



The Return of the Chalice

Beginning June 10: Solemnity of Corpus Christi



The Lord our God has given Himself to us in one and unique Eucharistic Sacrifice at the Last Supper. We read in the Gospels that Jesus tells His disciples to "take and eat for

this is my body" and "take and drink for this is my blood." He commands His followers to do this "in memory of me."

We are His followers, hence we are also invited to an intimate union with Christ at the Eucharistic Banquet. Conscious of not being in a state of unconfessed serious sin, we are encouraged to partake of the same sacrifice of body and blood.

After careful consideration, Cardinal Sean has lifted the restriction on the distribution of the Precious Blood. Beginning June 10, on the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, we will again be distributing the Precious Blood of our Lord Jesus.

Since Our Lord is truly and fully present in each—the Host AND the Precious Blood—we may receive Him under both or one of these species. If there are any concerns that may prevent you from receiving under both species, you are welcome to receive the host only. Receiving under both species is simply an invitation, not a requirement. When approaching the minister of Holy Communion, please approach with faith-filled reverence. At the words "The Blood of Christ" which the minister will say, the only proper response is "Amen." At the amen, we make an act of faith to believe that the wine is truly His Precious Blood.

Please note that while it may be an attractive option for some, the practice of intinction—dipping the host in the chalice—is not permitted.

A WORTHY RE-INTRODUCTION



We are so very happy to announce that effective June 18, Fr. Patrick will become a full-time Parochial Vicar in The Holy Rood Collaborative. As part of his service, he remains the Chaplain of our African Community. Although he will continue to work on his dissertation as

part of his Doctoral Program in Sacred Theology, he will no

longer have the part-time responsibility as Chaplain to Brigham and Women's Hospital. Although sad for them, we are extremely excited for his increased role here in our Collaborative community. He has been a blessing to not only Fr. Brian, assisting with our weekend and weekday Masses, but a blessing to all of us who have heard his homilies, been on the receiving end of his genuine kindness and experienced his infectious smile.



Fr. Patrick—named after the Second Catholic Patron Saint of Nigeria—was born to Stephen (of Blessed Memory) and Grace Alemayo from Kabba, Nigeria. The third of five children, he grew up in Lokoja, where his family attended the Catholic Cathedral Church of the Immaculate Conception in his home Diocese.

Fr. Patrick earned a B.A. degree in Philosophy (2002) through the Spiritan School of Philosophy, Nsukka, Nigeria; a B.A. degree in Religion (First Class Honors - 2006) through the Spiritan International School of Theology (SIST), Attakwu, Enugu, Nigeria; and an M.A. degree in Theology (2007) from Duquesne University, Pittsburgh, PA through SIST, Nigeria before being ordained a Catholic priest on July 21, 2007. While in Nigeria, Fr. Patrick worked as a Parish Priest, Parochial Vicar, University Chaplain, Lecturer, Seminary Formator, and the Registrar of SIST, Nigeria. In 2017, he earned a Ph.D. in Peace and Development Studies at the University of Ilorin, Nigeria, and later that same year, he came to Boston College and obtained a Licentiate in Sacred Theology (S.T.L.) with specialization in Biblical Studies in 2019. He is a member of the Nigerian North-West Province of the missionary religious Congregation of the Holy Spirit known in some parts of the United States as Spiritans or Holy Ghost Fathers and Brothers.

Although his choice of a religious vocation has taken him far away from his family, his biological family remains a strong and positive influence on him and has influenced him to share similar positive experiences with others.

To make your donation, pick the tan envelope that has the picture of the tool you wish to 'purchase.' **PLEASE NOTE**: When you decide on a total donation amount, please choose a tool or tools, that in combination, correspond with that amount.

for example...

\$20 = measuring tape (\$20)

\$80 = paintbrush (\$50) and pliers (\$30)

\$150 = toolbox (\$100), hammer (\$40) and gloves (\$10)

In the envelope, you will find the directions as to how to make your donation.

For those who are not in a financial position to make a monetary donation, each toolbox is also asking for a Rosary—i.e. prayer—which is at zero cost; it costs nothing to pray! When you choose the white Prayer Envelope (indicated by praying hands), the name of the camper to pray for will be included. With or without a Prayer envelope, prayers are ALWAYS WELCOME!

On Monday I preached on the text, "I have told you this so that you may not fall away. They will expel you from the synagogues; in fact, the hour is coming when everyone who kills you will think he is offering worship to God." Jesus was

preparing his people for a serious issue—persecution—that He knew would arise as faith in Him spread. In our current environment I often hear people complain about the persecution of Christians, and of Catholics in particular. And, what I said in my preaching, and what I say to all people who feel that way is—get over yourself! Yes, I believe Catholics are persecuted in many ways in our country and have been from the beginning.

In Massachusetts it was illegal for a Catholic priest to enter the colony at its founding. The penalty if he was found here was death. In fact, when the French, who were stationed in Boston Harbor during the War of Independence, wanted to come ashore to celebrate Mass they were refused. Only when George Washington got involved and basically ordered the state to withdraw this law, did it happen. After independence, the state of New York wrote its oath of office purposely in a way that a Catholic could not tender it. In 1934 the Ursuline convent in Charlestown was purposely burnt to the ground. And, of course, you had the American Party, or Know-nothings, whose major campaign pledge was to keep the Irish out so that no more Catholics would come into the country. And, of late, in 1950 Massachusetts passed the Dover amendment to the Constitution because the town of Dover tried to prohibit a Catholic Church from being built. When I was in my first parish, we had a woman move in from a southern state. She told me that when she became Catholic all her friends and some family members stopped speaking to her. These are just a few examples of persecutions of Catholics; many others can be pointed to throughout our history in this country.

Jesus was very clear about what would happen if you truly lived out the faith, and so persecution is something to be expected and not really something to complain about. And He also told us exactly how to address this situation. "But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your heavenly Father, for He makes his sun rise on the bad and the good, and causes rain to fall on the just and the unjust. For, if you love those who love you, what recompense will you have? Do not the tax collectors do the same? And if you greet your brothers only, what is unusual about that? Do not the pagans do the same? So, be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect."

Jesus truly lived this out and showed us exactly what He meant. As Jesus hung on the cross, He cried out, "Father forgive them, for they do not know what they do." He does not ask them to repent of their actions as He forgives them. He simply forgives them because He loves

them unconditionally. The way of the cross is the way of Christian discipleship. The way of the cross is the way of unconditional love. The way of the cross is a life of humility. The way of the cross is the way of trust in God's way.

Our job as Christians is not to defend the faith. Quite honestly, God does not need to be defended—particularly by us. As Jesus said," Do you think that I cannot call upon my Father and He will not provide me at this moment with more than twelve legions of angels?" God is not calling us to defend the faith, but to truly live the faith. But a Christian life truly lived is a life that will, by its very nature, challenge people. Jesus did not end up on the cross because He simply advised people to love each other. Although He accepted them where they were at, He challenged them to change the way they were living. The adulterous woman is an example: He asked her, "Is there anyone here to condemn you?" When she responded "no," He simply told her, "Go and sin no more." He made it clear to her that she had to change how she was living her life. Jesus came *not* to condemn the world but to save the world.

The problem is that many people do not realize they need to be saved. And they get upset with the idea that the life they are living is not okay. They believe that if you are *not* OK with the way they live their life, then you are judging them. They are not truly interested in the challenge that a true Christian life calls us to live. The life of a Christian is not about self-determination; rather, it is about discernment and discovery. It is about unveiling the person God created you to be.

But we also need to be honest with ourselves: are we being persecuted because we are living a true Christian life or because we are acting like jerks? If we see ourselves as better or superior to another, then we are not living a Christian life. If we are focusing on the faults of others and the sinful way of life they are living, we are not living a Christian life. If we see the splinter in another's eye and do not see the plank in our own, we are not living a Christian life. Living a true Christian life does not give us the right to judge others. Yes, we can speak of the right and wrong of issues and must do so, but we cannot then turn around and determine the moral fiber of another.

The primary concern of the Christian is simple: am I fulfilling God's will in the life I am living? If we can say 'yes' to that question each day—and each moment of the day—it will be a greater challenge to others in their own lives. And if we do feel persecuted, we will know that it is because we are living a true Christian life. When we can do this, we will be able to repeat, at the end of our life, the words of St. Stephen (the first martyr) as he was being stoned to death, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit."

From our Asst Dir of Faith Formation Courtney Callanan

When making a wish, whether it be when blowing out birthday candles, when tossing a penny into a well, or when seeing the first star of the evening, one is often advised to keep the wish a secret, as revealing the wish may prevent it from coming true. Now of course, as Catholics, we do not believe in the granting of wishes via candle extinguishing, penny throwing, or star spotting. Better to pray than to wish.

Of course the same stipulation of keeping what you are hoping for secret, lest it never happen, does not apply to prayer. In fact, we should share what we are praying for with others and ask them to pray too! We need not worry about tempting fate, as it were. In fact, being grateful for blessings in advance is a beautiful spiritual practice.

Two examples of this concept, one ancient and one contemporary, come from the Old Testament and from a Blessed. The Hebrew Scriptures have seven words which are translated into English as *praise*. One of these words is - Tôwdâh. Tôwdâh can be translated several ways but one of the ways meant, "a sacrifice of praise for things not yet received." Blessed Solanus Casey, a Capuchin Friar, who in his lifetime was thought of as a man whose prayers brought about miracles, was famous for saying, "Thank God ahead of time!"

Thanking God for blessings before they have even arrived acknowledges trust in God and his desire for our wellbeing, and can bring future blessings into our here-and-now. I have been trying to do this more often as of late. I thank God (ahead of time) for the success of our Catholic Heart Tools4Teens campaign in June, which leads me to thank God (now) for being part of such a supportive community that has always come through in the past. I thank God (ahead of time) for a trip I am taking with friends this summer in July, which leads me to thank Him (now) for having such good groups of friends. I thank God (ahead of time) for being able to be my new niece's godmother at her Baptism in August, which leads me to thank Him (now) for all the joys the next generation is bringing to our family. On and on for the rest of the year, I can think of things that have yet to happen that I can still thank God for now. I can thank God in anticipation of the joy that I trust is coming as He is the giver of gifts. I can thank God now, knowing that the things I am anxious about will work themselves out because He provides for our needs.

I would encourage everyone to try this way of praying from time to time. Journey through the rest of your year in your mind, month by month. When you come across something worrisome, pray to God for a resolution and thank him ahead of time for the resolution, even if you do not yet know what that resolution will be; trust that God has one! When you come across something you are looking forward to, thank God now; you don't have to wait!

To Do Lists

Spring in New England isn't so much a season as an event. One day you look outside and all the bare trees are suddenly green; the brown, crunchy lawn is suddenly a lush carpet; and the snow shovel on the front porch seems wildly out of place. I know that summer doesn't just come overnight, but it sure does feel like it sometimes. For me, the transition always catches me off guard. Winter gives us fair warning: the nights get cooler, the days get shorter, and the leaves put on a show. I always feel like I've had plenty of time to prepare for winter, but summer just arrives like an old friend at the door.

The warmer weather and longer days bring with them opportunities for new activities and adventures, and it's easy to put the quiet times of winter away with our overcoats and boots. Because we know that summer is fleeting, we tend to cram as much into it as we can, shifting our routines to make the most of the season. It's also an opportunity for us to experience God in our everyday lives.

It's easy to forget the power and significance of prayer as we rush to get in as much of summer as possible, often neglecting the spiritual dimension of our existence. But consider the immense value of incorporating prayer into everyday situations. G.K. Chesterton once wrote, "You say grace before meals. All right. But I say grace before the concert and the opera, and grace before the play and pantomime, and grace before I open a book, and grace before sketching, painting, swimming, fencing, boxing, walking, playing, dancing, and grace before I dip the pen in the ink." Chesterton recognized the transformative power of prayer, not just in the expected moments of reverence but in the ordinary, mundane aspects of life. Summer affords us with new opportunities to connect with God in everyday activities, to invite God into our everyday experiences.

Prayer in everyday situations is not about seeking divine intervention or miraculous help with our problems. It is about fostering a deeper awareness of the sacred in the ordinary, recognizing that even the smallest moments can be sanctified by our connection to God. In the simplest of actions, prayer can infuse meaning and purpose: instead of just mowing the lawn, walk with Jesus, back and forth, back and forth.

Prayer in ordinary activities helps develop a sense of reverence for the world around us. It deepens our empathy and compassion for others who are doing the same things we are. Prayer prompts us to intercede on behalf of others, to be agents of love and support in their lives.

Too often we 'squeeze in' prayer into our hectic schedules. So, as we put away the things of winter and embark on the energizing days of summer, make prayer something you get to do, not something you have to get to.


