

Following the celebration of this Rite, the Catechumens will travel to the Cathedral to participate in the **Rite of Election**. At the Rite of Election, the Catechumens will become the Elect, as this rite takes its name from the fact that here, "acting in God's name, the Church makes its 'election,' that is, the choice and admission of those catechumens who have the dispositions that make them fit to take part in the Sacraments of Initiation."

Later in the Lenten Season, the Elect will participate in the 3 Scrutinies. More on that in the coming weeks...

This past summer I took a motorcycle trip to West Virginia with my friend, Father David. When I was setting up the reservation for our cabin, the person who was working with me warned me not to use a GPS.

She said the GPS would take us twenty miles out of the way and she could give us the correct directions when the time got closer. I thanked her for her help, and Father David eventually got her directions when the time for our departure got closer.

It was about a ten-hour ride, and we made sure we left early enough to be able to do the ride in one day. But we ran into a problem on I-95 in Virginia: something was clearly wrong. We appeared to have missed the exit we needed to take, and the clouds in the sky were looking ominous. You could see flashes of lightening in the distance but there was no rainyet. Moreover, at this point we had ridden about twelve hours and were very tired. Since it was getting late and we were heading into a major storm, we decided it was best to get off the highway and find a hotel for the night. In the morning, we decided to use our GPS to find the way to our cabin. As we got back on the highway heading north, we came to realize what was wrong with the original directions. The exit that it told us to take did not have the actual exit number. Rather, it had the route number of the highway we should take, but the exit sign had a different highway number. Using the GPS, we eventually arrived at our destination. It was about a three-hour ride.

As we live out our lives we are, many times, given directions by people who are trying to be helpful. Yet, when we follow their suggestions, we end up in places we do not expect to be. Often people will tell us that we really do not need to listen to the scriptures or the Church. They offer a better way to help us get through life-one that is more in accord with what we want out of life. The problem is that, as Christians, we have a destination to get to—heaven and the advice that people give us often takes us off course. We live in a world that assumes that everyone, except the really bad people, will get to heaven. But, as Christians, we must realize that heaven is not something that we can assume is automatically ours. No one has a right to heaven, nor can anyone earn their way to heaven. Heaven is a gift offered to us by God who in reality owes us nothing. And the only reason we can get into heaven is because of what Christ has done for us. His death and resurrection alone is what merits us heaven. Our lives are intended to be lived in cooperation with God's grace, which will heal us and lead us on the right path to heaven. His grace opens us to accept Christ's saving actions as the foundation of our life,

and gives us the strength to make Christ the center of our lives. It is so easy to lose sight of this truth. It is so easy to listen to the directions of others to listen to the world rather than God.

On Wednesday we will celebrate the beginning of Lent. Lent is an awesome time to help us stop and see how we might be lost. It can help us to refocus our lives and think about what our final destination should be. There are only two paths we can take and Jesus is clear on this: the path of salvation by following Him or the path of damnation by following the ways of the world. Lent is a time to stop and think about what course we are truly on. It is time to turn on our spiritual GPS.

How do we turn on our spiritual GPS? Lent gives us the tools to help make that happen: fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. Too often these are seen in a negative way when, in fact, they are gracious gifts given to us by God. The purpose of Lent is *not* to punish us or torture us; rather Lent is about helping us find our way to God. It is a time to stop and recalibrate our lives in order to grow in our baptismal call to holiness and deepen our conversion to Christ. The three pillars of Lent—fasting, prayer, and almsgiving—each help us to recognize the great gifts God has given us and seek to use them in a way that furthers God's kingdom in the world. They should lead us to glorify God through all that He has given us. They also help to remind us of our dependence upon God.

These three practices are called ascetical practices. And they are intended to mirror what athletes do physically to prepare for their games. Our ascetical practices get us ready for the spiritual battles that each of us will face as we draw closer to Christ. The reality is that the evil one does not want us to be in union with God, but it really is a human being's deepest desire. We are created to be union with God.

From a Catholic perspective, God created all things that exist, giving them a purpose, meaning, order and end. Our responsibility is to use God's creation only as He intends it to be used. If we act in any other way, we are choosing sin over God and that puts us on the wrong path. We are following the directions of the world rather than using the spiritual GPS that God has given to each of us. God wants us to get to heaven and He alone can show us the way. The gifts He has given us in the three ascetical practices—each in its own way—will help us to get to our destination. We will discuss how that will happen over the coming weeks of Lent.

"The More Excellent Way of Love?"

The first book of Corinthians is the first of two letters Paul sent to the church in Corinth, to address issues plaguing the church. Paul dedicated the entire 13th chapter to emphasizing the importance of love because the lack of it is the root cause of divisions.

As February is a month that we honor love and marriage, let's explore why love is the most excellent way, and hopefully, be inspired to love one another better.

In English, the word "love" is used to describe at least four types of love relationships:

- 1. between members of a family
- 2. between friends
- 3. romantically, between a man and woman
- 4. between Christ and His Church

In the Greek language, however, there's a different word for each type of these love relationships:

- 1. Storge: between members of a family
- 2. Philia: between friends
- 3. Eros: romantically, between a man and woman
- 4. Agape: between Christ and his Church

In 1 Corinthians Paul is talking about the fourth type of love: agape. How does agape differ from the others? In a nutshell, the others are mostly to do with me while agape love is all about you! Paul shows us what the qualities of this love are in 1 Corinthians 13:4-8.

Patient: being concerned about the other person's welfare without yielding to weariness (Gal 6:9). Kind: of being tender in heart, speech, and actions (Eph 4:32). Doesn't envy: of not feeling jealous of what others have or become (Prov 14:30). Doesn't boast: of not telling of one's own achievements, possessions, or abilities with excessive pride (Phil 2:3). Not proud: being approachable, not arrogant and overbearing (Rom 12:16). Not rude: being genuinely courteous and polite in speech (Prov 15:1). Not selfish: being truly concerned about the welfare of others even if it's costly (Gal 6:2). Slow to anger: being long tempered or slow to express anger (Eccl 7:9). Keeps no records of wrongs: forgiving and not holding a grudge against the offender (Lk 6:27). Doesn't rejoice in evil: not gloating over another person's failures (Gal 6:1). Rejoices with the truth: rejoicing when the truth is revealed in the lives of others (Phil 1:18). Bears all things: putting up with everything if it's beneficial to the other person (Gal 6:2). Believes all things: being eager to believe what's best for others and to put the most favorable construction on ambiguous actions (Rom 5:8). Hopes all things: being hopeful that those who have failed will not fail again rather than concluding that failure is inevitable (Jn 21:15-19). Endures all things: not allowing oneself to become overwhelmed but persevering steadfastly through difficult trials (Rom 5:3-4).

This is the kind of love Jesus loves us with. Agape love requires humility. We must challenge ourselves and make an effort. Jesus can give us grace and the ability to love others even when we feel inadequate.

God never stops loving us. We also must love one another without ceasing. Very often we fail to love because we are unwilling to forgive. But we can love without ceasing if we forgive without ceasing.

Are you committed to walking in "The More Excellent Way of Love?" If you're struggling, take one of these verses with the accompanying bible verse and meditate on it in your daily prayer—remembering that without love, our labor means nothing!

Love Your Enemies

In order to fully appreciate the very real and radical character of the ethic to which Jesus called his disciples, we might draw up an enemy list. Jesus says, "Love your enemies." Just enemies? who are your Whether it be an historical or a political figure of the past or present, a personal foe, an opponent, someone who regards you as an enemy, or someone against whom you harbor unchecked an resentment or animosity, to actually name the person is to concretize the challenge of the Christian. Do good to bless ____ and pray for ___

To love one's enemies must be a learned response. Where is this learned? First, we look to Jesus on the cross and then to Paul. In the midst of his sufferings Jesus cried out, "Father, forgive them." Forgive whom? Pilate? The high priest? The rabid crowd? The soldiers? The disciples who deserted him?

From dying, praying and forgiving Jesus, we turn to Paul who reminds us that it was "while we were enemies we were reconciled to God through the death of Jesus." (Rom 5:10). From Paul and Jesus, we learn that the enemy is not them, or her, or him but us... you, me and every other sinner for whom Jesus came, conquered sin, died and rose again in glory.

When Jesus says, "Love your enemies," He is not talking about love as an emotion but as a conscious and free act of the will. While it may be impossible to feel love for an enemy, it is not impossible to act in certain ways, even toward those whom experience has shown to be the most entrenched of opponents.

WHY NO MUSIC DURING LENT? by Mike Stack, Music Director, St. Mary Church

As Catholics, we are called to sacrifice for Lent, engaging in self-control and self-reflection through fasting and abstaining. A lot of us "give up" something we love for Lent. It turns out, this is true of our music as well.

In Lent, we give up the Gloria and the Alleluia. Both expressions of deep joy in praising God, in this more solemn time, we put them aside, the Gloria omitted completely, the Alleluia replaced. It is through this that we create one of my favorite musical moments in the church—the Gloria and the Alleluia triumphant at the Easter Vigil in the midst of the story of Salvation History.

But there's more to it than just those two hymns--- instrumental music is forbidden at Mass during Lent—you'll notice that we do away with long hymn introductions and instrumental verses during Lent. Our instruments only support singing. And likewise, we only sing the songs that are our response during the Mass like the Psalm and Holy or during the entrance, offertory and Communion processions. We do not sing at other times—including before and after Mass, after Communion, and perhaps most starkly, as we leave the church after the Dismissal, we depart in silence.

The Church in its wisdom does grant us a reprieve from this: Laetare Sunday—the fourth Sunday of Lent. A day of joyful anticipation of the coming Resurrection, akin to Gaudete Sunday in Advent with it's pink candle, we don't sing Alleluias or Glorias, but we do embrace all our other hymns and traditions. But other than that, it gets a little quieter in our churches until we get to Easter, when we can shout our Alleluias with joy: I expect to hear every one of you singing it with us!

ABSTINENCE AND FASTING

ABSTINENCE: Catholics over 14 years of age are bound to the obligations of abstinence. Abstinence (no meat) is to be observed on Ash Wednesday, Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

FASTING: Catholics over the age of 18 and up to the beginning of their 60th year are bound to the obligation of fasting. Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays of Lent, are defined as the days of fasting. On these days, only 1 full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted; but liquids, including milk and fruit juices, are allowed.

DISPENSATION FOR 2023: This year, the Feast of St. Patrick, the patron saint of our Archdiocese, falls on a Friday during Lent. Given the importance of this feast in the life of the Archdiocese and in the lives of many Catholics, Cardinal Sean is granting dispensation from the Friday Lenten abstinence on March 17, 2023, to those who wish to take advantage of this opportunity. This is a one day only dispensation.

Our Collaborative Social Justice Committee has again, for its International Initiative, committed to support our Sister Parish, Our Lady Star of the Sea, in

Sierra Leone, West Africa.

During this Lenten Season, we will be conducting an Almsgiving collection to support this parish, which is deeply dedicated to serving its community through corporal and spiritual works of mercy. Your material and goods donations in years past have helped this community in a number of profound ways.

This year, you may donate via online giving, available through all of our churches. If you would like to donate by check, please make checks payable to either St. John the Evangelist, St. Mary or St. Margaret of Scotland and note 'Lenten Almsgiving' in the memo. Pease do NOT make check out to The Holy Rood Collaborative as it is not a financial entity.
