



During the summer of my freshman year in college, I was staying with my parents who rented a cottage in Dennisport on the Cape. I was looking hard to find a job for the summer and wanted to work as close to 40 hours a week

as possible: I needed to make money to pay for college. It was hard to find work that summer and so, in time, I had to settle for two jobs. The first was working in a donut shop and the other was in a fast-food chicken place. My first day at the donut shop was interesting. When I arrived, the manager simply brought me to the backroom where the donuts and muffins were made, and then told me my job was to clean it and get it ready for the next day. He gave me no instructions on how he wanted it cleaned or how clean it should be.

I looked around the room and couldn't believe the mess-everything had a coating of fat and grease on it! On top of the fat and grease was flour, sugar, jelly, and glazes of all sorts. Then of course, there were the utensils, pans and other pots, and dishes for baking and serving that needed to be cleaned. As I surveyed the room my first thought was: how would mom advise me to tackle this cleaning project? With that in mind, I began by getting all of the pots and pans and such into one corner and then ignoring them-they would be done last. I found the cleaning supplies and then simply sectioned off the room in my mind. I started essentially from the top and cleaned downward finishing with the floor. After that, I washed all pots and pans and such. I then finished with hand-scrubbing the floor. It was dense with dirt and grime. It took me probably a good four hours to complete the job.

The next day when I came back in, the manager told me how impressed he was. They had never seen the kitchen area look that clean before. (But, honestly, it made me glad I did *not* eat the donuts.) The following week I left the donut shop because my other job wanted me to work full-time during the summer.

Thinking about this story helps me realize how important our formative years really are. For most of us, how our parents raised us will remain a big part of how we view and interact with the world. My mom was very big on having a clean house and was very particular about what it meant to clean. As a result of her training, all the maintenance type jobs I have had over the years were somewhat easier to manage. I would just think about how clean my mom would want it and how she would go about tackling it. I also considered that if it was going to be clean enough for my mom, it would be clean enough for anyone.

What is true in the general reality of life is also true in the area of faith. If we look to the early Church, the original disciples sought to live out their lives in accord with both Christ's teachings and the way He lived his life. Christ did not just talk about what they should do, but truly showed them the way: He taught in the most powerful way possible—by example. It is always easy to talk to talk, but not so easy to walk the walk. Christ did not come to simply tell us what to do, but demonstrated clearly what He intended by living out his teachings.

The disciples, particularly the apostles, would mirror Christ in both teaching and living the life He called them to. And the apostles safeguarded the teachings of Christ to maintain that they would continue without error. The Holy Spirit worked through the early disciples to establish what we now call the New Testament, and helped develop the necessary Church structures to ensure that the work of the Apostles and early disciples would continue throughout the centuries. As Catholics we believe that the Holy Spirit preserves the Church's teachings on faith and morals and guarantees that they will never go into error.

The problem for the Church in this age—and every age—is not a problem with its teachings but, rather, that many of us are not following Jesus as He intended. It is not enough to talk the talk; we must also walk the walk. And we are not always very good at that.

When the Church's teachings and the way we live our lives do not match up, it can almost create a form of the old telephone game. This is the game where a person chooses a particular word or phrase and whispers it to the person next to them. That person then whispers what they think they heard to the next person, and so on, until it reaches the last person. The last person then reveals what they heard, and the first person tells what they said. It is rare when the two match up.

When our lives are not a true reflection of what Christ taught and lived, then we are helping to garble the message. And, at some point, that message can become something that is not even close to the teachings of Christ. We are fortunate that we have the Church, scriptures, the catechism, and the like, to help us retool the message, to know with certainty what it should be. But we certainly make the Holy Spirit's work easier when we seek to match up our lives with what Christ taught and lived.

May we seek to become the model that Christ was for us by truly making the difficult choice of not simply *saying* we are Christians, but demonstrating our faith in the way we live. As St. James teaches us, "Show me your faith without works and I will demonstrate the faith the underlies my work. Faith without works is dead." May we desire to have that lived faith and therefore live life as Christ did.

From our Faith Formation Associate Shaun Bradley

A trap we often fall into when reading the Bible is assuming that there is only one message, or only one specific way of reading a given passage. Take for example the Parable of the Good Samaritan. For most of us, our mind jumps immediately to thinking the point of the story is that we should live like the Good Samaritan, to show kindness and compassion to all we meet, even strangers. However, there are far more characters in this parable than just the Samaritan, and by looking at these other characters, we can see just how rich and deep this teaching of Our Lord is.

In the early Church, most interpreters of this parable did not see themselves as the Good Samaritan but rather as the man left for dead in need of mercy. They saw Christ as the Good Samaritan who came and generously gave of himself to save us from sin and death. There were also those who likewise viewed Christ as the Good Samaritan, but instead saw themselves as the innkeeper. Christ brought someone wounded and nearly dead to the inn and left him there for the innkeeper to nurse him back to health. In this view, the inn was a representation of the Church, and the innkeeper was not the one showing abundant mercy, but rather the steward doing the will of Christ to care for those wounded souls he had brought to the Church.

However, there are still more characters in the story who we might be able to relate to depending on the circumstances of our lives. On a given day, someone might actually relate to the robbers who beat the man and left him for dead. How often do we reflect on how much we can hurt others, and how our actions might leave someone feeling dead? For me personally though, the two characters who I relate to most often are the priest and the Levite. While many of us have been taught that these two avoid the man for religious or purity reasons, this is not supported in the story. The two men are traveling down from Jerusalem, aka down the mountain, and therefore away from Jerusalem and the Temple. Purity concerns have nothing to do with their decision. Instead, they avoid the man out of fear. They see someone who might be dead on a dangerous road and pass by quickly on the other side to avoid being attacked themselves. They refuse to help the man not out of indignation, but out of fear. How often do we do the same, avoiding doing what is right because we are afraid of the consequences? I know I do, all too often.

This is part of the beauty of the Bible; there is no one-size-fits-all reading for any given passage. For each of us, we must read Scripture with new eyes each time we encounter a particular passage, because there is always something new to discover. Depending on the circumstances of our lives, we may find something new that we never saw before or find something that will only be relevant to us in that one instance. The Bible is not dead but is alive; Scripture is not what God said in the past, but what He is saying to us in the present.

Have you ever looked at the list of things you need to do and just felt like chucking them out the window, and then going to do something else? Hang on to that thought.

I'm finding myself in what I'm calling a "season of setbacks." To be clear, they're not problems; they're just setbacks—bumps in the road of life that annoy and distract. Everyone experiences them. That moment when you set out to do something only to discover that before you can complete that particular task, you need to complete a different task, or two, or three. It's the reason it takes an hour to do a job that should have taken only five minutes. But lately, it feels like pretty much anything I endeavor to do leads to a list of other things I have to focus on first. None of these things are particularly difficult or even especially critical, but they sap my energy and tax my patience.

I'm not complaining, I'm observing. The most important thing I've observed is that when I'm going full-tilt in seventeen different directions, something is going to get missed. This hit home a few weeks ago when I missed an important event because I was distracted by trivial things. There's a difference between declining an event because you're double-booked and missing an event because you forgot that it was today; one makes you mad at your schedule, one makes you mad at yourself.

I realized that the overabundance of tasks had made me subconsciously lump everything into the same category: "Something I Need to Get Done." My day was filled with these. I was in a constant race where the finish line was just another starting line for something else. Even the things I wanted to do became checkboxes. Focusing on getting things done so you can move on to the next task is great for work and chores, but not so great for the important things, like prayer, family, and friends. It took missing one of those important things to realize that I needed to adjust my thinking.

I realized that I didn't need to prioritize as much as I needed to *recognize* that not all things are "to-do's." That's how you end up in a race with no finish line. It's about the outcome, not the task. Yes, there is always the challenge of the clock, but focusing on getting things done rather than on *why* you're doing them in the first place doesn't end well. And six months from now I'll forget every task I've accomplished, but I'll certainly remember that one event that I missed.

This shift in focus helped me identify my important outcomes, realizing that allowing time for prayer, family, friends, and community comes first. I'm recommitted to setting them apart from the stream of everyday tasks and know they're not something to be completed, but something to be experienced. The day after my moment of reflection and recalibration, the seemingly endless list of setbacks continued, but I focused on the fact that this was a busy season that will eventually end, and with the right priorities in place, I'll see it through.
