates. We thank all those who have supported this year's Catholic Appeal!



The day of my father's funeral was obviously not an easy day for me. I clearly remember standing alone in the sacristy of my home parish, St. Michael's in Hudson. The rest of the

priests had already gone to the back of the church to greet the body. As I prepared to go there myself, I suddenly became emotionally overwhelmed. The grief and sense of loss in that moment became too much for me, and so I turned to the Lord in prayer and asked for help to get through the next few hours. As I prayed, the words I heard were simple and direct and gave me both strength and hope: "I believe." Those words reminded me of all I needed to know.

What was the Lord reminding me of with those words? He was reminding me of what I hold to be true: I believe that Jesus died for our sins, and in his death on the cross He destroyed the power of sin and death forever. I believe that as Jesus rose from the dead, He gave us the promise and hope of eternal life. I believe that the grave is *not* something to fear: it is a sign of hope because of Christ.

We can too easily lose sight of the very foundation of our faith—the Paschal Mystery (Jesus' passion, death, resurrection and ascension). The Paschal Mystery works because of the Incarnation. The union of human nature and divine nature in the one person of Jesus is what makes possible our salvation. The Paschal Mystery, or for short—the Cross, only truly works because of the Incarnation.

The power of the Cross is discovered in both Christ's actions through his humanity and his actions through his divinity. We must first look at his human actions. Christ came into the world for one purpose—to show humanity the way to salvation. And the way to salvation is to embrace our human nature fully. Our human nature, which is created in the image and likeness of God, desires at its very core to be in union with God. The problem is that Adam and Eve, and humanity as a whole, worked to distance themselves from God. In other words, we sought to deny who we were created to be. Rather, we sought to create a god of ourselves according to our desires and perceptions of how we think

things should be. Jesus took a very different approach and that is discovered in all the choices He made.

Jesus knew that his teachings would get many people angry and upset. And it was *not* simply because He told people to love each other and be kind to each other. Jesus' teachings challenge status quo. He challenges people's perceptions and desires. He calls us to reject that which does not come from God, but people do not like to be challenged. Jesus came to speak the truth, which is objective, real, and unchangeable. He came to speak the one and only truth, which is determined by God alone, and not by any person. Anything that contradicts the teachings of Christ is distorted, false and, if not rejected, will lead one to damnation. Jesus was pretty clear about this and that is why people got angry with Him. Jesus understood that standing for the truth would lead to the Cross. He spoke the truth nonetheless because it was the will of his Father. Again, for Christ to truly embrace our humanity meant only one thing—embracing the will of the Father no matter the consequences.

Jesus' journey to the Cross began with the Incarnation, for He was born to die. God knew we would reject Christ and how we would kill Him. But God sent Him anyway because, without Christ, salvation would be impossible. As Jesus grew, He advanced in wisdom. And in that wisdom, He understood from a human perspective what we needed to hear and how He had to say it. He was clear that the road He was on would lead to the Cross but He walked it anyway. He prepared the way at the Last Supper even though his disciples would not immediately understand. He ate a last meal that would also be an eternal meal, as He established the Eucharist in order for us to share in his death and resurrection. He went to the Garden and prayed in agony. Yes, He did ask for the cup to pass from Him; but most powerfully, He sought the will of his Father. He could have called for angels to come and rescue Him, but He allowed himself to be arrested and led away. He was insulted, abused, betrayed, abandoned, denied, persecuted, and so much more. Through all of this, He kept his eyes on the only thing that mattered—the Father's will. As He hung on the cross, He handed over his spirit to God and in that moment his divinity was revealed. The Roman centurion stated it clearly, "Truly this is the Son of God."

Christ's divine reality is revealed powerfully through most resurrection. As Jesus comes forth from the tomb after three days, He does so through his divine power. And the power of the resurrection reveals God's plan for us. As Jesus comes back from the dead, his body is made immortal: it can never die again. He shows clearly that He has power over life and death and, in this moment, gives us the promise and hope of eternal life—a life that is not simply a spiritual reality but also a physical reality. Jesus makes clear after the resurrection that his body is a real human body that has been transformed and glorified. What has happened to Christ will happen to all who place their faith in Him. After forty days, He ascends to heaven and prepares the way for us to follow Him. What happened to humanity of Christ will also happen to us.

The Incarnation finds its ultimate meaning in the Paschal Mystery and shows that the ultimate meaning of human life is also found there. We therefore need to both embrace and live out the Paschal Mystery in our lives. Christ gives us the tools to do just that: the sacraments, the scriptures, and the Church. The power of each finds its source in the Incarnation.

Make Time to Breathe: Attend to the Presence of God

Memory is a gift when it brings a remembrance of shared love—mutual love. Perhaps all of us can recall a time when a child related to us as family has quietly walked by us, placed an arm around our waist, leaned in, softly said, "I love you." and then walked off to continue whatever he or she was doing.

This image comes to mind when I consider the "prayer of aspiration." One of the meanings for the word aspiration is the action or process of drawing breath. We see and hear the words, such as: breathe, inhale, exhale, calm, quiet, be still, center, etc. being used in promoting health, mindfulness, and therapy techniques. All aimed to improve our quality of life. Another common meaning of aspire is to have an ardent desire to achieve something.

In a Catholic faith context, an aspiration is a short prayer memorized and repeated often throughout the day. It is a practice that helps us continually turn our thoughts toward God. When we practice attentiveness to the presence of God, we are alive with the breath of God—it fills our being. It increases our desire to be closer to God: to be in union with God.

There are many opportunities during our day, especially in the more relaxed days of summer and vacation, to be the loving child: we secretly and suddenly just give word to the sense of belonging and love that bursts forth from our being—when we attend to touching and acknowledging the presence of God with our words of love, gratitude, repentance, and praise.

If you aspire to foster attentiveness to the Presence of God in your life, these are some suggestions for "prayers of aspiration":

Jesus, my Lord and my God.
My God, I love you.
Sacred Heart of Jesus, I place my trust in you.
Come Holy Spirit and renew the face of the earth.
Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner.
Praise God, through whom all blessings flow.

A line from a psalm such as "The Lord is my Shepherd, I shall not want." or a verse or refrain from a hymn sung at Mass, "O Lord, you are the center of my life: I will always praise you, I will always serve you, I will always keep you in my sight." can bring breath to my day and keep me aware of the Presence of God in the now. Make time to breathe and enjoy each day.


