
















Again... Colgratulations

This past week we celebrated the Feast of the Guardian Angels. The guardian angels are a fascinating topic to me. I have had a lot of questions about them throughout my priesthood. And people have some

interesting misconceptions about angels in general, and guardian angels in particular.

The first misconception is in relation to human beings and angels. Many times after a person dies, people will say that we now have an angel in heaven watching over us. They, of course, are referring to the person who has died, but from a Catholic, theological perspective this is simply not true. A human being can never become an angel. Angels are a different order of creation. They are purely spiritual beings with no corporeal (physical/bodily) aspect to them. By nature, human beings are both spiritual and corporeal and, as such, we can never be angels. When people die and hopefully go to heaven, they are, in a sense, incomplete. They are spiritual beings in heaven but they are *not* angels—they are saints; the difference is important. At the resurrection of the dead, on the last day, peoples' souls will be reunited with their bodies. Until that time, they are disembodied human beings in heaven awaiting the consummation of the promises of Christ. Both saints and angels will have their own roles in heaven, but all will be focused on one thing: worshiping God through eternal praise and thanksgiving.

Many people think of angels as having bodies, probably based on cultural depictions of angels in books and movies. We tend to treat angels as though they are supercharged human beings who are just closer to God. We have, of course, pictures of angels in church, particularly Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael. For the Church, artwork such as paintings, icons, or sculptures are *not* intended to make us believe that angels have bodies like us. Rather, their purpose is to help us ponder the nature of angels: we need to create a human construct to help us comprehend their existence and their ultimate meaning. Such artwork simply gives us the ability to do so.

It is true that people have encountered angels and seen them in bodily forms but, again, God is simply trying to help us out: a being that is purely spiritual would be difficult for us to recognize as real. God, therefore, allows our mind to construct an image that looks physical but, in reality, is not. This is what allows human beings to interact with the purely spiritual in a way that makes sense in a human context.

Another popular but erroneous activity that people take on is coming up with the "name" of their guardian angel. The truth is that from a Catholic perspective, guardian angels have no names. The purpose of an angel's existence is to be a messenger from God. That is what the word angel means. Their function, in a sense, is in their name. The "names" given to Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael speak to the functions they are called to perform for God. As Pope Saint Gregory the Great wrote, "Some angels are given proper names to denote the service they are empowered to perform. In that holy city, where perfect knowledge flows from the vision of almighty God, those who have no names may easily be known. But personal names are assigned to some, not because they could not be known without them but, rather, to denote their ministry when they came among us. Thus, Michael means 'Who is like God'; Gabriel is 'The Strength of God'; and Raphael is 'God's Remedy."

He furthermore tells us, "Whenever some act of wondrous power must be performed, Michael is sent, so that his action and his name may make it clear that no one can do what God does by his superior power. So, also, our ancient foe desired in his pride to be like God, saying: I will ascend into heaven; I will exalt my throne above the stars of heaven; I will be like the Most High. He will be allowed to remain in power until the end of the world when he will be destroyed in the final punishment. Then, he will fight with Archangel Michael, as we are told by John: A battle was fought with Michael the Archangel.

So, too, Gabriel, who is called God's strength, was sent to Mary. He came to announce the One who would appear as a humble man to quell the cosmic powers. Thus, God's strength announced the coming of the Lord of the heavenly powers, mighty in battle.

Raphael means, as I have said, God's remedy, for when he touched Tobit's eyes to cure him, he banished the darkness of his blindness. Thus, since he comes to heal, he is rightly called God's remedy."

The term guardian angel is really the "name" of all the guardian angels; they need no further designation. We need to accept angels for what they are—servants of God. They perform their functions in his name—at times as intermediaries with us, but mostly to worship God— their primary function—and help us do the same.

Freedom's Paradox

Rev. Sebastian White, O.P. is the Editor of 'Magnificat,' a monthly digest of daily readings for Morning Prayer, the Mass and Evening Prayer. This gem of a publication also includes daily meditations, prayers, texts of hymns, intermittent short articles and commentaries on select artwork. A special treat each month is a recognition of saints with similar devotions. This month, for example, 'Magnificat' includes several saints who promoted the Rosary. (I am forever grateful that my sponsor to RCIA recommended this publication for spiritual formation.)

Before a scripture text, Fr. White often makes a brief comment. This one grabbed my heart and mind well beyond the day's readings:

"The paradox of the Gospel is that we are set free from the chains of our own making by choosing to yoke ourselves to Christ, who bursts our bonds by his own Death and Resurrection."

Our culture tells us that to be truly free we need to set our own rules; we don't need to follow any given by anyone else, including God. This is the same trap Satan set for Eve and Adam (paraphrased) 'Surely you will not die if you eat the fruit of Good and Evil you will be like God!' All we do is dig a hole for ourselves deeper and deeper, getting no closer to freedom than we were when we chose to disobey.

I have learned the hard way that it isn't until I choose Jesus Christ and his way that I am truly free:

- Love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, mind and soul
- Love your neighbor as yourself (the Golden Rule)

Reconciliation is a sacrament that gives us freedom. As we constantly return to Jesus, we gain more freedom. Our mind and heart find it easier and easier to not even consider acting on desires or thoughts that would displease God. Somehow the saints learned to follow more faithfully than most of us do.

It is a paradox. We're raised to be the best we can be; to get ahead; win. In the sixties and seventies (yes, I'm that old) so many paradigms shifted that some of us actually began to believe the lies.

This doesn't lead us to love our neighbors as ourselves. More importantly, it doesn't lead us to love God with all our heart, mind and soul—unless influenced as we grow by parents, other family members, close friends, teachers, or indeed the Holy Spirit himself, to seek out true freedom.

Let's pray for each other that we seek the true freedom that's found in Christ more each day. Just imagine a Collaborative filled with "Free In Christ" people!

# From our Permanent Deacon

I walked into a store last week and where there had been lawn furniture and pool noodles, there now was a forest of twinkling artificial trees. Apparently, we're skipping right to Christmas, passing over Thanksgiving and all of fall. It seems that business time is not our time. Sometimes I feel like I'm being shoved through the year.

Then there's pumpkin spice. One day it just appears alongside the ice coffees, adding a little something to the mood. Then pumpkin spice appears in other places, leading us gently into the fall without the need for pushing and shoving.

It got me to thinking that something similar happens with the Liturgical calendar as with the secular calendar.

The Liturgical calendar leads us gently from one season to another. The cool thing about it is that the focus of the Liturgical calendar is the Paschal Mystery. We have two highlights to our year, Christmas and Easter, the very center of our faith: first the Incarnation, and then the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Our Lord. Each season has its own color, seen in our Liturgy, and its own cadence that guides us to the next moment, allowing us to enjoy the journey.

Between these peaks, we live in Ordinary time. During Ordinary time, we focus on the life of Jesus, exploring the scriptures in a three-year cycle. Each year, we focus on a different Gospel, giving us a gradually, repeating sequence of the Word, to allow us time to let it sink in and see something we didn't three years before. Ordinary time is marked by the color green.

This week, we're starting the 27th week of Ordinary time in cycle A, walking peacefully towards the season of Advent. To mark the transition, we celebrate the Feast of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation to celebrate the Incarnation at the Feast of the Nativity. Seasons of preparation are marked with the color purple, reflected in the vestments and the decor in the church. Advent ends with the Feast of the Nativity, the Incarnation of Our Lord. Seasons of great celebration are marked with the color white.

The Christmas season leads us naturally into the life and ministry of Jesus in the form of Ordinary time again, until we move into the season of preparation and penance we call Lent. Lent concludes with the shortest season of the year, the Triduum, lasting only three days beginning with Holy Thursday and ending with the vigil on Holy Saturday that opens the Easter season, the very apex of our year. We celebrate the Easter season for 50 days, culminating in the Feast of Pentecost. We then return to Ordinary time to continue our year until we come again to Advent and a new cycle.

The gentle progression of our year allows us to enjoy each season by reflecting on Our Lord. From his birth through to the Passion and Resurrection, the whole of the Paschal Mystery plays out every year. Can't you just smell the cinnamon, nutmeg, and allspice?


