CHEVERUS AWARD



In the bicentennial year of the Archdiocese of Boston (2008), Cardinal Séan O'Malley instituted the Cheverus Award medals. These medals are now conferred upon selected recipients from throughout the Archdiocese annually at the Cathedral.

The oval-shaped, silver medal bears the image of Bishop Jean-Louis Anne Magdelaine Lefebvre de Cheverus. On the reverse side is Bishop Cheverus' coat of arms and episcopal motto "diligamus nos invicem" (let us love one another).

Bishop Cheverus was the founding Bishop of Boston and led the diocese from 1808 until his return to France in 1824. He died in 1836 as the archbishop of Bordeaux.

The medal recipients—who include laypeople, religious and deacons—are chosen for their service to the Church and God's people. Most recipients are nominated by their pastor, forwarded by their area vicar and approved by their regional bishop and Cardinal O'Malley. Some recipients are personally selected by Cardinal O'Malley.

The criteria is that the nominee should be a lay person who has served the parish well over an extended period of time and has done so in a quiet, unassuming and, perhaps, unrecognized fashion.

This year, one parishioner from each of our parish communities was recognized; Ted Powers of St. Mary, Lorraine DeFreitas of St. Margaret and Betty Conlon of St. John. Ted recently received his award at the Cathedral of the Holy Cross in Boston among other recipients. As both Lorraine and Betty were unable to attend this event, Fr. Brian will present them with this award. Lorraine will be recognized and presented this award at the St. Margaret 4 pm Mass on Saturday, April 15 while Betty will be recognized and presented this award at the St. John 9:30 am Mass on Sunday, April 23rd.

Please join us in congratulating Lorraine, Betty and Ted!

In a series of revelations to St. Maria Faustina Kowalska in the 1930s, our Lord called for a special feast day to be celebrated on the Sunday after Easter. Today, we know that feast as Divine Mercy Sunday, named by Pope St. John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000. The Lord expressed His will with regard to this feast in His very first revelation to St. Faustina.

Imagine living in a war-ravaged country where the destruction of hospitals, homes, historic landmarks, schools, and once bustling downtown centers is a daily occurrence. Or living in a country ravaged by a natural disaster or political unrest and unable to provide safety and stability for its citizens. You must leave behind the only home you have known to make a better life for you and your family. Currently, 100 million people worldwide have been forcibly displaced from their homelands—the greatest number in recent history.

The Collaborative Social Justice Committee is currently exploring ways our community can support refugees and recent immigrants. Fr. Antonio's days here were short. We all knew that his stay here was only temporary. What we didn't know is how attached we would get to him, and how much he would do for us in such a short time.


Below is the official notice from the Archdiocesan Office for Clergy Personnel regarding Fr. Antonio's reassignment:

Since I first joined our Music Ministry, I've occasionally given a talk about my experiences in service. I always start with how I grew up playing jazz trumpet until I was in college when I picked up my roommate's guitar and started a punk band, and that these musical experiences are what prepared me to sing in church.

It always gets a laugh—and it's meant to—but it's also sincere. My own faith journey has led me to see how every experience in my life has led me to where I am; a place where I am able to use my gifts; not for my glory, but for God's!

This is the 'magic' of Music Ministry that I could never find in the secular music experience. When I play music outside of the church, I know I've done a good job when people applaud. But in Music Ministry, it's different; I know we've done a good job when the Holy Spirit works through us and moves the Congregation to sing. I have had many, many special moments as a liturgical musician, but I frequently think back to one Sunday evening Mass at St. Mary's. Our cantor wasn't feeling great and decided not to sing our Meditation, so we went forward with the "Prayer of St. Francis" as an instrumental.

But that's not what happened. The Congregation sang the song TO US!. Years later, just writing about this, I find myself needing to pause and process the emotion of this moment, when I truly believe God reached out through us to inspire you to praise Him.

Everyone who volunteers in the church knows this is the gift of service, and I try to keep it front and center every minute I spend in one of our churches. As Music Director, I get to invite others to experience this gift of service through music and I can promise you that joining Music Ministry will be an amazing and sacred experience. My only regret is that I waited until I was in my 30s to do so myself! Come and talk to any of us in the Ministry. We'd love to have you join us!

And whenever you're in a Congregation and the music helps you connect to the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and to God, show us by singing with us. That's how we know we've done a good job.

I would like to offer to all a most Holy and Blessed Easter.

If this is your first time with us, we are blessed by your presence. If you occasionally gather with us, we are filled with joy that you are here again, for each time you gather with us we are made whole. If you are simply searching, we are delighted that you have brought your journey to this moment, and we desire to make this journey with you. We pray that each and every one of you will come each week to join with us in praising the Lord.

May all who have gathered here this day truly know God's mercy, compassion, and love that is the Easter glory!

The heart of Christian discipleship is found in answering this one question: what does it mean for us to live a life of love? The whole meaning of Easter and how we live out Easter each day is discovered in this question.

There are many misunderstandings about what true love is. For some it is simply letting people 'be who they are.' Acceptance of the person and leaving them as they are is *not* true love—it is laziness. Yes, we need to meet and accept people where they are, but true love challenges people to become the person God created them to be rather than who they want to be. Others will look to their feelings and believe that love is discovered in 'how I feel' but feelings without action is *not* love: love is only discovered in and through our actions.

The cross of Christ is the ultimate expression of true love, for true love is not possible without sacrifice. If we are not ready to sacrifice ourselves: to die to our own self-interests, to die to our own desires and passions, then we are not ready to truly love. If we are not ready to serve another without counting the cost, without wanting to know the benefit it will bring me, then we are not ready to love. Love can never be found in desiring *even* that the one we love, loves us back. True love is only realized when it is unconditional, unmerited and unwarranted, and seeks only what is good for the other without expecting the other to respond in kind. True love is found when we are ready to offer our very self for the other to live.

When Jesus said yes to the cross, He took it up for us. He accepted it for each and every human being that ever existed or will exist. Jesus laid down his life not for his benefit: He did not need the cross—we did. If Christ had not died on the cross, then heaven would have been closed to humanity forever. Christ loved us to his death and in dying showed us that love is more powerful than death, for the cross is what makes possible the resurrection. When we die to ourselves, we realize the transforming power of God's love in the world. When we die to ourselves, we become the instrument that allows God's love to be seen. When we die to ourselves, we come to understand that we *truly* are made in the image and likeness of God. God is love and He has always chosen to love us, even when He knew that we might choose not to love Him back.

What we must see is that the cross is the only way to life. Love is *not* an option because our very nature impels us to be like God. If we are to be like God—and God is Love—then we must be love incarnate. When we choose *not* to love unconditionally (the only true

love), we choose *not* to love at all. Once we seek a return on love, what we have is a transaction—not love. Love must be given freely and without expectation of a return. Christ knew people would reject Him and the cross and He died for them anyway. We must do the same. We must recognize that we really have *only* two options: to live in Christ or to live in death. We live in death when we choose *not* to live a life of love—when we choose to live a life that is all about self-esteem and self-actualizing, or self-anything. When our lives become absorbed with our own desires and passions, true love is not possible. And life without love is a living death.

The cross leads us to a life of love. It begins by recognizing our dependence upon God. All that Christ did, He did in response to God's will. He humbled himself and offered his very self, his very life, to the Father. We must unite ourselves with Christ, joining Him in his act of humility. It is in this moment that our lives come to be about God. Then, like Christ, we can empty ourselves of everything that is not about God, and create room for Him to fill us with his grace, mercy, and very presence. Once we become filled with the presence of God, we—like Christ—can give ourselves completely to the Father and say with Christ, "Into your hands I commend my spirit."

As we die to ourselves with Christ, we begin to experience the power of God's transforming love. We are ready to make real sacrifice. The true meaning of the word 'sacrifice' is to make holy, and to make holy means to make God present. We are then ready to rise to new life with Christ, where all of our relationships are grounded in our relationship with God and grow from that relationship.

When we love God first and above all, we can love others as we should. We can then look at people *not* for what they can give us but for what we can give them. We simply choose to love them for themselves with all their imperfections and brokenness, seeking to lead them to Christ to become the person God created them to be. The essence of love, then, is the road of discovering who we are in our relationship with God.

I pray that the joy of Easter will open you to experience the unconditional love that God has for you in Christ, and that you may come to share that love with all you encounter. May you become the presence of God's love that He created you to be. I wish all a God-filled Easter.

From our Faith Formation Program Associate Shaun Bradley

On Good Friday, a mother stood powerless watching as her son died in agony. By her side was her son's best friend, looking on with the same tears in his eyes. At the command of his best friend, this young man took the woman to be his mother, to care for her, to comfort her. At the same time, that mother took the young man to be her new son, so they might care for and comfort one another in the face of this tragedy.

On that same day, two influential and wealthy men would look upon the broken body of a man they believed in and trusted. They did everything they could for his body, taking it down off the cross and laying it in a new tomb. They attempted to treat his body with dignity while they wrestled with their grief and guilt. They knew in their hearts that they believed what this man had taught, yet, they had not publicly shown it. Now, they attempted to give him a proper burial, to make up for their lack of courage.

On Easter morning, a group of women hurried to the tomb as early as they could. These women had been touched and changed by him; they owed everything to this man. And so, they sought to do everything they could to honor him, to repay him for his kindness in some small way. But how could this small act for a dead man repay the infinite kindness he had shown them while living?

The actions of Mary, John, Nicodemus, Joseph of Arimathea, Mary Magdalene and the other women would not be what brought Jesus back. Their actions could not hope to undo the pain and suffering of Good Friday. But their actions were not without purpose or meaning. Jesus needed his mother and his best friend to stay strong until his return, and so he gave them to one another. Jesus needed his body to be cared for: that same body would rise on the third day. The actions of both influential men and everyday women would be vital for his resurrection. In the darkness of the cross, these people did what little they could for their Lord and for one another, and Our Lord infinitely blessed and increased what they did through his resurrection.

Just like the men and women at the foot of the cross, many of us today feel powerless and fearful in the face of the hatred and violence in our world. What are we supposed to do in the face of tragedy after tragedy? Just like those early disciples did, we do what little we can. This is Easter hope; this is the hope our faith gives us. We live in a world not defined by the tragedy of the cross, but by the hope of the resurrection. What little good we do in the face of crisis, Our Lord multiplies abundantly. We have hope in the One who can stop these tragedies and meaningfully respond to them. The message of Easter is to *not* lose heart, to do what is right in the face of unspeakable horrors, and to trust in the One who can turn our sorrows into joy.

Easter Reflection - Sing Alleluia to the Lord!

Easter celebrates the resurrection of the Lord. We sing Alleluia to the Lord for he is risen as he said. Now, he reigns as Lord of Mercy. Easter is a season that we celebrate with immeasurable joy and newness of life: God's love for us is manifested through the resurrection of the Lord from the dead. God raised Jesus from the dead and we rejoice because through his resurrection we are saved from sin, death, and the dominion of darkness. As a Nigerian—and this also applies to all Africans—singing is a very wonderful way of expressing joy and worship to God for his goodness and love. Yes, we sing Alleluia to the Lord because the Lord is risen. Our faith in the death and resurrection of the Lord is at the center of our Christian faith. This accomplishes his saving mission for us.

In John 20:1-9, we find one of the Easter morning stories that narrates the Easter experience of Mary of Magdala, Peter, and John, the disciple whom Jesus loved. Consider how Mary of Magdala early in the morning went to the tomb and, upon seeing the stone removed, she ran to tell Peter and John, and how they both ran to the tomb to see it empty and so they believed that he had risen from the dead. What a great show of love for Jesus! In Peter's preaching in the household of Cornelius (Acts 10:34a, 37-43), we hear him testify that Jesus is the one appointed by God to be judge of the living and the dead. Our joy will truly be full when we celebrate Easter, conscious of the meaning of JOY-J for Jesus, O for Others, and Y for You. We need to put Jesus first in everything. Then, we need to put others next and ourselves last. In this way, we are able to cultivate the selfless love that Christ showed to us. This does not mean that self-love is bad. but selfishness can constitute an obstacle to our practice of Christian charity.

We celebrate the hope that Christ's vindication brings to us. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ brings us forgiveness of sins and eternal life. Acts 10:43 says "To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name." As John 3:16 says: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." As Easter people, Christ gives us victory over sin, death and Satan. Through the devil, the deceptive one, sin and death came into the world. Through the death and resurrection of Christ, we who believe in him are set free from the dominion of sin, death, darkness, and the power of the evil one. For these reasons, we join the host of angels and saints in singing Alleluia to the Lord! To the paschal victim, we offer thankful praises for reconciling sinners to the Father. Indeed, Christ our hope and new life is risen!
